Everyone needs to get their 'house in order' if they expect things from the POP, and we suspect that the profession of teaching needs a little 'looking-glass' work we need, and we've already looked, and are continually trying to do something about it, and, believe you us, it's no push over, and we haven't gotten it done like we'd like it, much less the POP. Hang on, folks, believe we'll all work it out in time. Hope so!

Maybe it's like Kathleen W. Welch says (and we don't know who she is, but she's got the idea) "Why is it that an artist will step back from his etsel to take a fresh look at his painting, a man climb a tree to get his bearing when lost in the woods? Because he needs to get a perspective, a truer picture of what he is doing, of where he is going."

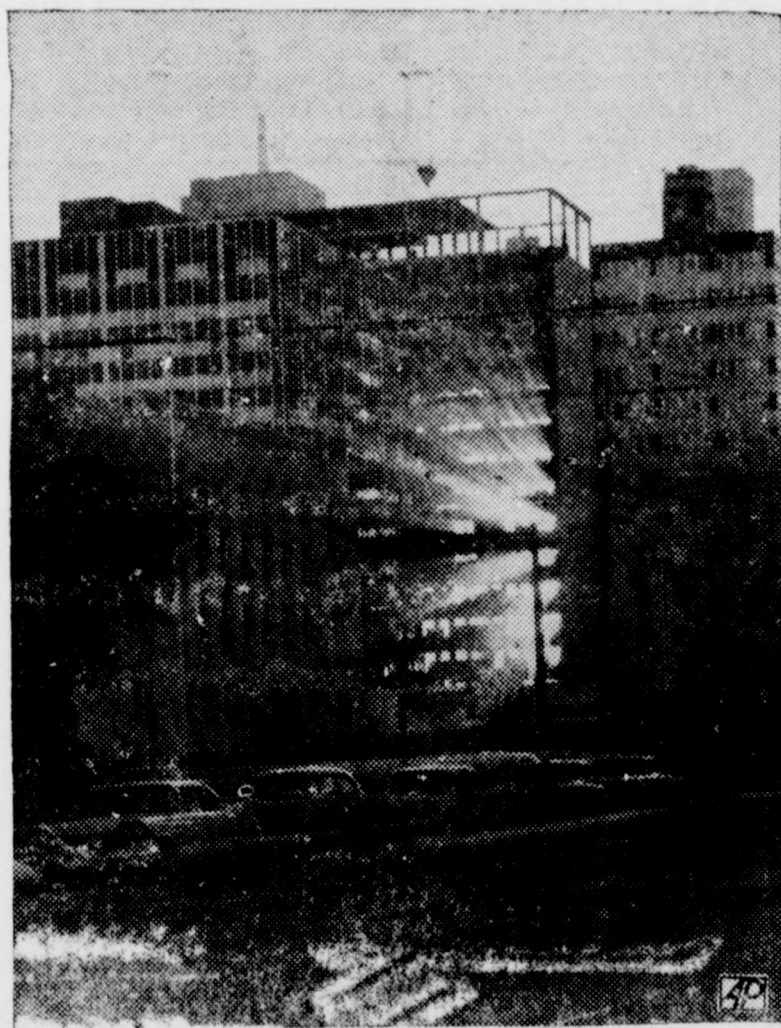

(Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of articles outlining the numerous boundary conflicts dating back to 1716, pointing up little known facts which shaped the Teas of today.)

In claiming the Rio Grande to its source in present day Southern Colorado, the Republic of Texas was faced with establishing possession.

Attorney General Will Wilson points out:

"Since possession is nine points of the law, the Texas weakness was its claim to a chunk of territory not occupied by settlers or patrolled by militia."

In the northwestern reaches of the Texas' claim was told Santa Fe.

"Lamar, President of the Republic of Texas, figured that if these people would consent to becoming Texans it would go a long way toward solving the problem of actual occupation," Wilson says.

The Attorney General is an authority on Texas history.

Out of Lamar's idea sprang the disastrous Santa Fe Expedition. The real purpose was to persuade the New Mexicans peacefully to accept and recognize the jurisdiction of the Republic of Texas.

Over 300 men, including traders and soldiers, left Brushy Creek near Austin.

"I have a goat ranch on Brushy

Creek and I cherish the old camp site which is on the site of Kinney's Fort about two miles east of present Round Rock," Wilson observes. The site is recorded by a marker erected by the school children of Williamson County.

