Gatesville Independent School District Monday will formally open the newest addition to the school plant, the latest coming to a figure of \$885,000 in one hunk, and from the picture, this particular layout is not completed yet. There's more to it.

Anyway, building-wise GISD just about has it—or will, when it's paid for. Of this indebtedness, the District bought \$59,000 worth of bonds, and the Federal Government has a \$250,000 equity in it, leaving some \$600,000 outstanding, all the bonds being sold. Tax valuation has gone up from \$5 to \$8 million.

GISD has progressed a lot building-wise in the last ten or more years, and now the 'physical equipment' can possibly be said to be "the best school facilities that can be found anywhere in Texas in a town of its size and the district remains, bondwise, in sound financial condition" according to Superintendent L. C. McKamie.

Haven't made all the rooms, but the lay-out looks out of this world to us, after being cooped up in the now decapitated 'old red building' when we was a school boy in the 1919s. Quite a difference in the physical lay-out.

With no further comment, you ought to go out and see the building Monday evening of next week. Take plenty of time, it's a big one!

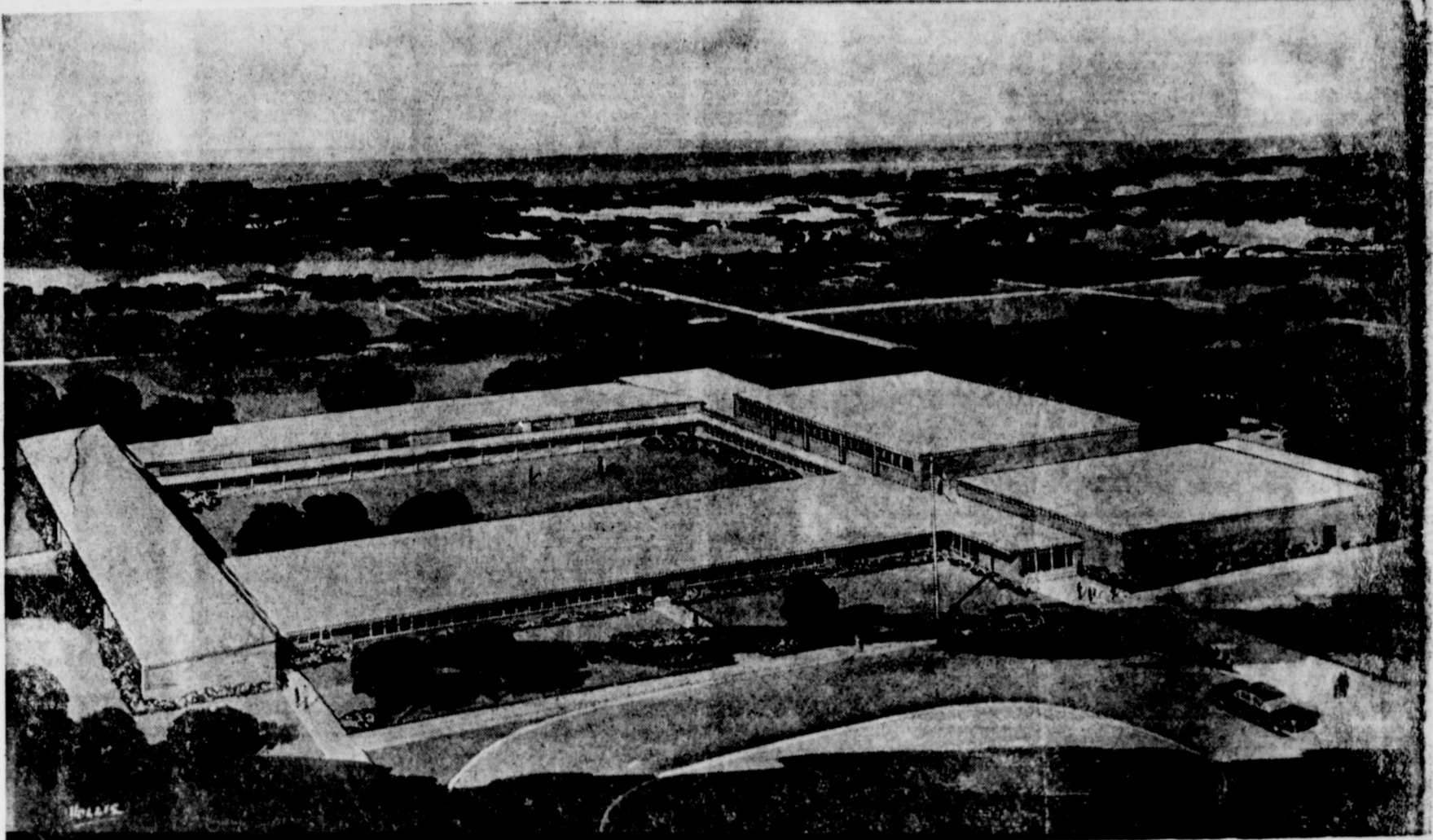

Oglesby High School will have homecoming October 24.

