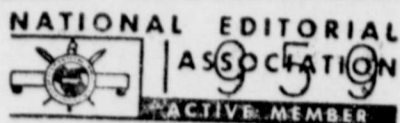

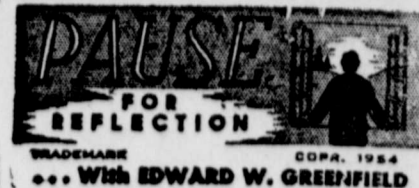

By The Skin of Our Teeth

It is not often that a book with so many satisfactions for conservatives and barbs for liberals is admitted to the best-seller lists. Perhaps it's because Allen Drury's ADVISE AND CONSENT confines itself largely to a single, still-fluid issue that it broke the liberal's "silence barrier."

In any case, this top-drawer novel makes terrific reading, presenting so intimate and authentic a view of official Washington that it can be read for that alone. After the slow-moving first hundred pages, the other 500 sweep you along like a jet.

You will understand many things when the book is done, both the glory and the shame, both the integrity and betrayals of America, with the glory of winning, but by so slim a margin that destiny could easily tip the other way.

It's the precariousness of the balance that frightens the thoughtful observer. A few votes here, the wrong man in a key post there, the timidity or neglect of a "good citizen" someplace else, and the ship of state could sink. We're still afloat by "the swin of our teeth."

The question implied in Drury's novel is therefore this: Is your weight being cast on the side of freedom, integrity, and honor, or the opposite. Are you a part of the answer or of the problem. In the balance for freedom are you a heavyweight or "a negligible quality"?

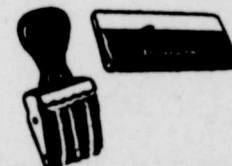
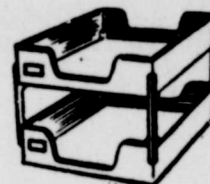

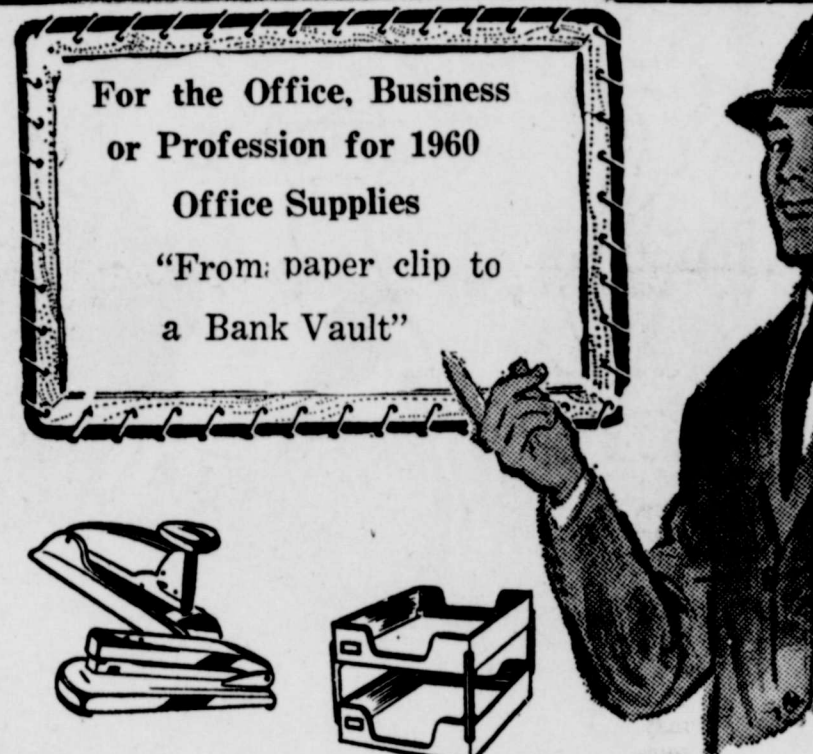

**Production Up, Income Down**

So now we come to the end of one of the best production years Texas agriculture ever had—but net farm income is dropping down a full 15 per cent below 1958.