They thought Santa Fe was only 500 miles away. It turned out to be 1300 miles in the long way the expedition traveled.

"Three months on the trail, Indian attacks, starvation, and poor leadership put Texans in New Mexico in no condition to defend themselves from the sudden appearance of the Mexican militia.

As captives they were marched 2,000 miles to Mexico City under the order "If one of them pretends to be sick or tired on the road, shoot him down and bring me his ears."

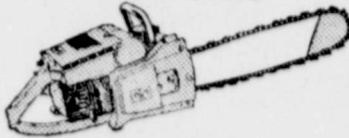
Forty Texans died on the march. Those who lived were put in the dark dungeon of Castle Perote and in other Mexican prisons with lepers and criminals.

News of the Texans' fate reached the United States in January, 1842. Enraged, the Texas Congress resolved to annex all of Chihuahua, Senora, New Mexico, Baja, and Alta California and parts of Tamaulipas, Coahuila, Durango and Sinaloa.

"They believed that if Teas was going to war with Mexico they might as well make it worth their

while," Wilson explains.

"Instead of fighting over half of New Mexico they would scrap over the whole hog. It is interesting to note that President Sam Houston vetoed the measure because he feared it would be taken as a bit of legislative horseplay."

Congress, however, immediately passed it over his veto.

Texans wanted war but had no money, troops, or equipment.

The failure of the Santa Fe expedition left the Republic of Texas with no possession of the disputed part of present day New Mexico and Colorado.

The next two articles will describe the sale of this territory by Texas.

