**ARE AGRICULTURAL
SURPLUSES REAL?**

There is so much talk and so much alarm spread about the bil-

lions of dollars U.S. taxpayers now have invested in agricultural surpluses through farm price supports that many of our people fail to recognize that surpluses are a relatively small part of total farm output.

In recent years these surpluses have represented only five to eight per cent of annual production.

Now as to those billions of dollars U.S. taxpayers have tied up in agricultural surpluses: In the 25 years from 1933 to 1958, farm price support losses have cost the taxpayers \$5,173,788, an average of about \$200 million—NOT billions—per year.

In the same period of time, the House Committee on Appropriations has reported, BUSINESS reconversion payments by the government in tax allowances, tax adjustments, tax rebates and many other types of so-called "reconversion payments" have amounted to \$43,362,000,000 — more than eight times as much.

In the same period of time, the House Committee on Appropriations has reported, business reconversion payments by the government in tax allowances, tax adjustments, tax rebates and many other types of so-called "reconversion payments" have amounted to \$36,262,000,000 more than eight times as much.

In one ten-year period, from 1926 to 1966, mail and postoffice subsidies alone amounted to \$6,968,000,000, more than farm price support losses for the entire 26 years. In the 20 years from 1938 through 1967, subsidies to maritime organizations to keep U.S. ships sailing the seas cost the taxpayers \$2,600,000,000.

It must always be born in mind that the \$6.8 billion dollars the government now has invested in farm surplus products on hand, mainly wheat, corn and cotton, can by no means be written off as a loss. The stocks are in storage, most of them will finally be sold, and experience has demonstrated that the eventual rate of recovery will be relatively high.

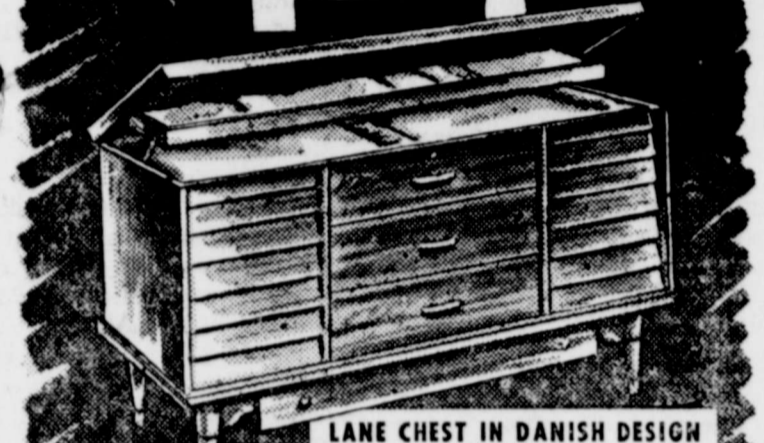

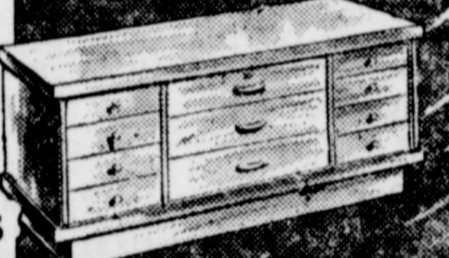

From 1920 to 1940, production on all farm products rose about one-fifth, while land in cultivation stayed the same and farm employment dropped almost a fifth.

In the 20 years since 1940 we have raised our total agricultural output by more than half. Farm employment has fallen by one-third. Farm output per man-hour has doubled.

With all this, the fact remains that in recent years our farm surpluses have represented only

five to eight per cent of annual production. This means the most of the increase in farm output achieved during the past 20 year has been vitally necessary production — production we had to have to meet the requirements of our fast growing and generally prosperous population.

Population experts are now projecting this growth in population to forecast a total of some 230 million people in the U.S. by 1976 nearly double the population of 1920.

