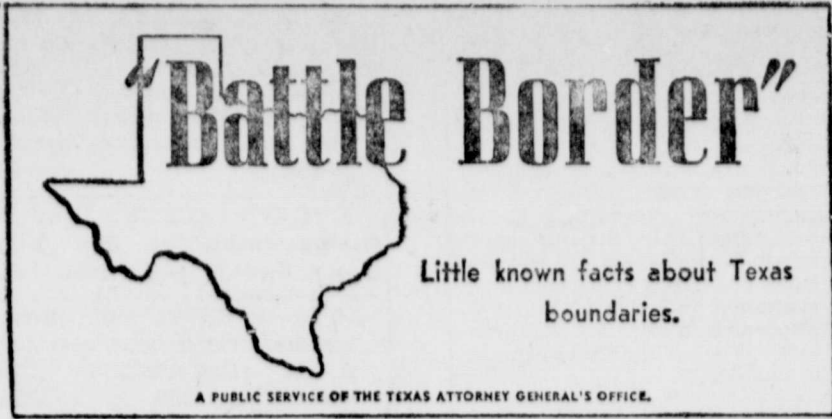

Gannett ran the line once again marking it with monuments, from the south bank of the south fork of the Red River to the northern most Texas boundary.

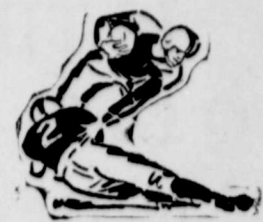

Editor's note: This is the sixth in a series of articles outlining the numerous boundary conflicts dating back to 1716, pointing up little known facts which shaped the Texas of today).

In 1890 Congress created the Territory of Oklahoma out of a portion of the Indian Territory which was bounded on the west and south by Texas.

In the same breath it directed that a law suit be filed in the U.S. Supreme Court to settle the controversy as to who owned Greer County, Texas.

In March, 1896, the Supreme Court ruled that the Treaty of 1819 called for TRUE 100th meridian as the boundary line and not the surveyor's mistake. The court specified the south bank of the south fork.

This last seems to have gone unnoticed at the time but it did evoke howles of anguish when big

oil money was at stake.

In 1901 Congress authorized another attempt to pin down the meandering meridian and several surveys followed.

"The area was rapidly taking on the aspects by the different surveyors," Wilson notes.

In 1906 Oklahoma was admitted as a state and a new face and voice was added to the dispute.

WASHINGTON AND SMALL BUSINESS

The Justice Dept. has embarked upon what could be an anti-trust case of major importance.

A Federal grand jury in Kansas City, Mo., has returned an indictment against National Dairy Products Corporation of New York, charging 15 counts of violations of the Robinson-Patman Act.

According to the indictment, National is the largest dairy corporation in the world, with activities embracing four continents. Whether this is true or not is immaterial, as National is assuredly one of the big three of four in the United States.

In the past few years, those who seek to build a monopoly on a sure thing have been very active in the dairy field. For milk is an essential for which there is no substitute, especially for children and babies.

At a time when the nation's baby crop has hit the highest peak in national history, the number of dairies keeps decreasing with many areas now being served without service from an independent dairy.

In the pending case in Kansas City, it is charged that a large segment of the Missouri market is completely controlled by National, which forces its own distributors to sell milk to retailers at prices designed to drive independents out.

In commenting on the charge that National is selling milk in the Kansas City market at unreasonably low prices to destroy competition, Robt. Rieks, National Federation of Independent Business acting assistant attorney general in charge of the anti-trust division, says "The type of predatory and illegal conduct charged in this indictment is particularly deplorable because its impact falls directly upon small businessmen. If the alleged predatory conditions long continued they would make it impossible for small competitors of the defendant to remain in business."

The indictment states that National is using profits from other marketing areas to carry on this nefarious price war in Missouri and once National destroys competition, the prices will be advanced to exorbitant levels.

This, of course, is a classic monopolist's plan. Thus, while Missouri consumers may be getting milk at a big bargain today, once National succeeds in locking the door, they will pay dear for milk.

What makes this situation so deplorable is that here is an alleged attempt by a monopoly minded corporation to make war on babies . . . on babies present and yet unborn.

Thus, a milk monopoly is perhaps the worst kind, as it makes war on infants unable to fight back. But that is perhaps the reason why there is so much activity in mergers, and other monopolist's strategy.

This case by Justice Dept. is bound to be watched with great interest all over the nation.

After all, the disposition of this case might well form a pattern that will set the pattern of the dairy industry for a long time to come.

Independent businessmen, farmers, consumers, and yes, even babies, will be watching the outcome of this case.

The farmer who fails to use the best of the new beef "miracles" in his feeding program this winter will fall behind his competition. The science of wonder drugs for beef began just five years ago when stilbestrol hormones proved that they could speed up gains and cut down on feed use. Just 10 milligrams of stilbestrol, as much as as a green hold on the head of a pin, adds a third of a pound of beef to a steer each day.

Since the discovery of stilbestrol, experiment stations have been frantically testing other products to see if they would increase gains and save feed. Now feeding experts are saying that a farmer can't afford to feed cattle unless he makes full use of additives.

According to a Massey-Ferguson roundup report on additive res, stilbestrol and the antibiotic Aureomycin and Terramycin are the most reliable drugs a feeder can use. Stilbestrol has the best record. It has been tested at 29 experiment stations over a period of 5 years. The average results were 18% increase in gains and 12% saving in feed.

The highest boost in gains from stilbestrol has come when it is fed with high grain rations. But most specialists also recommend stilbestrol for cattle on grass or high roughage rations.

When you are not feeding a supplement, the easiest way to supply stilbestrol is to implant 24 to 36 mg. in the ear of each animal. Research results with implants has been as good as with feeding.

Antibiotics speed gains about 9% on high roughage rations and 4 to 5% on high grain rations. The best use of a antibiotic team them up with stilbestrol. Antibiotics add their own gains and above stilbestrol and improve the meat.

In 29 experiments where they were compared, stilbestrol boosted gains 9% and stilbestrol alone 12%. When the two additives were teamed up, gains shot

 A method of screwworm eradication which has proven highly effective in the Southeastern states is now being quietly studied for its possible application to pink boll worm control.
 The method is based on the release of billions of screwworm

flies which have been rendered sterile for reproduction by exposure to radio-active cobalt. Since July, 1958, more than two and three quarter billion sterile flies have been turned loose over nearly 25,000 square miles in Florida and parts of Alabama and Georgia. It has been amply demonstrated that sterile male flies mating with native female flies produce eggs

which do not hatch, thus eventually obliterating the species. The program has proven so effective that officials have reported that no cases of screwworms have been found in Florida since June 17, and no cases have occurred in South Carolina, Georgia or Alabama this year. In this same area the average of reported cases used to run about 40,000 a month. Now the possibilities in the release of sterile, male pink boll worms are being investigated. Tests are in progress to determine

the amount of irradiation needed to sterilize pink boll worm larvae, pupae and adults

If this method of control is found to be feasible, as has been the case in the screwworm eradication program, it will require the rearing of millions of pink boll worms in the laboratory. A synthetic diet for the pink boll worm already has been found. The problem now is to develop a technique for rearing the cotton pest on a mass-production basis.

Another phase of the screwworm control program in the Southeast is now under way, to determine its effectiveness on a long-range basis following discontinuance of sterile fly dispersal. The distribution of sterile flies was discontinued in the southern part of Florida last July 25 and no screwworms have since been discovered in that area in spite of intensive new surveys and inspections.