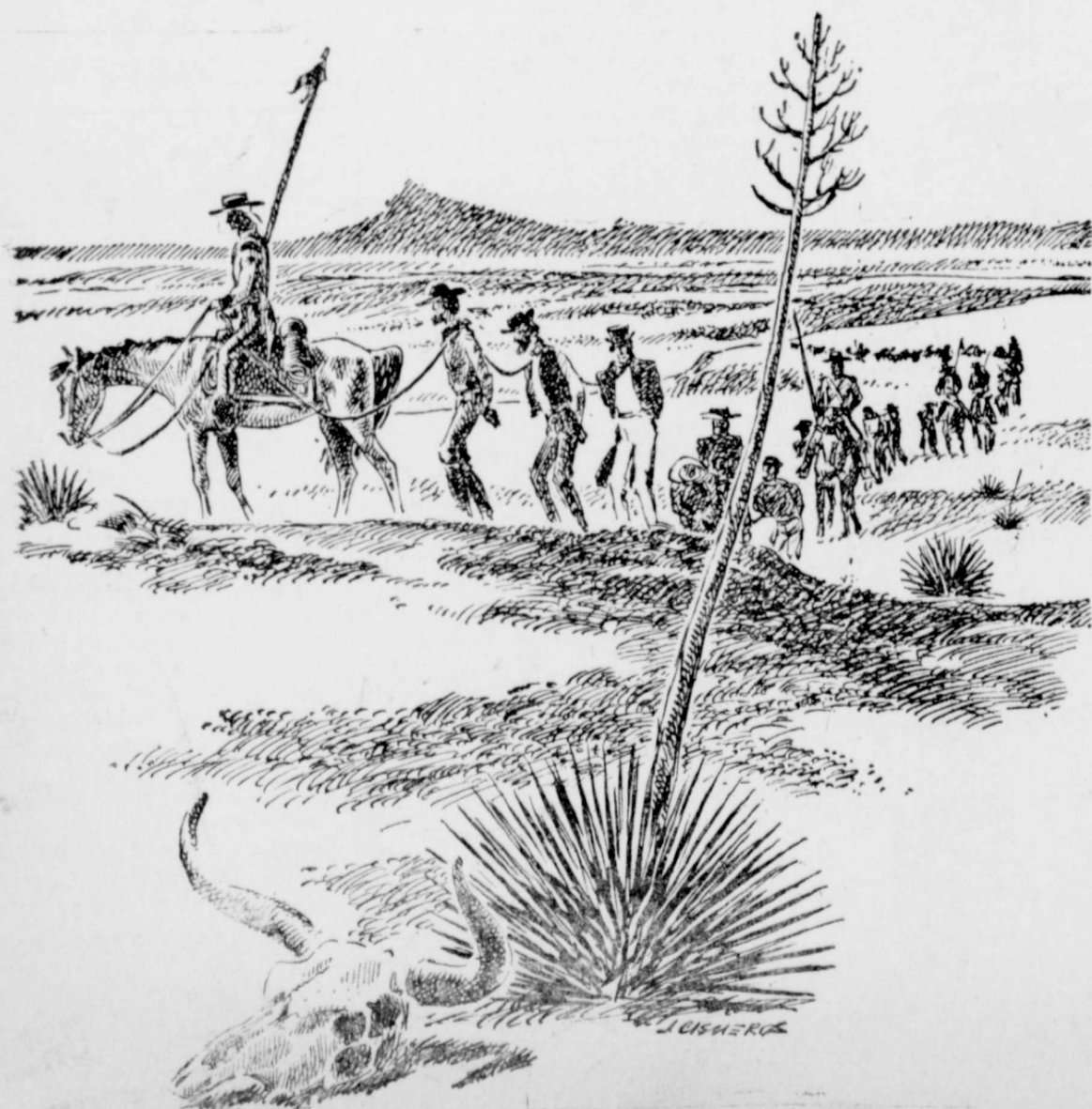

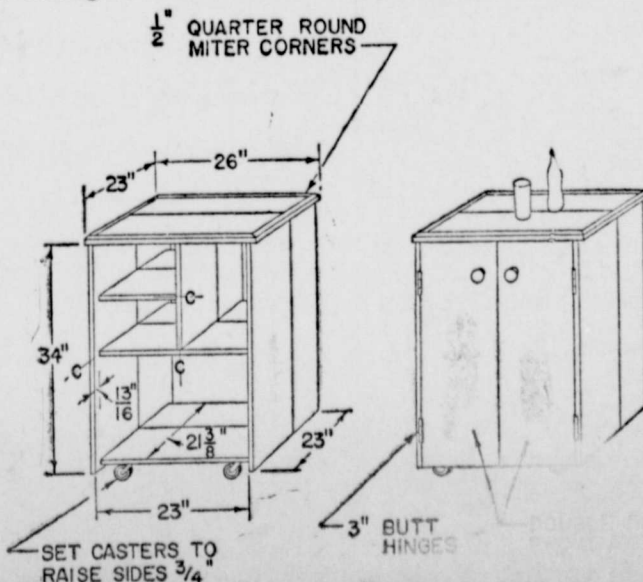
HERE'S HOW.

Make A Portable Bar

A portable bar provides more time for a hostess to spend with guests. Refreshments can be rolled to within easy access. Each side is made of two pieces of 1 by 12-inch lumber. The shelves and divider are made of two pieces of 1 by 12 edge-glued and ripped to a width of 21 1/2 inches. The top, also of 1 by 12's is 25 inches long. Assemble the pieces with glue and 10-penny finishing nails. Position the top with an overhang on the ends and at-

tach to the sides with 8-penny finishing nails. Half-inch quarter-round moulding is then fastened in place with brads.

Make each door of 1 by 12-inch lumber. Plane the door panels 1/16 inch each thus providing clearance for opening and closing. Hang the doors, placing the hinges 3 inches in from the ends of the door panels. Recess the hinges. Friction catches, door pulls, and casters complete the project.