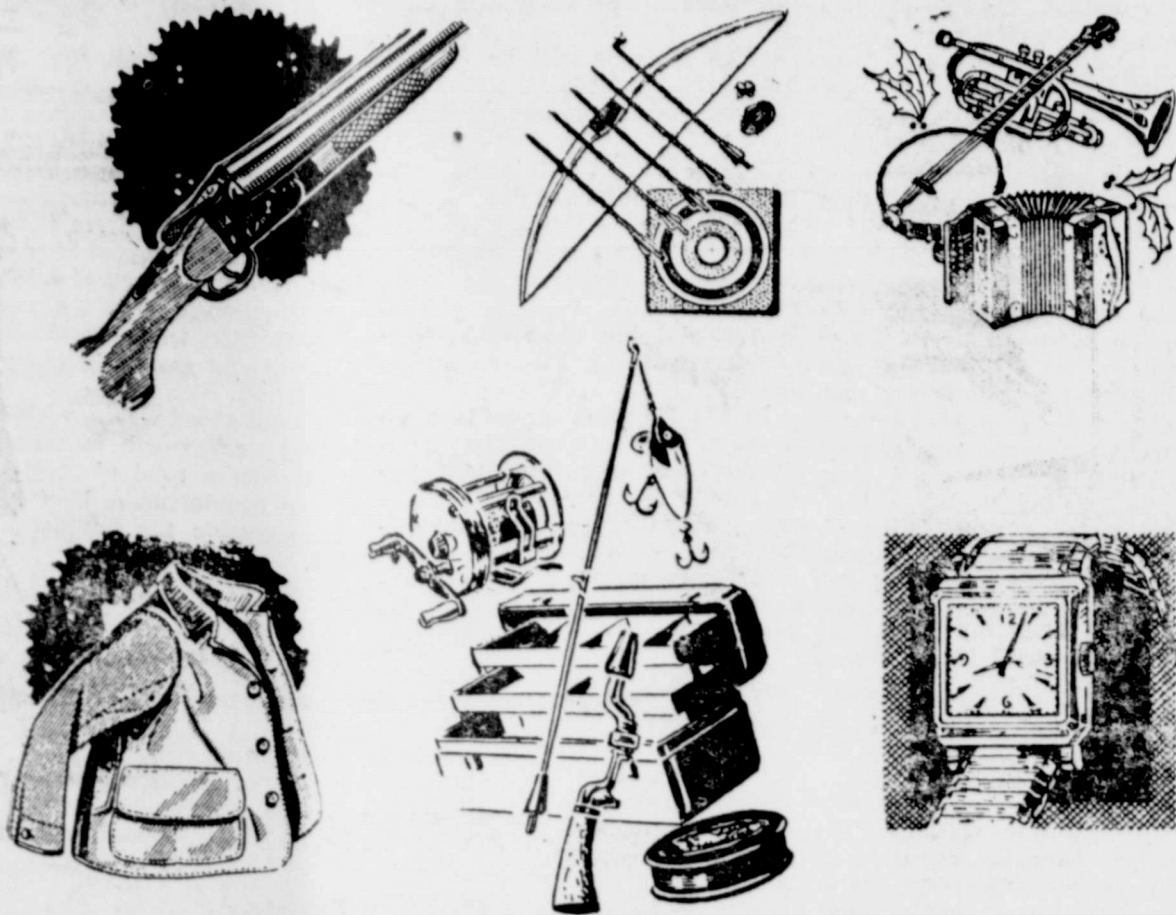

man or the late Jimmie Allred as federal district judge.

Daniel said he had great respect for the judiciary, but whether as public official or private citizen, he wouldn't want to be sidelined from the fight for "progress, good government and fair taxation."

He would not say that he would not run for governor or lieutenant governor.

BOTTLE CLUBS UNDER FIRE—For years Texas law against selling liquor by the drink has been no hindrance to the thousands who belong to the "bottle clubs."

Serving of mixed drinks to members and guests of private clubs was assumed to be the

same as serving liquor in the home.

