



The County Agent's report also showed much increase in the use of fertilizer with a corresponding increase in production where used. This particularly applies to the use of superphosphate under fall grain and the application of ammonium nitrate in March as a top dressing. The report also shows a trend toward the planting of soil building crops such as hubam clover, Austrian Winter Peas and vetch as a means of restoring organic matter and nitroto the land.