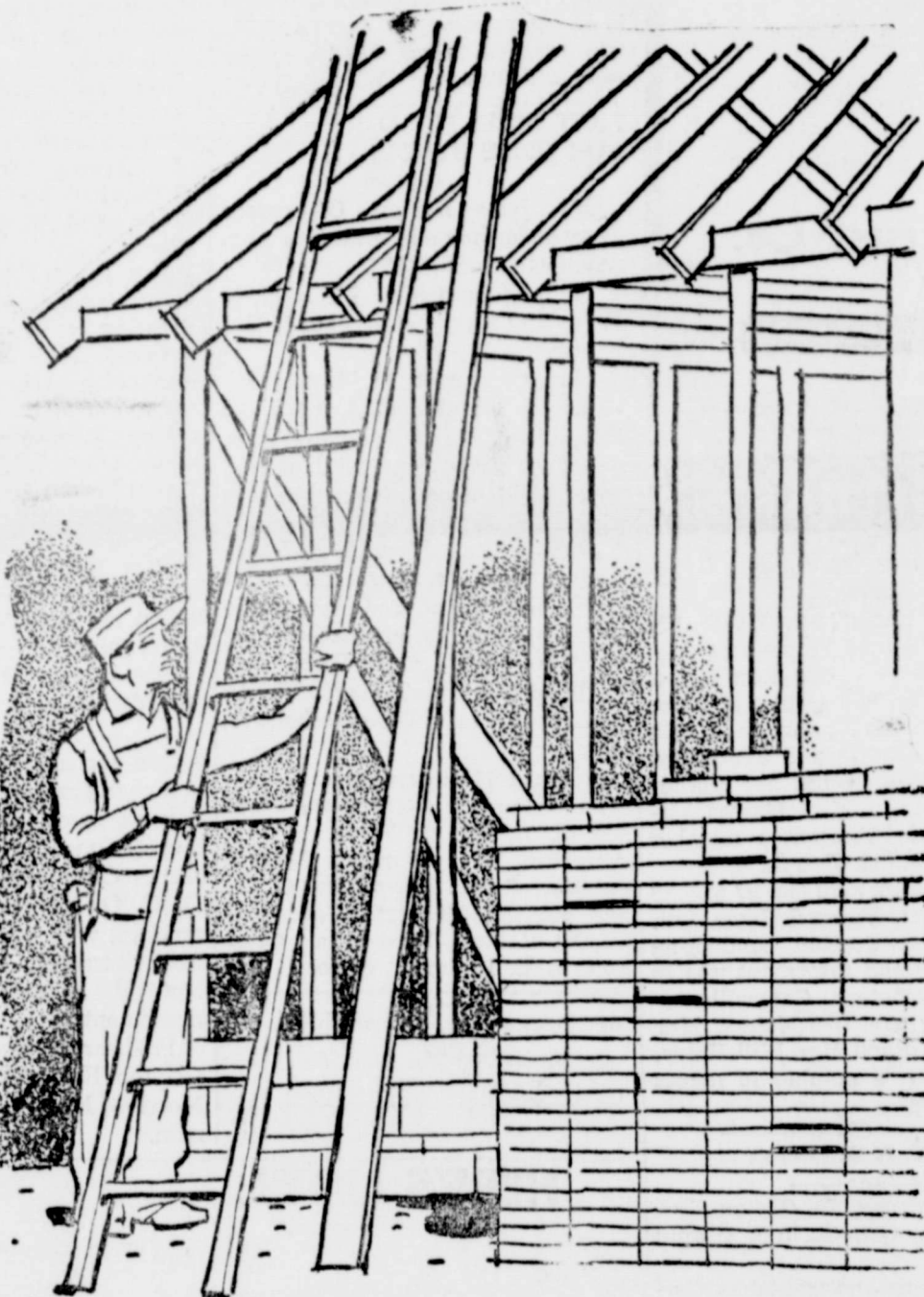

TEXAS CPA GIVES AID TO COLLEGE TEACHERS

Texas taxpayers of tomorrow should file the most accurate Federal income tax returns to date, according to Gregg C. Waddill of Houston. Waddill is chairman of the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountant's committee on cooperation with educational institutions.

"Texas CPA's 3,000 strong, will help—when possible—high school and college teachers in 1,500 Texas schools, give Internal Revenue Service's Teaching Taxes course" Waddill said

Two Federal tax courses are available: a general course for city students, another for their farming and ranching cousins. Teaching taxes kits may be ordered, without charge, from the Internal Revenue district offices in either Austin or Dallas.

Marketing Quota, Acreage Allotments Set For 1960

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson has proclaimed a national marketing quota of 13,133,000 bales (standard bales of 500 pounds gross weight) and a national acreage allotment of 16 million acres for the 1960 crop of upland cotton.

He set Decmeer 15 as the date for the referendum on 1960 upland cotton marketing quotas, which must be approved by at least two-thirds of the upland cotton farmers if the quotas are to be effective.

The secretary also announced that Choice "B" farm allotments for the 1960 crop of upland cotton will be 40 per cent

larger than the regular Choice "A" allotments for the same farms. The 40 per cent increase in upland cotton acreage permitted for 1960, providing marketing quotas are in effect for the crop, is the same as was in effect for 1959.

Cotton Surplus

A national marketing quota and a national acreage allotment for upland cotton must be proclaimed for the following year if the secretary finds that the total supply of upland cotton for the current marketing year exceeds the normal supply.