The 1959 Texas cotton crop is estimated at around 4,500,000 bales, compared with 4,308,000 bales in 1958. Sorghum grain production is figured at about 277,000,000 bushels for 1959, a little up from the 273,066,000 bushels harvested in 1958.

Rice production for the year is running at 13,136,000 hundred weight, against 11,938,000 cwt. in 1958. The corn is due to exceed 41,366,000 bushels, also up from 1958. The Rio Grande Valley is well under way with at least a nine million box citrus season, up two million from 1958 and the first real bumper since the disastrous freeze in 1951.

Ranges and livestock in general are in their best condition in the past 10 years. There were an estimated 8,510,000 cattle on Texas ranges at the beginning of the year, along with 5,355,000 sheep, and there are more now.

But cotton is the cheapest for any December in a decade. Corn is bringing \$1.12 a bushel, compared with \$1.21 a year ago. Over-

production and cheapness of corn is going to have its effect on the vital Texas sorghum grain market—if not this year, certainly next year. Livestock markets, seldom robust and always highly sensitive, are showing signs of weakening in the face of heavy production.

There is a drastic squeeze in the parity ratio—in relation to the prices they pay, the prices received by the farmers in 1959 are the lowest in 19 years. The farmer's share of each dollar spent by the consumer has dropped to 38 cents, lowest since 1942. The most authoritative sources agree that farm income is due to fall somewhat lower next year—in other words, things are liable to get worse before they get any better.

About the only flat statement concerning the U. S. farm problem on which you can get anywhere near unanimous agreement is this: Something is wrong. Try to go any further than that and you are likely to learn at first hand just how controversial this farm problem can become.

