Jack Petty, formerly of Pearl, who was wounded in action January 15, 1945 in Germany, died in a German hospital shortly afterward. He had been awarded the Purple Heart, and had been across



two months before he was injured. At the time of his death he was 24. He was born January 10, 1921. He was a graduate of Pearl High School and was an outstanding track and basketball player during his school career. He was married to the former Miss Alma Lee Medart. His father was Thos. E. Petty a native of Coleman, and his mother was the former Miss Alma Fisher of Germany.

CHUNGKING, China, Nov. 28. (AP)—Most government officials fled this tottering Chinese Nationalist capital today as Communist troops struck almost to its gates.

An Associated Press dispatch from Formosa said Communist troops broke into a Chungking suburb 12 miles from the city proper.

This dispatch quoted authoritative sources as saying the government had moved to Chengtu, 170 miles northwest.

Missing Plane With 3 Skeletons Found

NEW IBERIA, La., Nov. 25. (AP) Wreckage believed to be the plane that carried an Allentown, Pa., trio to their deaths November 18, 1948, is believed to have been located near here, when a deer hunter in Pointe Coupee Parish west of Baton Rouge, discovered the wreckage.

They were thought to have been lost in this section, and the Fort Worth Star-Telegram asked the NEWS to get Camp Hood hunted out for the plane, which was done via air.

The weather faded hulk had the numbers 2709, which is thought to be part of the plane's number which was NC-2708V. It was an Avion.

In the plane were the pilot, Joel Ritter and Mr. and Mrs. Warren W. York. \$5,000 had been offered as a reward, but had expired six months ago.

Livin' Down 6-10th of 1 Percent

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 28. (AP)—Between September 15 and October 15 lower food costs brot the cost of living down 6/10ths of 1 percent, the lowest point in 1949. (Hadn't noticed it.)

The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported its consumer price index at Mid-October was 168.5 percent of the 1935-39 average of 100.

This was three percent lower than a year ago, but 26, percent higher than in June 1946 when most controls were abandoned.

Two Injured Wednesday Night In Car-Truck Crash On US 84 East

About 10 o'clock Wednesday night, Frank Schaefer, of Sweetwater and Dallas, and his sister, were injured when their car was in an accident with a Holingsworth Mill & Elevator Company truck about three miles east on US 84.

The Schaefers were in a '49 Chevrolet which had its front end demolished, and the truck had 2 tires blown out, and had to be unloaded at the scene, as the rear trucks were damaged. The truck driver was unhurt.

Schaefer and his sister were taken to the hospital and she had deep cuts on her face and neck, and a broken left arm. Schaefer himself received cuts and bruises and possibly chest injuries.

Monday they were still in the hospital and were reported resting "as well as could be expected."

Mr. Lee Does Big Things With Angora Rabbits

Mr. Ben Lee who is in the Angora Rabbit business just east of Gatesville, is the owner of some very beautiful Angora 100 percent wool sweaters, from the Angora wool sheared from his Angora Rabbits.

This wool is also made up in piece goods which is blended with sheep wool and made into blankets, of 50 percent Angora wool, and 50 percent sheep wool. The wool from the rabbit is claimed to be 8 times warmer than other wool of equal weight.

The rabbits were taken to the State Fair in Dallas this year and won several blue ribbons.

YDC REMOVES BLAIR: GSSB NOT RUN TO SUIT 'EM--ANYBODY!

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 21.—Sup. R. E. Blair of Gatesville State School was asked to resign Monday by the Youth Development Council

Harold Matthews, the council's director of institutions, said the Gatesville school needed a person "better qualified, more active, if we are to carry out a progressive program."

The correction center for wayward Texas boys has been criticized regularly in recent years.

While acting to get a new superintendent for the Gatesville school, the board turned down a request by three Dallas women that it replace S. L. Bellamy as director of community services. Bellamy took the state job two months ago after resigning as Harris County chief probation officer.

The complaint against Bellamy was that a man of more education was needed. And cases of floggings at Gatesville when Bellamy was connected with that institution were aired.

