**Fighting for Texas Tidelands Claims**

Gov. Price Daniel and Atty. Gen. Will Wilson head the team presenting Texas' claim that it owns the submerged lands for three leagues—or nearly 10 miles—into the Gulf. Federal attorneys argue that the state owns the land only three miles out.

Former Supreme Court Justice James P. Hart and J. Chrys Dougherty, a former assistant attorney general, also went to Washington to join in the presentation.

Other Gulf Coast states which are "in the same boat" with Texas on the tidelands issue are also participating in the now historic struggle.

Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro has been named to head the Governor's Conference on Aging.

This group will study problems of elderly people and take the state's report to the 1961 White House Conference on Aging.



## Joe P. Gibbs Again Appointed To Insurance Board

Joe P. Gibbs has, for the third time, been tapped to join the high command of the State Board of Insurance.

Gibbs was appointed by Gov. Daniel to succeed Board Member David B. Irons who will leave Nov. 1 to join a Dallas law firm. Irons said his resignation was not triggered by the Department's recent difficulties with the

Legislature which cut salaries of top officials.

Gibbs served as an insurance commissioner from 1941 to 1952 as an appointee of Govs. W. Lee O'Daniel and Beauford Jester. He served again from 1957 through February, 1958, after Gov. Daniel made appointments to an entirely new, reorganized board.

Other new appointees announced by Gov. Daniel are: To the State Finance Commission: Lacy Boggess of Fort Worth, W. B. Russell of De Kalb and Walter Taylor of Tuscola.

To the board of Texas Southern University: Dr. W. R. Banks of Prairie View.

To the Seed and Plant Board: Owen Gilbreath and Arthur Young of Lubbock, Emmett Harper of Martindale, Heino Staffel Jr. of Austin and C. B. Godbey of College Station.

As chief justice of the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals, Amarillo: James G. Denton of Lubbock. Howard Davison of Lubbock was named to serve Denton's unexpired term as judge of the 98th district court at Lubbock.

### National Guard General Gets Highest Honors

The top spot in the Army Natl. Guard was bestowed upon a Tex. Maj. Gen. Clayton P. Kerr of Dallas by Sec. of Army Wilbur Brucker recently. The announcement came as the 81st General Conference of the National Guard Assn of the US opened in San Antonio.

Gen. Kerr, present commanding general of the 49th (Long Star) Armored Division, will report to the Pentagon shortly to begin his four year tour of duty as the Asst. Chief for Army, of the National Guard Bureau.

U. S. farm output is running at record levels, up almost 1 per cent from 1958, but net farm income will probably decline more than a billion dollars from last year's total, Fortune magazine reported today.







# Battle Border



Little known facts about Texas boundaries.

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of articles outlining the numerous boundary conflicts dating back to 1716, pointing up little known facts which shaped the Texas of today.)

The first Texas-New Mexico boundary fight came close to going down in history as a shooting war between Texas and the United States.

"Texans were so mad they threatened secession and war," Attorney General Will Wilson said.

Wilson is right now fighting another battle for Texas boundaries—the tidelands suit before the Supreme Court of the United States.

Background for the Texas-New Mexico fight began with the 1819 treaty which settled the western

limits of the United States, establishing the eastern boundary of Texas at the Sabine River.

Many people at the time, including Thomas Jefferson, thought this a bad bargain.

They believed the boundary should be the Rio Grande.

As it turned out the treaty featured built-in headaches brought out later in an Oklahoma-Texas dispute.

In 1821, Mexico revolted from Spain, falling heir to the Spanish lands south and west of the United States. This included Texas up until 1836 when Texas won their independence at San Jacinto.

One of the first acts of the new Republic of Texas was to draw up a declaration of its boundaries, fixing three leagues in the

Gulf of Mexico, which is now being fought out in the tidelands case, and claiming the Rio Grande to its source in present day Colorado.

This gave Texas the eastern half of present New Mexico and a large part of southern Colorado.

U.S. Senator Thomas Hart Benton of Missouri voiced Mexico's complaint by saying the Texas boundary was "an act of unparalleled outrage on Mexico."

"It is a seizure of 2,000 miles of her territory without a word of explanation to her," he raged. Kingpin of Missouri politics, Benton used his rugged strength to fight Texas to the end—his end as it turned out to be.

In the 1844 Congress Benton successfully opposed a treaty

that would have admitted Texas to the Union. Six years later he shook Texas and disrupted Congress by introducing a bill to reduce Texas to 150,000 square miles (about the size of Montana) with the right to divide it into two states of 75,000 square miles each.

"This bitter stand on the Texas question eventually defeated Benton after he had served 30 years in the Senate," Wilson points out.

Wilson, who has an extensive library on Texas history, likes to quote a description of Benton.

"—all the Senate knew that Thomas Hart Benton was a rough and tumble fighter off and on the Senate floor—no longer with pistols but with stinging sarcasm. He himself was immune to the wounds of these political clashes from which his adversaries retired bleeding and broken. For his great ego and vigorous health had his thick skinned mentally as well as physically."

Wilson particularly likes this part.

"The leathery quality of his skin was in part the result of a daily brushing with a horse-hair brush—when asked if the brush was truly rough, Benton would roar: 'Why, sir, if I were to touch you with that brush, you would cry murder, sir!'"
