CATTLE PRODUCERS TO MEET JAN. 14 ON BRUCELLOSIS

There will be a meeting of all cattle producers of Coryell County on Thursday night at the county courthouse, district court room, at 7:30 to discuss the plan for a Brucellosis Control Program in the county.

Also there are approximately 90 per cent of the counties in the U. S. that are under the same control program. This means that we in Texas and Coryell County need to do something about it. The general consensus of opinion of cattlemen hat I have talked to is that we should get into a Plan LL Control area.

District Office For '60 Census: J. Fred Simon Jr. Is Office Supervisor

A district office for the 1960 Census of Population and Housing was opened at Waco, Director James W. Stroud has announced.

J. Fred Simon Jr., will be supervisor of the district office and will direct a force of 20 crew leaders and 334 census takers in Bell, Bosque, Coryell, Falls McLennan and Milam counties.

Nationally there will be 160,000 enumerators, 10,000 crew leaders, 400 district supervisors, all temporary workers.

Prior to the census all households will receive an Advance Census Report Form, which gives family chance to assemble information.

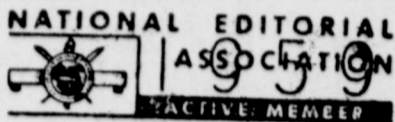

One reason for the growing attention to working women is the fact that their numbers are increasing so rapidly. There are more than 21 million gainfully employed women in the United States today—35.9 percent of all women 14 years of age and older, and 32 percent of the total United States labor force. The number has increased more than 50 percent in slightly more than 10 years.

Here are some of the groups of women involved in this employment increase. All married women, the total of married women who work increased from 20 percent in 1948 to 29 percent in 1958.

Married women with young children. This group is causing the greatest amount of concern. Although their number is low compared with those who do not have children, it has been increasing quite rapidly. In 1948, 11 percent of all young mothers were employed. In 1958, the number had increased to 16 percent.

Older women. A large number of employed women is 35 years of age or older. Their numbers have increased from 28 percent in 1948, to 35 percent in 1958. Women are marrying younger, having fewer children, and with life expectancy increasing, they are returning to work and finding they have 15 to 20 more years in which they may earn.

Rural farm homemakers. The actual numbers of this group are still small, but percentage-wise, they are increasing rapidly. In 1948, 20 percent of all rural farm homemakers were employed. The number increased to 26 percent in 1958.

AUSTIN, Tex.—Most important date for the Texas voter this month is Jan. 31.

After that it will be too late to get a poll tax receipt that will enable him to participate in this year's merry-go-round of political events.

Since 1960 is a presidential election year, lines will probably be long on the night of the 31st. Safest course is to do it now.

BLANKETS STATE—First goal of the Johnson-for-President organization in Texas has been reached.

Clubs have been organized in all 254 counties in the state, according to Director Larry Black.

RELOCATION PAYMENTS UP-

HELD—City officials and private utilities are joyful over a State Supreme Court's decision that will save the cities and companies some \$28,000,000.

High court ruled constitutional the law that provides for the state to reimburse cities and companies for the expense of moving utilities for interstate highway building projects.

Law was passed by the Legislature in 1957. It was challenged by the Attorney General's Department for the Highway Department on grounds it violated the constitutional prohibition of "donating" public funds to private firms.

Ninety per cent of the money the state spends on the interstate highway system comes from the federal government.

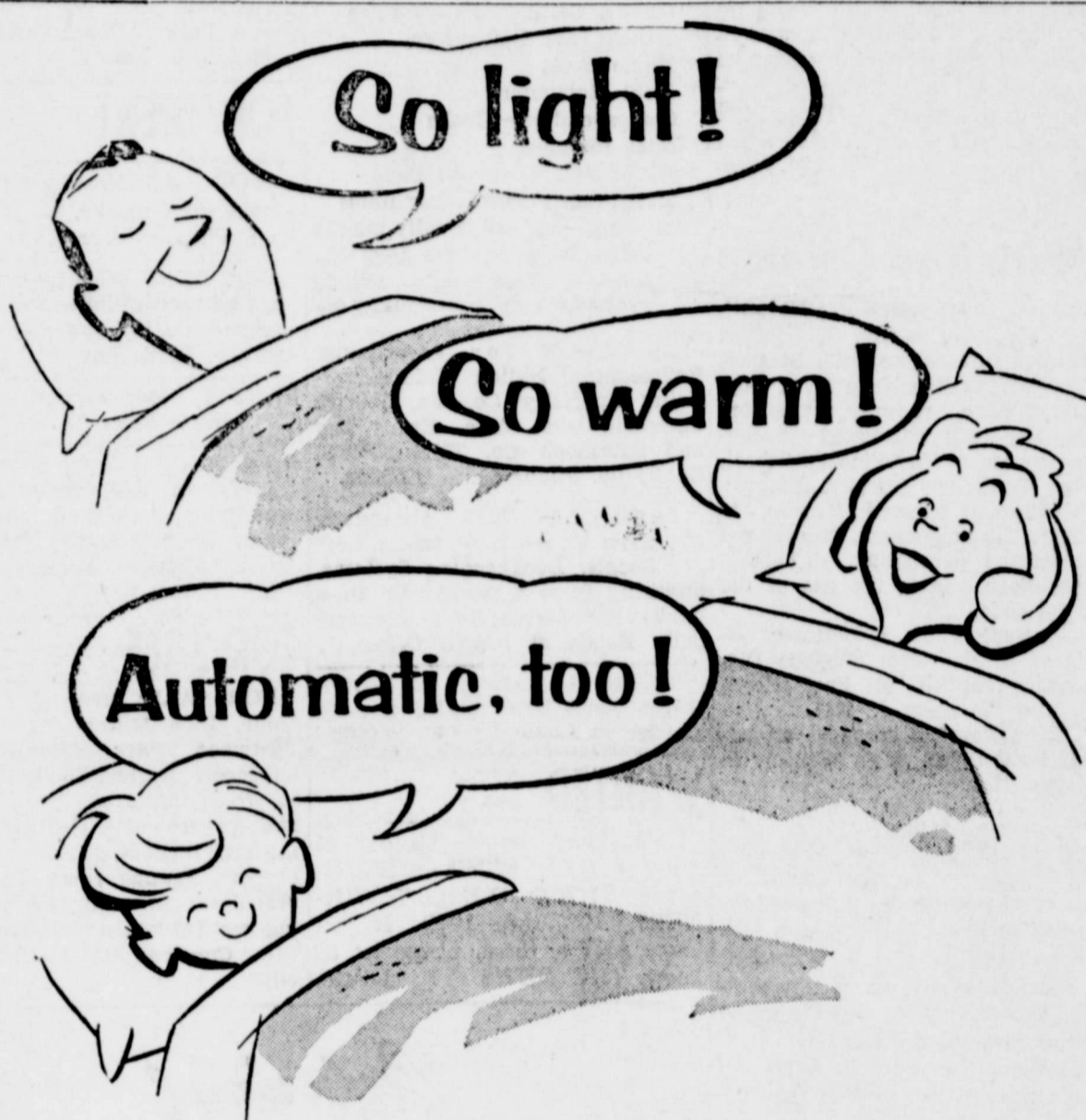

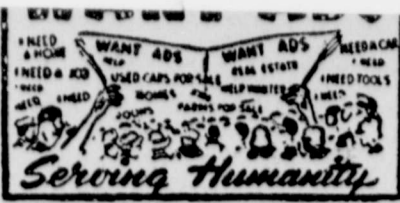