Asst. Supt. M B Kindrick will supervise Gatesville until the council names a successor to Blair.

Hall Logan, a member of the council criticized Blair for inaction. "It's difficult to censure a man for not doing anything," Logan said, "But he doesn't move. He just sits."

The youth council was created by the last session of the Legislature. It was given authority over the special schools, formerly under the State Board of Control.—The Dallas Morning News.

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The Texas Poll The Statewide Survey of Public Opinion

 AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 26.—What would you say is the biggest problem facing Texas? Ask a statewide cross section of adults this question, and you will find more people mentioning the legal battle over the Texas tidelands than any other problem.

The fight for the valuable oil bearing tidelands is before the United States Supreme Court. It was started there by the federal government in an effort to take away from Texas the submerged

 Some interesting changes in opinion have taken place since a year and a half ago. A survey then showed cost of living uppermost in the public mind, not only as a family problem but also as a state problem. Tidelands was sixth on the list at that time. These were voted the top ten problems March 1948 (the numbers in parenthesis show the present ranking):

1. Cost of living (2)
2. Racial equality (7)
3. Education (5)
4. Housing (6)
5. Politics (9)
6. Tidelands (1)
7. Water conservation (10)
8. Industrialization
9. Roads
10. Juvenile delinquency

Not included among the big ten at that time were employment, health, or taxation. Each of these has recently assumed greater importance in the public mind. The fact that employment is now listed in third place reflects public concern over layoffs and talk of recession. Health takes fourth place following the state's worst polio epidemic. And taxation now places among the big ten problems as it becomes increasingly apparent that the state may have to search for more revenue.

The recent survey indicates the public has not yet been impressed with the seriousness of conditions in our state hospitals for the mentally ill. Less than one percent mentioned care for the mentally ill as the biggest problem facing Texas. Governor Allan Shivers recently said he thinks this is the state's most pressing problem. He will call the Legislature in special session next January to do something about it.

Five per cent of the persons questioned in the survey mentioned health as the biggest problem, but they referred to the polio menace and the need for sanitation, not to conditions in the state hospitals.

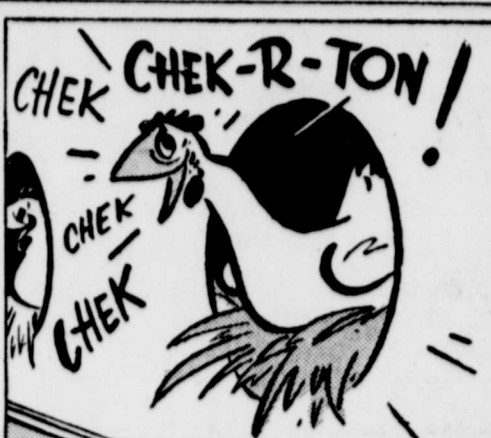

NEW WATER SOURCE FOR THIRSTY LAND

Water discovered last April under a valley in Culberson county south of Van Horn, Texas, had led to irrigation and cotton farming on a larger scale. Irrigation ditches

and lines are shown above. Literally scores of wells have been completed. Water is 90 feet from the surface and goes to a depth of 375 feet in the huge sub-soil reservoir. Wells pump from 1,500

to 1,800 gallons per minute and irrigate an average of 300 acres each. Culberson county was the last of Texas' 254 counties to grow cotton. This was made possible by the new water supply. (AP)