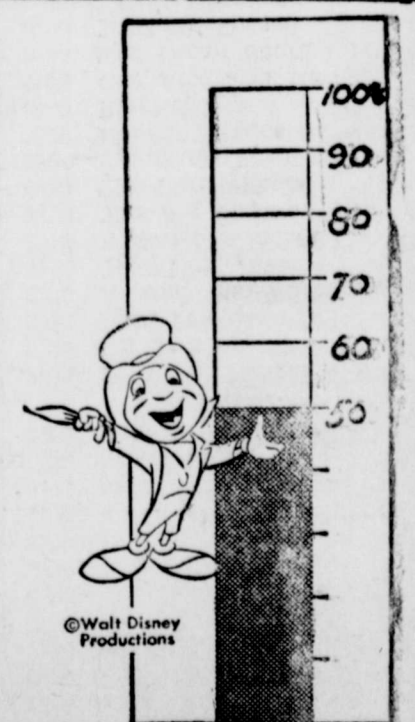

NEW GLUE ON POSTAGE STAMPS MIGHT STICK AND TASTE BETTER

The post office department is tentatively considering doing something about the glue on its postage stamps. Experiments are reported to be underway to change the unsavory taste of the stamps and give the glue a pleasant flavor, especially that on stamps in the higher priced brackets. They are trying to come up with something more palatable and a bit less smelly than that which at present is made from the cartilage of long dead animals, and tastes and smells the part. Point seems to be to make people really like to lick stamps. The department might even get around to putting glue on the stamps that would sometimes cause them to stick securely to letters, post cards and parcels.

The department could even go a step further in reducing the postal deficit by creating more of a demand for the higher priced stamps. The lowly one-cent stamp could retain its present foul tasting glue which doesn't stick to anything at all. Then, the glue on three-cent stamps might be flavored with a little better quality of sticking. The glue on these stamps could come in a variety of common flavors such as licorice, cloves, etc. and of a quality which would let a larger number of the stamps stick to the mailing pieces.

The glue on the popular four-cent stamps might have flavors somewhat like that of present day chewing gum, and taste something like an adult lollipop,

if there be such an animal. On the higher priced stamps the glue might really get glorified and go all out after the customers' pennies. There might be flavors like strawberry, chocolate and lemon, not to mention butterscotch and maple, to coax the pennies out of unwary postal shoppers' pockets.

Glue on the real high priced stamps, such as the ten and twelve-cent numbers might even contain breath deodorants, reducing potions or headache remedies. These stamps then should sell like hot cakes.

The entire postal deficit might possibly be wiped out by the use of this new-fangled glue. As some wise acre once off handedly said, "there are more ways to kill a cat than choking it to death with butter." Or glue. Glue which taste bad and won't stick.

Respectful Safety Showing Governor Says Texas Made

Governor Price Daniel and the National Safety Council's district director, Don Hill of Dallas, reported that Texas scored "a very respectable 81 per cent in overall performance" in 1958, up four points from the previous year, "and produced a reduction of 14 per cent in the mileage death rate over the previous three-year average." The 1958 death toll of 2,342 persons was 8 per cent less than the 1957 total of 2,539.

Parents Of War Orphans Planning Schooling Now

Parents and guardians of youngsters eligible for further higher education under the War Orphans Education program should begin their planning now, P. J. Mims, Mgr. VA in Waco advised.

The young people, all between 13 and 18, are those who lost a parent through service-connected causes during World War I, WW II, or the Korean deal. They are just beginning or are in high school.

Mims said letters to parents and guardians noted that altho

the War Orphans program generally begins at 18, the time to start thinking about college is during the early years of high school. Therefore, he suggested the high school course should be planned "so that it will provide an adequate foundation for a program of education which may be pursued later."

Under the WOE program, VA pays an allowance of up to \$110 a month for each month of a student's education, to a maximum of 36 months. Young people may enroll in college or in vocational courses once they have passed the age of compulsory school attendance.

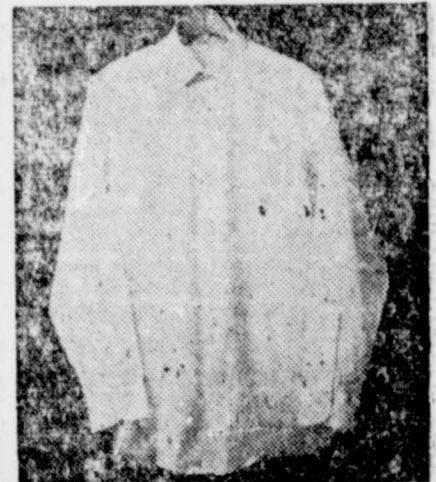

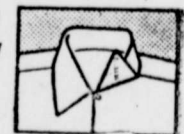