But the thing has gotten out of hand, says Liquor Control Board Chairman Coke Stevenson Jr. He said there are many clubs selling drinks that are not private, nonprofit clubs but are operated like business concerns to make money.

Stevenson and Atty. Gen. Will Wilson have announced a statewide drive to close up the illegal clubs. Proposed new laws also are being drafted to define clearly what sort of club is legal. Present law neither bans nor recognizes "bottle clubs."

Private bars got started in the swank cuntry clubs, then sprang up over the state in business and

professional clubs. Individuals then started their own social clubs. It is the latter—the public "clubs"—which are charged with violating the law.

ADOPTION CASE CLOSED—State Supreme Court has made final its ruling in a case that some say may cause uncertain-

ties in the legal procedure for adoption of babies of unwed mothers. It upheld the decision of a lower court in returning to its natural mother a child she had previously agreed to have adopted.

State Department of Public

Welfare had requested a re-hearing in the case. Atty. Gen. Will Wilson, representing the department, said the ruling might result in more "black marketing" of babies.

STATE RELIEF DROPS—As more people become eligible for social security, the number of Texans seeking old age pensions is decreasing.

State Department of Public Welfare reported the number of old age pensioners dropped by 1,426 in the past fiscal year. Number of Texans receiving aid through the Welfare Department was 225,112 only about two thirds of the number getting social security checks.