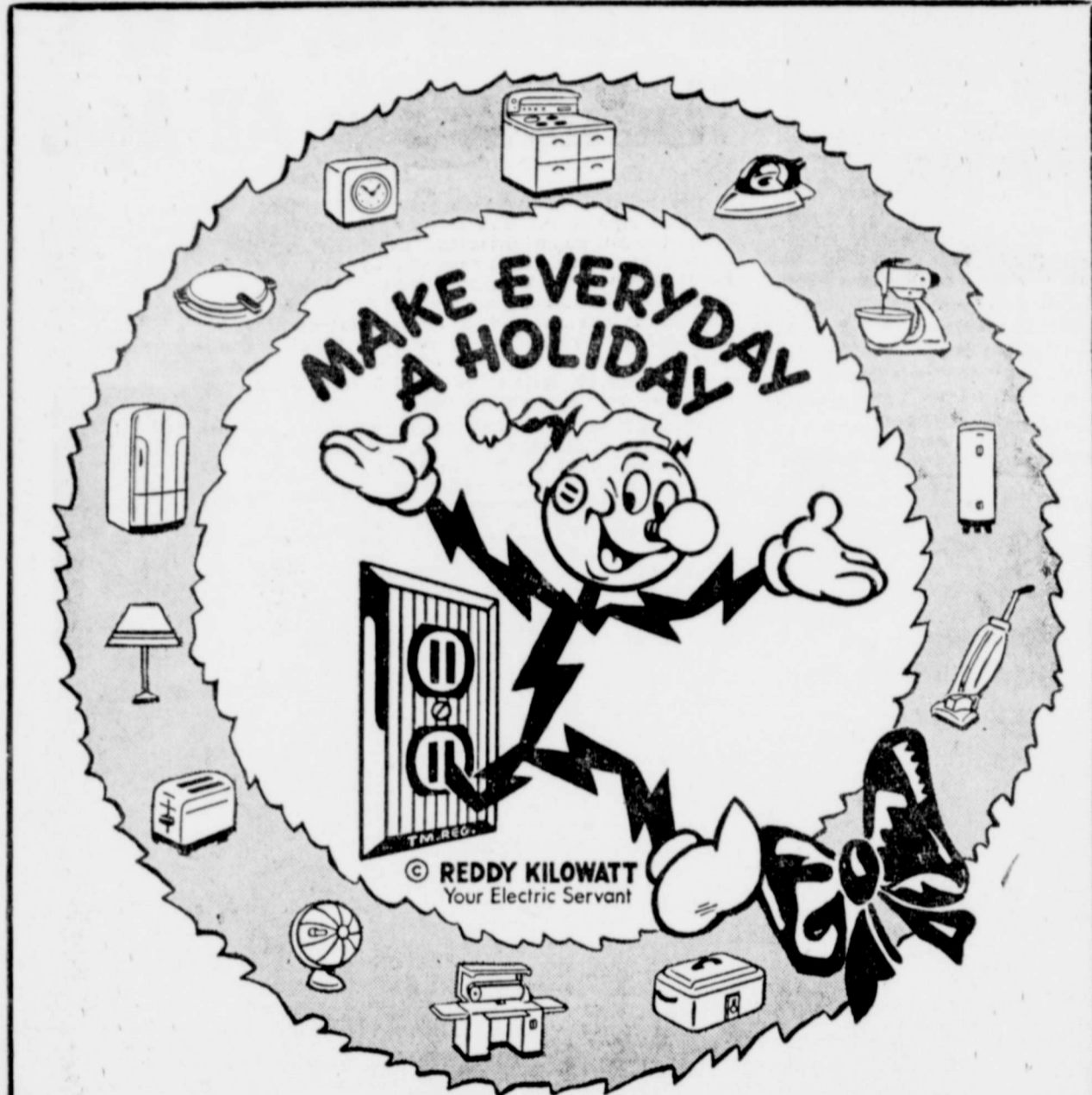

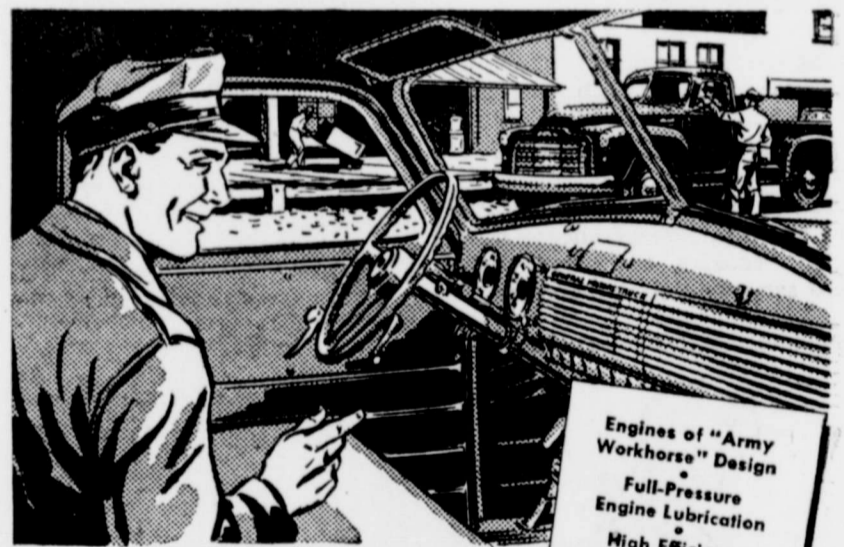

Here's How To Carve That Turkey For Thanksgiving and Xmas

Here is the best way to carve the Thanksgiving and Christmas turkey, according to the Poultry and Egg National Board:

1. Remove the leg by holding drumstick firmly with thumb and forefinger. Cut through skin by drawing knife back and forth, and sever joint. Press leg away from body with flat side of knife, then cut remaining skin on the back. Try to remove the oyster (choice dark meat in spoon-shaped bone on the back) with the leg. Place leg on service platter.

2. Disjoint drumstick and thigh by holding leg at right angles to plate and cutting through meat in the bone. Then, holding thigh knife, press drumstick down with other hand until joint snaps.

3. To slice leg meat, hold drum stick at right angles to plate and cut down, turning leg to get uniform slices. To slice thigh meat, straddle the bone with fork and cut meat in lengthwise strips.

4. Remove wing by placing knife at right angles to breast about 1 1/2 inches above wing and cutting straight down through skin and wing joint.

5. To slice breast meat, straddle keel bone with fork or insert fork in rib section on side opposite that being carved. Hold knife parallel to breast and cut with a sawing motion, starting first slice just above place wing was removed. Cut slices about 1/4-inch thick or less.



Worker's Dilemma

Whether to ask for another raise in 1949 is a question now vexing our unions. Shall they go on through the year without asking for another raise? Some unions are saying it will be bad business for the nation's workers to insist on another round of increases. Others, recalling that raises have been obtained three years in a row, insist that labor keep it up and demand another raise.

How's the way to answer this \$64 question, so that the American workman may have the \$64—and much more? Because it makes sense that any sound gain made by American workers will be a gain for the entire nation, I favor whatever will have the greatest long range benefit for American workers.

Consider the Facts
