WATERSHED PROJECTS INCREASE

NO WAY TO TREAT A PAL


The Atomic Energy Commission has announced that when current contracts expire in 1962 and 1963, the U.S. A. will purchase no more Canadian uranium. While Canada had expected a reduction in U.S. A. purchases of uranium, she had every right to consider that she should not be entirely cut off.

Commenting on this, the president of a Canadian mining firm said: "Our industry was developed at the pressing request of the United States Government at a time when they urgently needed uranium for defense against a very ominous foreign threat.'

The Montreal Star, pulling no punches, had this to say: "We have served a good turn as suppliers when the metal was scarce, but our customers can now get along without us."

Just how important uranium exports are to our Northern Neighbor, can be realized by the fact that in 1958, they totaled 5.7 percent of the value of all Canadian exports, most ofwhichwent to the U.S.A.

It seems to us that Canada's uranium producers are to be given shabby treatment-they merit out their gains! more favorable treatment by the U. S. A. No extensive and expensive stockpiling program of uranium by Uncle Sam is warranted, but we do hope before the present contracts expire, a joint United States-Canada program will be on strikes, worked out to safeguard uranium producers of both countries.



STRIKE AGAINST STRIKES

Now that the steel strike is claimed to have been won by the union, let's look at what ith crowing is all about.

An increase of 39 cents an hour means \$800 a year, though only 14 cents will find its way directly into pay checks. The average steel worker, in 116 days of not working lost nearly \$3000. Something to crow about?

The increase adds more than half a billion to annual steel company costs. With no solution to the work arrangements by which production per man-hour can be substantially increased, that half-billion has come out of somebody's pocket. Guess whose?

Since contracts in Big Steel are pattern-setters, look for a rash of strikes and increases all the way around. Take another nick out of everybody's dollar!

It's bad enough that the increases which unions forcibly extorts from the economy are al-ways at the expense of the unorganized-the farmers, the preachers, the pensioners, for whom income keeps lagging be-Southern group is expected to speak out in no uncertain terms on what they feel is most needed by agriculture in their region.

TAX FACTS FOR THE HOMEOWNER NO. 1-Theft, Damage And Destruction 1 7 70 Of Property

countants. Today's article considers the problems you may have in claiming deductions for theft or casualty losses. Later articles will offer advice on other tax probhomeowners.

Time and Destruction

There are a great many ways in which your property can be damaged or destroyed, as for example, by fire, storm, flood, or explosion. Generally, a casualty which will give rise to a deductible loss must occur with some suddenness. However, there are situations where the casualty to the casualty occurs over a period of time and still results in a deductible casu-

alty loss. For example, consider the damage caused by termites. Say that you purchased your house in June 1957 and at that time a check by experts showed that there were no termites present. Then, in February 1958, you discover that termites have been eating your house from under you. Can you claim a casualty loss deduction for the termite damage? Yes, you can, even though the damage took place

You can claim a deduction for a drop in the value of your car due to an accident. This is true

regardless of whether you or another driver is to blame, unless the accident is a result of your willful negligence. However, if you are responsible for a car accident and have to pay for damage inflicted on someone lems of particular interest to else's car, you cannot deduct the payment as a casualty loss.

Proving a Casualty Loss

Determining the amount you can claim as a casualty loss may be very difficult. Generally you

The best thing you can do is gather together any information that may help support the amount you claim as a deduction. For example, if your house is badly damaged, a qualified architect can often give a reasonable estimate of the before and after value. The appraisal fee, by the way, is a deductible expense.

Theft Losses

You can claim a deduction for the value of property that is over a nine month period.