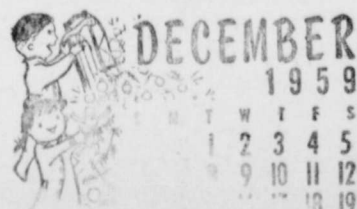

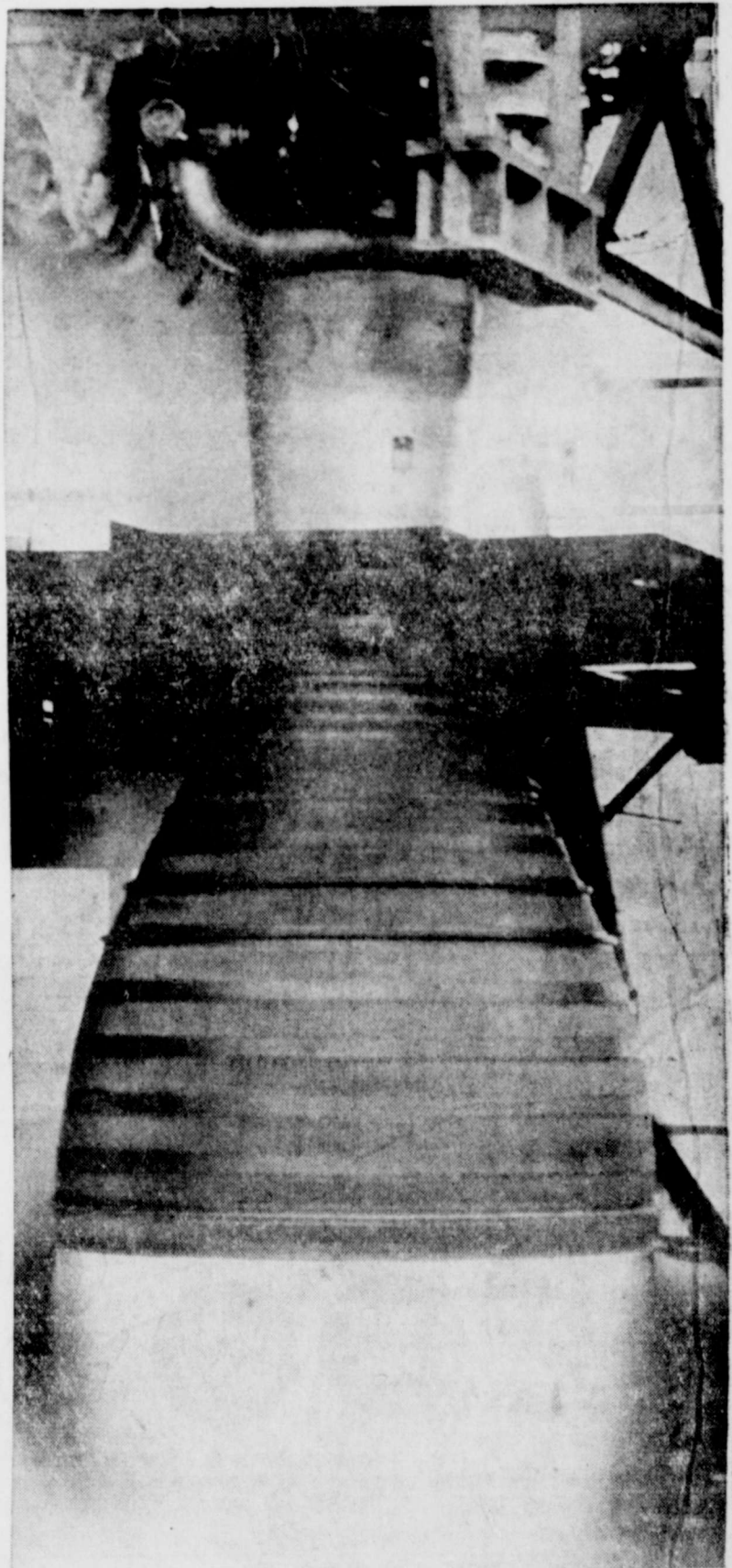

I was born in Coryell County, Texas, the 3rd of November, 1883. I am the sixth child of J. M. and M. M. Russell. I am of the Irish descent.

I would make mud pies for my cooking. We would have houses of our own, so that we could visit each other.

I started to school at the age of nine years. My first teacher's name was Mollie Pace. I thought there was no one so good as Miss Mollie. I studied the first reader and primer speller. The next school I studied the second reader and speller. Our teacher was a Mr. Stones. He was not a very good teacher and his school was the only school that I ever quit in my life. I did not go more than a month to his school. The third school I went to was taught by G. A. Daniels. He was a very good