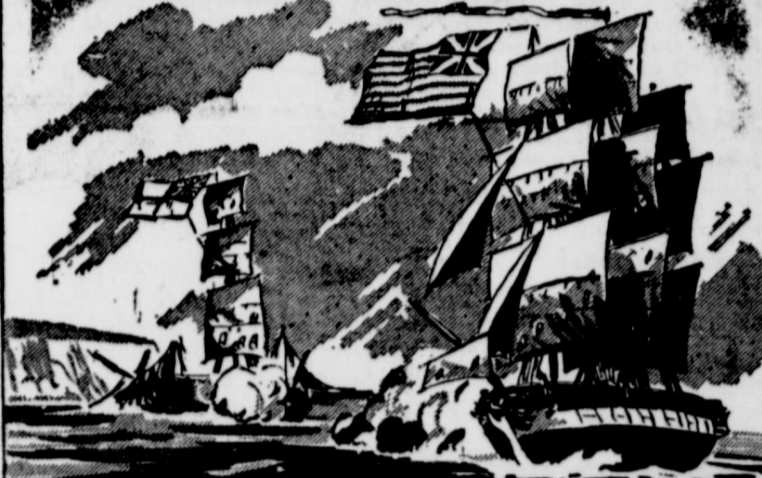

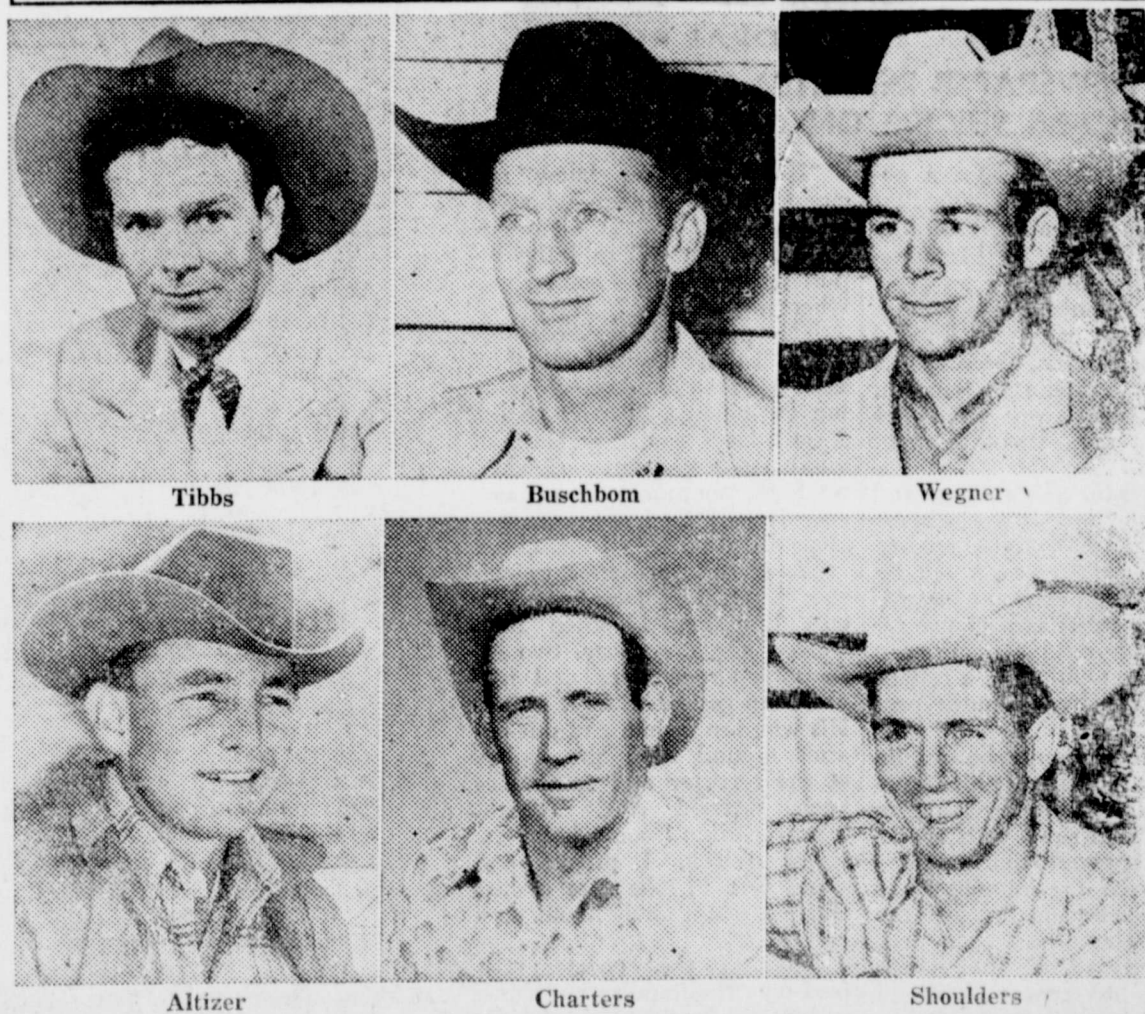

NEWSPAPER REPORTER SAVES A WOULD-BE SUICIDE ON CHRISTMAS EVE

It was Christmas Eve. A police reporter on the *Seattle Post Intelligence* of Seattle, Washington, was sitting at his typewriter when suddenly an overwhelming impulse came to him. Not knowing why, he hurried to Pioneer Square, three blocks away, just in time to knock a loaded pistol away from the head of a man about to shoot himself.

A cold rain was falling, and the gun slid across the glistening grass. Everything seemed so unreal that the reporter felt he was enacting a strange drama. Across the street at a glance he noticed the time shown by a clock in the window of a restaurant. It was five minutes past seven.

Just a few minutes before, he had been sitting at his typewriter. Now here he was in Seattle's "skid row" with a man he had just saved from death.

Where did the impulse come from that sent him out into the dreary night? What had sent him directly to the spot where a human being was about to hurl himself into eternity?

"How did you know my name?" asked the man, who was sobbing.

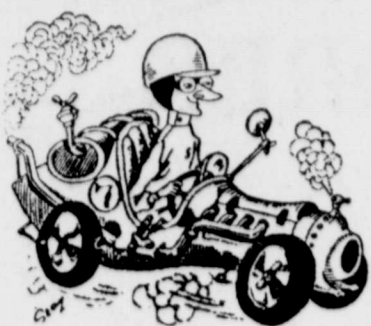
"I don't know," said the reporter, "but let's go somewhere where we can talk."