People who have their facts straight know that any substantial rise in wages must be followed by a jump in prices. This is elementary fact-and-figure economics. If we could have another wage boost with the rise in prices it would bring—and the nation would keep on buying—that would be one thing. But there are strong indications that won't work again.

Pipelines of supply to consumers are beginning to fill up. The public is refusing to buy as it has for five years. Consumers are getting more price conscious. Many manufacturers are even now finding it hard to market what they produce. Some are already compelled either to decrease hours of operation or lay off workers.

Danger Signal
If a wage boost now would result in more unemployment and lower wages in the long run, would labor unions demand the increase? No, they would not. Yet that is exactly what would happen, if we should crowd the entire economy toward a depression. There are certain serious danger signals.

Here is a sample. On January 29 a Cleveland utility company awarded a contract for two generators to a Swiss firm. They cost \$1,140,000 which was nearly \$500,000 less than bids of three American firms. The Cleveland company had to accept the foreign bid, despite protests by American companies and by American workers.

The Safe Way
Now that Europe is beginning to get into the market, it will be seen that America has no monopoly on manufactured goods in the world markets. Competition there is just beginning, and it will get tough aplenty. Wage increases that push up prices, besides making more trouble just now in the home markets, would make it hard for America to compete in foreign markets. Foreign production will also continue to invade our home markets.

Since living costs are already definitely going down, and since a wage increase would be very bad for the industries we work for, and would endanger our jobs, I'd say let it go by. If we can keep present wage levels, and let prices come down, that will mean a real raise for everybody. That way, not only union members, but everybody will have their standard of living raised a full notch.