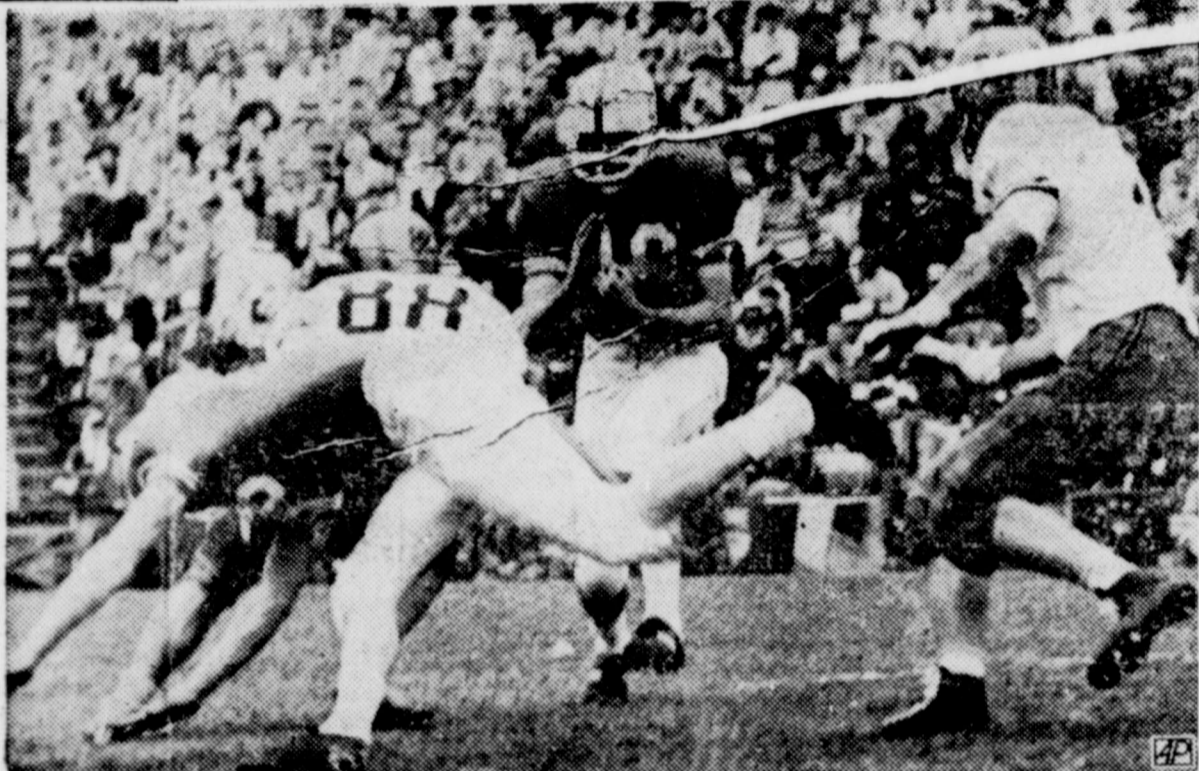
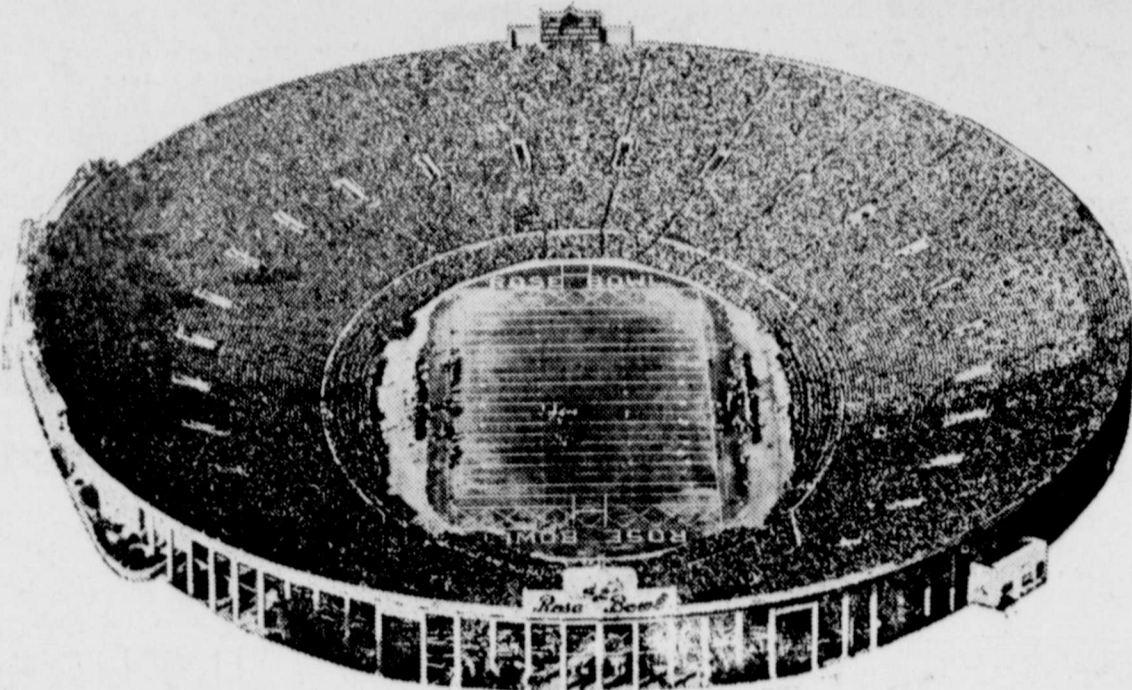
**ALIENS MUST REPORT  
FOR JANUARY**

January is the month aliens must report their addresses on forms that will be available here at the main postoffice and all postoffice stations. They will have the entire month to file and any alien who willfully violates the address report requirement may be fined up to \$200, jailed for 30 days and deported. All non-citizens, except those with diplomatic status, foreign representatives of certain international organizations and those admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers are required to report.