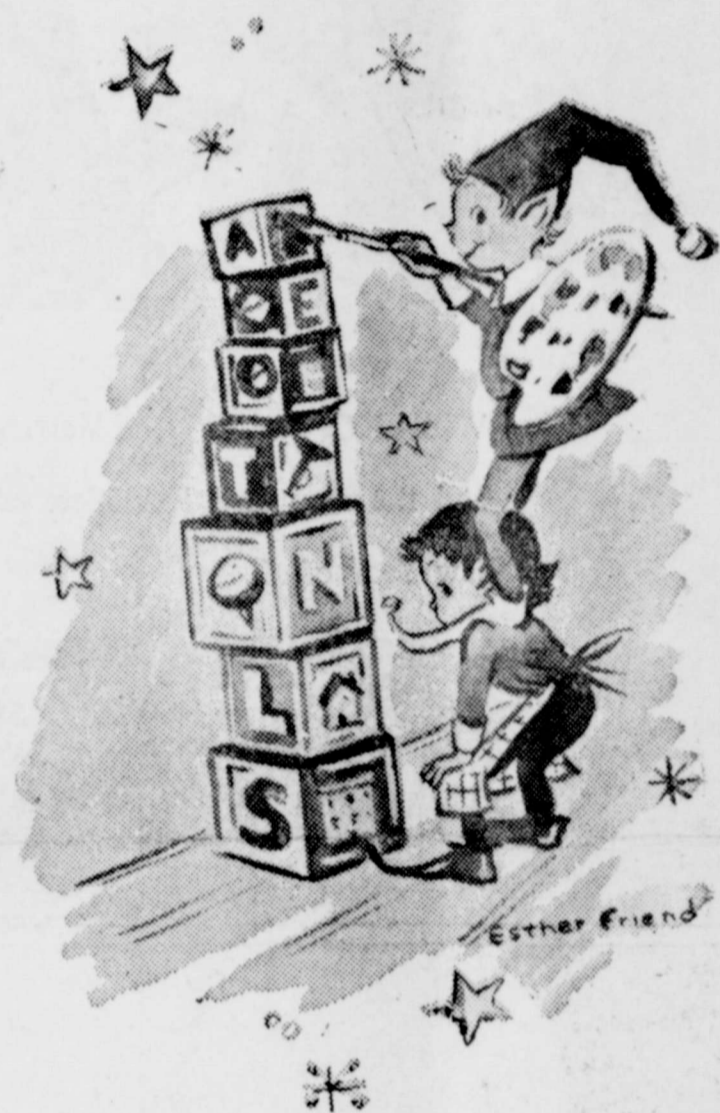

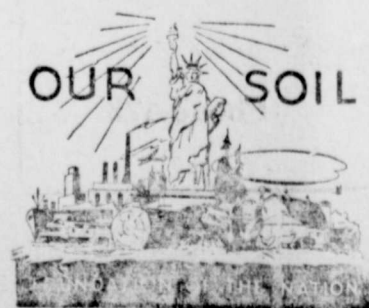

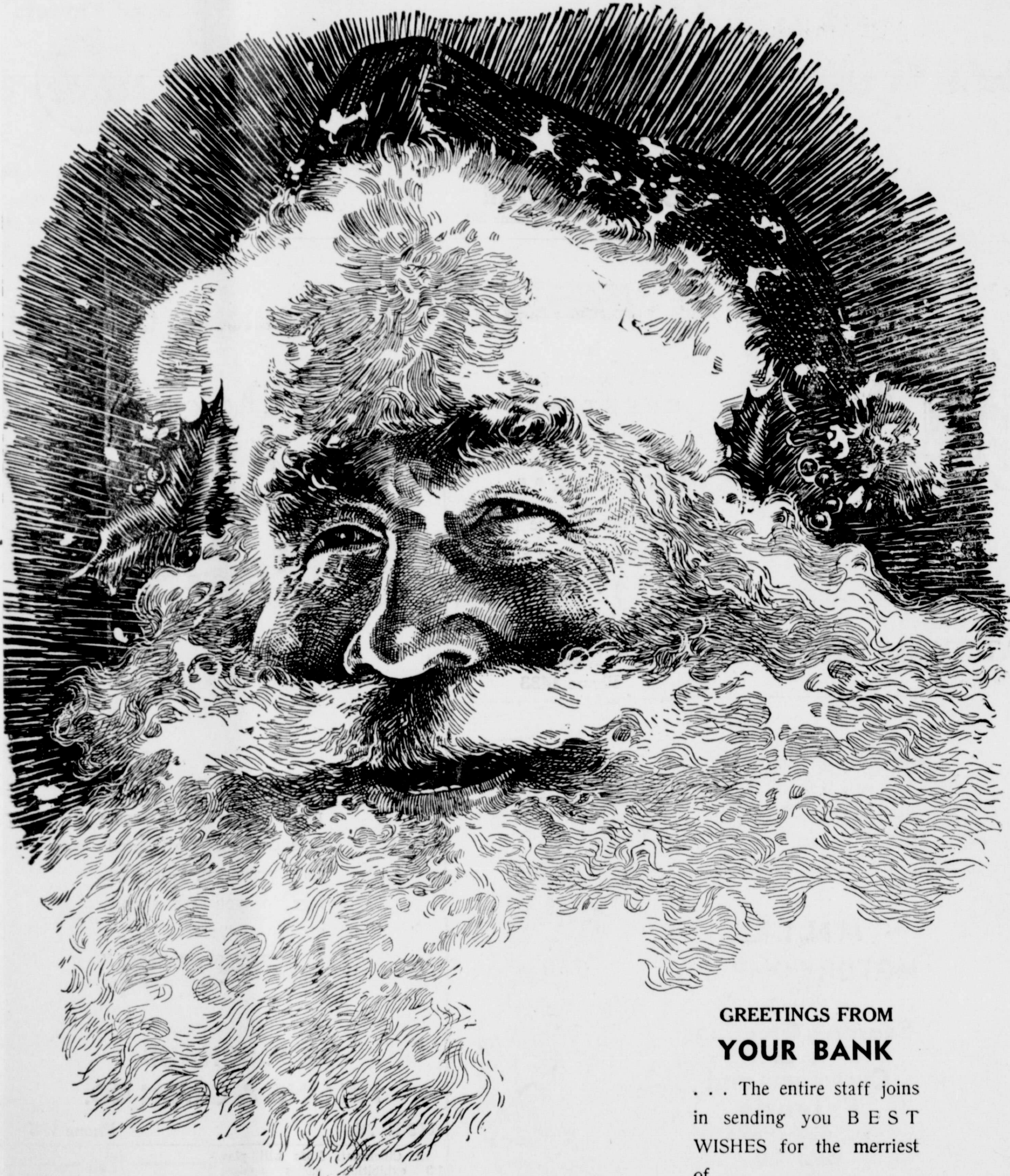

"Ninety-nine times out of 100 hunting accidents are caused by carelessness. A cardinal rule of the hunter is to carry a loaded gun in the car."

DETROIT, MICH., DETROIT-ER: "Every once in awhile someone takes a crack at trying to come up with a word picture of the size of the national debt that can be imagined. Latest one is by Rep. Some Thoughts About Having A Safe Holiday

There are "do" and "don't" rules for every season of the year, and Christmas is no exception. In fact, Christmas is such a happy time that we are likely to be a little less careful about the possibility of accidents than we are at other times of the year.

Here are some suggestions for an accident-free holiday season:

Do not use any cotton, paper or flammable material for decorating the tree or around the base of the tree. Do not place electric trains or other electric powered devices around the tree because metallic tinsel can fall across the track, cause a short circuit and start the train transformer to burn.

Safe Toys

Avoid toys operated with flammable liquids. Nitrocellulose (it looks like celluloid or plastic) toys burn with surprising ferocity. Some imported toys are made of these flammable materials.

