7 Killed, 10 Hurt, Train Hits Cotton Pickers

LUBBOCK, Nov. 23. (AP)—Seven persons were killed and ten others injured when a freight train plowed into a truckload of cotton pickers 11 miles northwest of Lubbock about 9 a. m. today.

Bodies and parts of the truck were strewn for 100 yards along the right of way.

Victims were all Latin-American residents of Lubbock headed for a day of cotton picking. Some of the injured were in critical condition.

William Rust of Slaton, engineer of the Santa Fe freight threw on the brakes when the fireman saw the truck but it was too late.

AUSTIN, Nov. 23. (AP)—The 3rd consecutive week of fair weather kept farmers busy in the fields last week but rains were needed.

Using Butcher Knife, Four Get Out, Amarillo

AMARILLO, Nov. 23. (AP) Using a butcher knife to force a jailer to open their cells, four prisoners escaped from the Potter County jail today.

One, Dwight Hoskins, 24, indicted for murder was recaptured 15 minutes after the 3:30 a. m. break.

Still at large were twin brothers Edward Leo and Leo Earl Rader, 25, indicted for armed robbery, and James Farris, 21, who was awaiting the outcome of an appeal on a burglary conviction.

American Consul Released At Mukden, Korea

MUKDEN, Korea, Nov. 23. (AP) Angus Ward, the American Consul General at Mukden has been released from jail by the Chinese Communists and ordered out of the country.

The Communists also released four aides who were jailed with Ward, October 24, on what the State Department called "trumped up" charges of beating and insulting two Chinese.

A Communist "peoples court" found them all guilty and meted out varying prison sentences and commuted them to deportation.

Everybody's CHAMBER OF COMMERCE BY BILL DAVIS

SOME Form of organization apparently is beneficial to all living things. Seeds dropped together can germinate and push through to the surface when a single embryonic plant would be hopelessly imprisoned. Wild animals live together in packs or herds, knowing that in this way they can better defend themselves. It remained for man, however, with his ability to reason and to benefit from the experience of past generations, to make the greatest use of organization.

Historically, the individual has found that it is frequently to his advantage to lose his identity with a group in order to secure the benefits which may be enjoyed only through a combination of individuals working together for a common purpose. The modern Chamber of Commerce is an outgrowth of the early efforts of business to organize.

Competition is the very life of trade, but the essential object of commercial organization retail trade promotion work is the development of business through cooperative effort. Retail promotional efforts of the Chamber of Commerce largely take the form of special events ranging from the popular Dollar Day sales to the campaign of running over a period of weeks. Timely promotion unquestionably is one of the most important factors in the success of special events. Certain merchandise should be adequately promoted at those periods when consumer demand is at its highest.

Consumer demand for various types of merchandise is very definitely established during certain months of the year, and if they

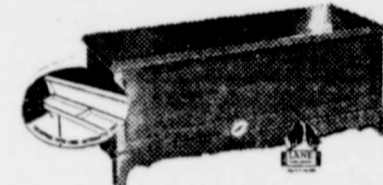

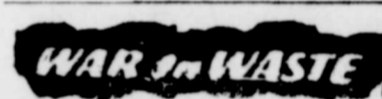

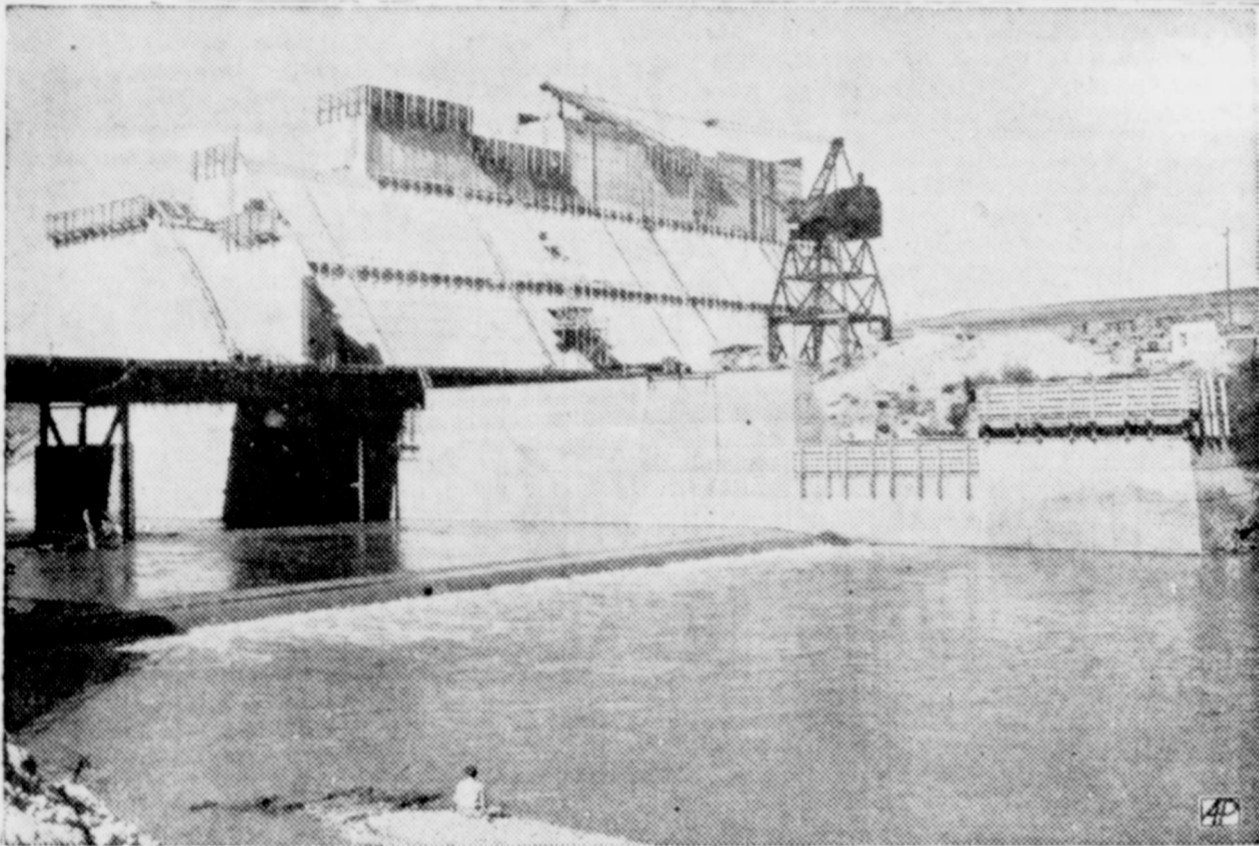
