House Committee Works on Mrs. Wileman, 92, Cotton Acreage Allotments Dies in Gatesville

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 12. (P)—A House Subcommittee today undertook to see what can be done to smooth out some of the rough spots in the cotton acreage allotment law.

The group met Agriculture Department officials to determine if the law itself must be changed or if administrative procedures can be revised to meet a flood of protests.

Many farmers have protested that their individual acreage allotments are too small and that the cuts from their 1949 acreage are out of proportion.

Rep. Gossett of Texas presented a proposed solution worked out by Texas Cotton Growers at Wichita Falls last week.

It provides that no farm cotton acreage allotment for 1950 or 1951 should be smaller than 75 percent of the acreage in 1947 or 1948.

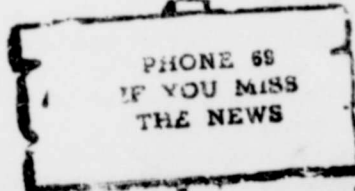

Tragedy Takes Two Lives Saturday At 2 Near Waco

Oran Clawson, Jr., of near Flat, and Arthur Creacy, Jr., now living in Waco, were killed instantly on US 84 a short distance out of Waco, Saturday afternoon about 2 o'clock.

Also injured, were Frank Forseille of Flat, and T. A. Williams, and Sgt. James W. Lockwood, both also of Flat.

Creacy was driving in a car alone toward McGregor, and the four men were riding in a truck toward Waco, carrying Sgt. Lockwood's household furniture to his new residence at 3617 Hay Street in Waco. Their wives, Mrs. Lockwood and Mrs. Williams, were in a car ahead of them.

Forseille, driver of the truck, was cut, bruised and was suffering from shock when Sheriff C. C. Maxey started to question him regarding the accident.

Listed as "critical" was Sgt. Lockwood, who remained unconscious with a head injury Sunday, and Williams was in a very serious condition from last report.

"The vehicles struck with terrific force, the cab of the truck was badly smashed and the light 2-door was partially demolished.

"Clawson must have been riding on the right side of the truck cab and was thrown from the vehicle, his body being beneath the cab, almost under the wheels.

"Creacy's car tumbled off the pavement to the driver's right down the road bank, and his head and shoulders were hanging out the open right door.

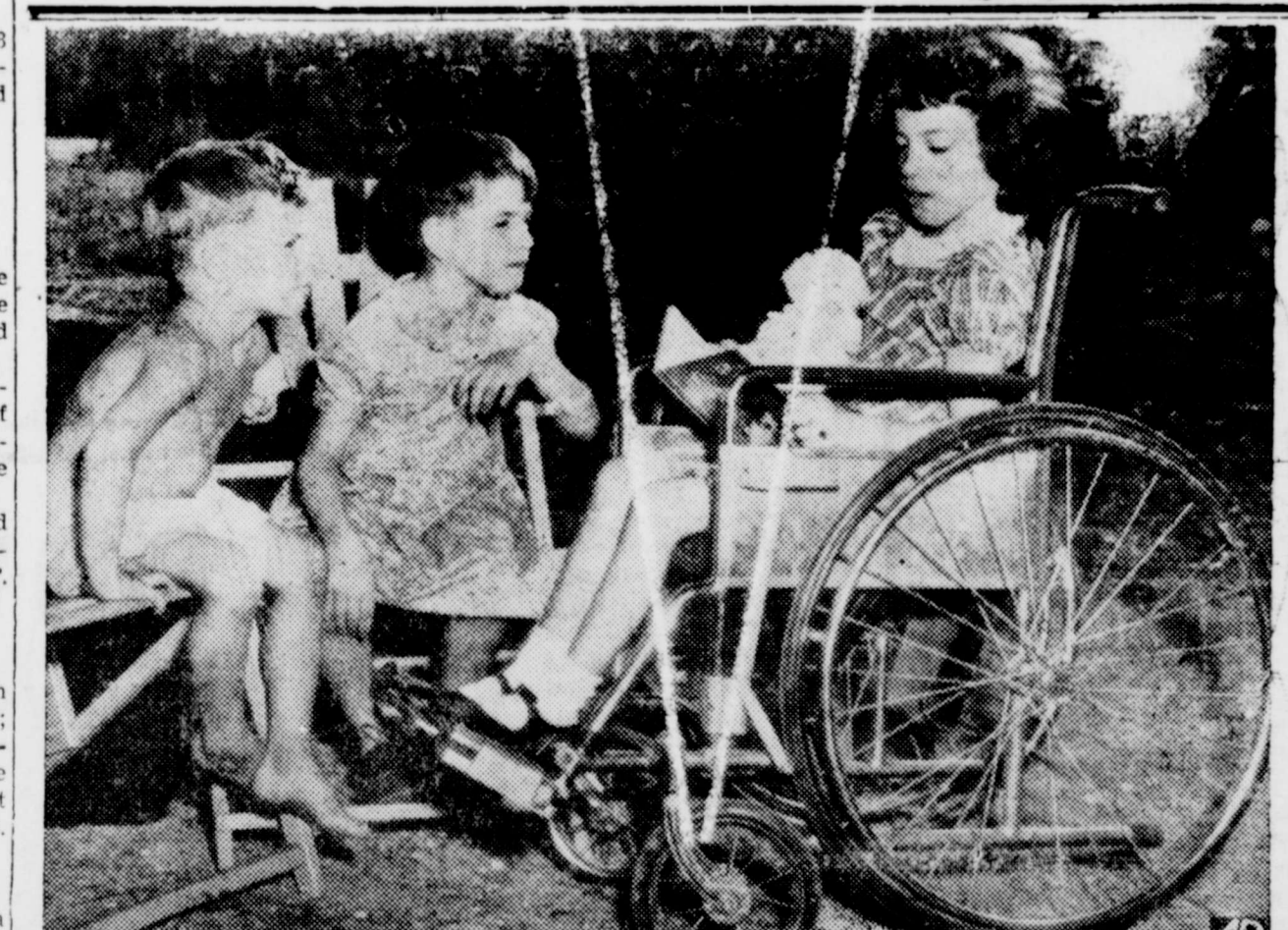
"The truck stopped with the cab off the pavement on the driver's side and with the trailer slanting back across the middle strips of the highway.