Select electrical appliance gifts with fire-safety in mind. Choose only those electrical toys and tree-decorative lighting sets which are laboratory approved. If there is doubt, ask your Fire Department if they are approved.

Never place lighted candles in windows. Sentiment and flame do not mix! Keep the curtains or any other flammable material at windows pulled back at least 6 inches from any electric candles or wreaths.

Fire Hazards

As you unwrap gifts on Christmas Day, put all the wrappings in a carton and dispose of them promptly. Don't let them pile up around the tree, the fireplace, or any heating device.

Christmas costumes and paper or cloth decorations can be flame-proofed by dipping them into the following solution, wringing them by hand and allowing them to dry: 3 quarts water, 7 oz. borax, 3 oz. boric acid.

Outdoor Decorations Are Very Popular

Decorating outdoor trees and shrubbery with brightly-colored lights is becoming more and more an American tradition, but while outdoor lighting is attractive and colorful, it is also dangerous and may cause damage to trees and greenery.

Bulbs of 15 wattage are sufficient for use in outdoor lighting arrangements. Electrical fixtures should be of the weatherproof variety, specially designed for outdoor use, and the lights should always be placed so that they do not touch the needles.

Spruce, pines and firs, if they are not too large, are ideal for outdoor Yuletide lighting displays, although other varieties such as hemlock, yew, boxwood and aborvitae are more sensitive to heat and easily scorched if caution is not used.

Selection of Proper Toys Important

There is no hard and fast rule by which one can tell the exact toy for a certain age child, but some toys are better than others for children at different ages. Also, the toys you select can turn a happy holiday into a time of needless tragedy if you do not exercise caution in your selection.

Sharp toys or poorly constructed toys are the ones that cause the most accidents. Avoid them. Generally children from infancy to two years like bright-colored, lightweight toys of various shapes. They should be washable, too big to swallow, and free from rough edges.

Toddlers from two to four years want push and pull toys. Trucks and cars big enough to straddle and push, wagons, wheelbarrows, small doll carriages, peg-boards and pounding sets are also good for this age group.

Take your time in the selection of toys for children of all ages and it will make for a happier, healthier and safer holiday.

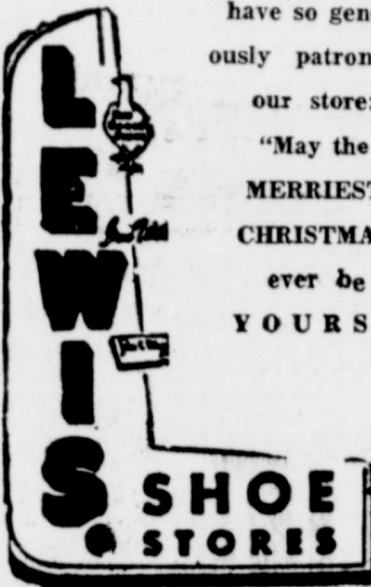

**Porcupine Balls
for Christmas**

Making porcupine balls for Christmas decorating can be fun. Here's what you need: bottle corks, 8- to 10-inch lengths of string, a darning needle, pointed cocktail toothpicks, a waxed lunch bag, a half-pint of white paint and artificial snowflakes.

First, draw the string through the cork with the needle and tie it around the cork, making a hook. Then insert the toothpicks into the cork so that all sides are covered, giving a porcupine effect. Drop the ball into a large waxed lunch bag containing paint and shake until the ball is well covered with paint.

Shake the drippings off the ball and remove from the bag. Let set for a few minutes before sprinkling with snow or glitter.

Put the balls in a safe place to dry—allowing at least 18 to 24 hours.

**Hawaiian Nut Bread
(Makes 1 loaf)**

- 2 eggs
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup melted shortening
- 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 1 cup crushed canned pineapple (do not drain)

Beat eggs and sugar together; add shortening. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add dry ingredients to first mixture and blend. Add nuts and pineapple. Stir just enough to combine. Pour batter into a greased 4x8-inch loaf pan. Bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven for one hour. Let loaf cool thoroughly before slicing.