The percentages above were figured on the base of all fans who named one or more stars. As was expected in such a popularity poll, most of the players named were backs.

The survey also indicates the extent to which Southwest Conference football fever spreads among Texas adults. One out of every ten attended one or more conference games this year. Six out of every ten said they listened to one or more games on the radio, and about the same number read about the games in the newspapers.

4-H Poultry Show

Thirteen 4-H Club boys and girls brought in sixty-five chickens for the Junior Poultry Show last Saturday. These youngsters had a very creditable exhibit and the judge, Otha Johnson, thought some of the birds were highly fitted.

Last spring sixteen boys and girls received fifty baby chicks each from the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce. They agreed at the time to bring four pullets and one cockerell back to be sold—the proceeds from the sale to be used to help perpetuate the program.

Joe Davis of Purlmela, Claudine Shirey of Ater, and Aubrey Hightower of Gatesville won most of the blue ribbons. Joe Davis had the Grand Champion pen of five chickens and the grand champion cockerel. Claudine Shirey had the grand champion pullet of the show, and Aubrey Hightower the champion pen of leghorns and the champion leghorn cockerel.

Plans are already in the mak-

ing for a bigger and better junior poultry show in 1950. This show will be open to any boy or girl in the county, regardless of how

Annual Report Goes to College Station

The annual report made each year by the County Agent to the head office at College Station has been mailed.

This report shows results of a variety of demonstrations. Indications are that all the demonstrators are making progress in soil conservation, livestock improvement, pasture improvement, production of crops, parasite control, and poultry production.

Forty-eight different farmers received the help of the County Agent in soil conservation. In many cases the forty-eight farmers are carrying on a whole farm demonstration. Terraces, soil building crops, and farm management entered into the program.

1949 was a big year for several club boys and adult demonstrators. These achievements have been previously published, but a brief listing would include Seth Turner with the Grand Champion calf at the Houston Show which put Coryell County and Purlmela on the map; Melvin Hempel with a Grand Champion Angus heifer at the Baylor Bear Rodeo Show and with a little slice of money from the National Angus Show; Eva Lou King with the Grand Champion barrow of the Temple Fair; Otto Blum, Bob Clary, and Billy Waddill placed high in the five county swine show at Waco; the 4-H Livestock Judging Team of Coryell County was high point team at 4-H Round-up at College Station for District 8. Again E. W. Blum received the gold award with a 3003 pound litter of ten pigs in the State Ton Litter Contest; Clovis King won a silver certificate of award in this contest.

The County Agent's report also showed much increase in the use of fertilizer with a corresponding increase in production where used. This particularly applies to the use of superphosphate under fall grain and the application of ammonium nitrate in March as a top dressing. The report also shows a trend toward the planting of soil building crops such as hubam clover, Austrian Winter Peas and vetch as a means of restoring organic matter and nitro-

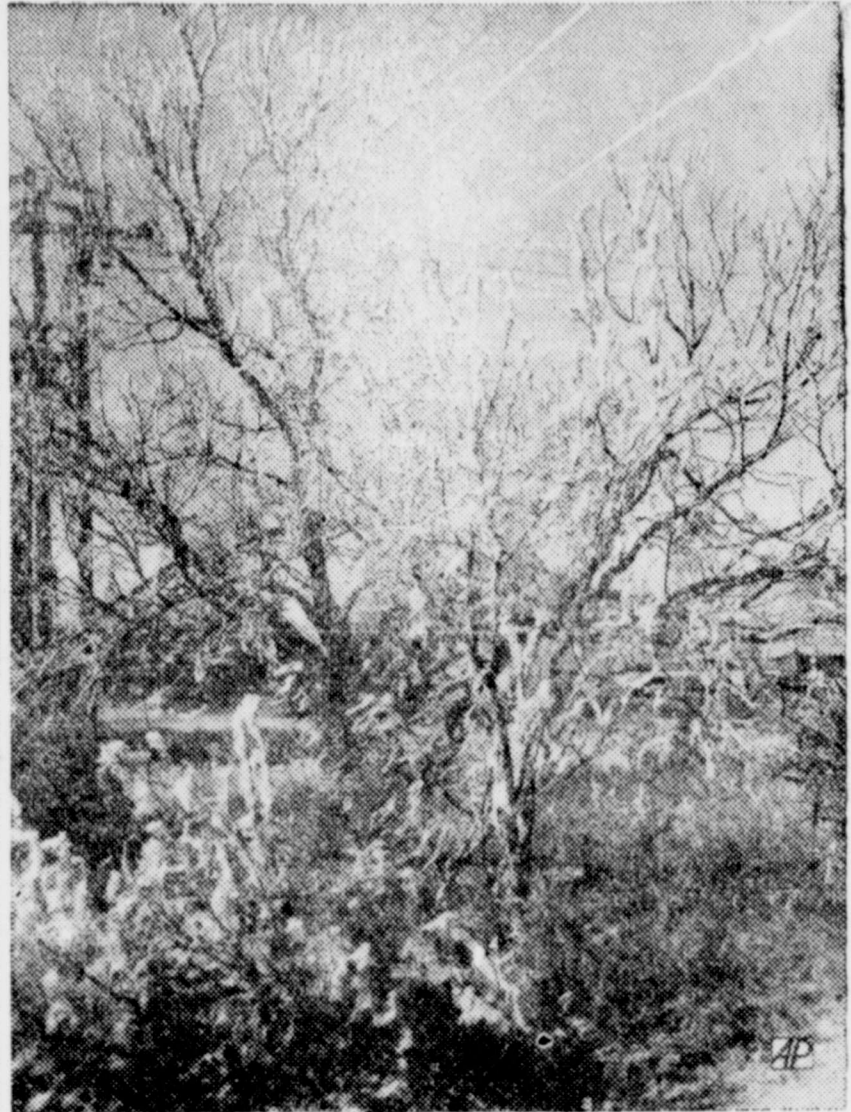

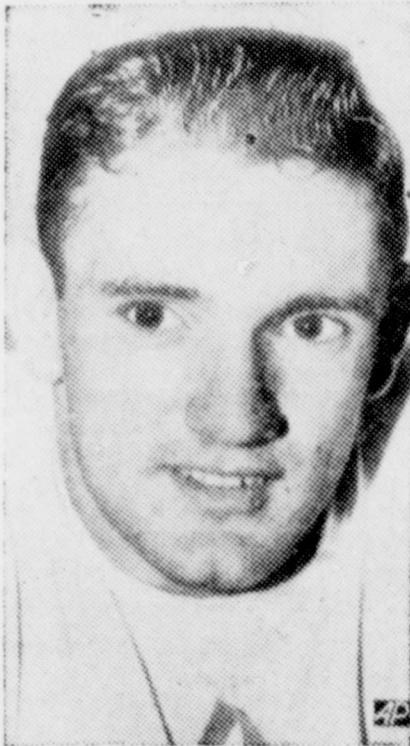
