GATESVILLE FIRM IS LOW BIDDER ON CAMP DORMS

Home Lumber Co. of Gatesville has submitted a low bid of \$22,684 for construction of 2 units at the Bluebonnet Girl Scout Council at Lake Belton.

Bid was accepted during a recent meeting of the Council's board of Directors. Construction will begin within 90 days.

Each of the 2 units will accommodate 24 girls and 4 counselors. The units will be made of redwood and native stone, will contain a kitchen, storage and recreation rooms.

New FM Roads Sought In Austin Friday: Levita And Pancake

Friday in Austin, local citizens appeared at a public hearing before the State Highway Commission, asking for 2 FM highways in Coryell County.

Heading the representatives was County Judge Norman C. Storm.

One highway would be from St. Hwy. 36 north to the present FM 217 at Pancake, a distance of 4.5. The other from FM 2412 near Levita, north to FM 217, and would require a bridge over the Leon River.

Storm asked that the roads be placed high on the list when the commission plans Coryell road work, and the Commission said it would consider the proposals, and noted that Coryell is not over its FM road quota.

The Pancake road would be \$120,000 and would be the first desired, Judge Storm said, and the second might be delayed as it was the longer, 5.5 miles plus the necessity of a bridge. Estimate on this would be \$275,000.

Commission figures show the Pancake road carries 75 vehicles a day at the busiest and 65 at the least traveled point. The bridge road's load is 90 and 30 vehicles. The present river bridge is one-way and out-dated, the Commission said.

Gatesville Grass Judges First At Fort Worth: Eugene Bond Gets 2nd

Coach Sam Adams' Grass Judges dit it again. First in Ft. Worth, although they lost first individual judge to Jim Cox of Benjamin FFA who made a perfect score of 400 in the Ft. Worth Stock Show Junior Grass judging contest Saturday.

Gatesville team won its 2nd straight victory and 4th in 7 years in Ft. Worth competition. They placed all 3 team members in the top ten: Nathan Forrest 7th, and Troy Joynson 10th. The team scored 1,147 points out of 1,200, representing the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District. Top teams besides Gatesville were Teague, 2nd, 1,128 points, Quanah.

Contestants judged specimens of grasses, legumes and weeds. They identified each plant, listed its characteristics, whether it was warm season, whether it was annual or perennial; cool or produced or native, and its grazing value.

The Ft. Worth contest is one of 4 official state contests for FFA students. Others are Dallas, Houston and San Antonio. Gatesville has won the Dallas, and has gained a long lead in defending its 1959 record as best in the state.

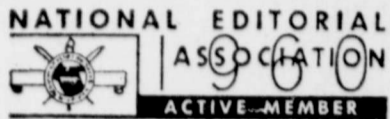

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Texas' Civil War Centennial Plans Being Made

AUSTIN, Tex. Feb. 4. (AP) — Texas will play a considerable part in the many Civil War Centennial commemorations planned throughout the nation in 1961 to 1965.

In naming a Texas Civil War Centennial Commission recently, Gov. Price Daniel noted that 58 military battles and events took place in Texas during the Civil War.

Daniel named the 18 members of the State Historical Survey Committee and 15 members at large to make up the Centennial commission. Walter Long, Austin, was made state chairman, and George W. Hill executive director of the State Historical Committee, was made director of the commission.

Hill said Historical Survey Committees in 220 counties will work on the Confederate commemorations in cooperation with the Daughters of the Confederacy and other Confederate groups, including the Children of the Confederacy, Sons of Confederate Veterans, and Civil War Round Tables.

The Daughters of the Confederacy

plan annual observances beginning in 1961 and continuing through 1965 at various points throughout Texas including Sabine Pass, Galveston and Palmetto Ranch.

Hill said the Historical Survey's efforts will center around seven activities:

1. Construction of the Texas Confederate Monument at Vicksburg, Va., which was assured by the \$100,000 appropriation by the 56th Legislature.

2. Designation of the new State Courts building as the Texas Confederate Memorial with a memorial foyer, as provided by constitutional amendment.

3. Inclusion of the Texas Confederate period in the new State Archives building, now under construction.

4. The Confederate Museum housed in the old State Land Office building now being restored by the state.

5. Restoration of state markers by County Historical Survey committees.

6. Erection of new state tourist markers to point out sites of Con-

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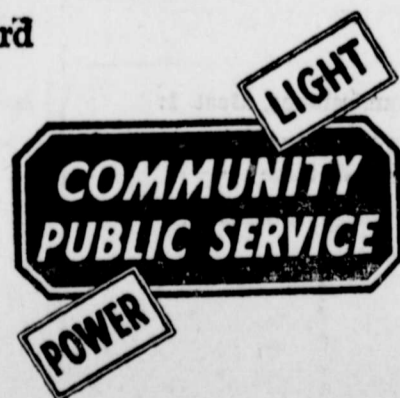

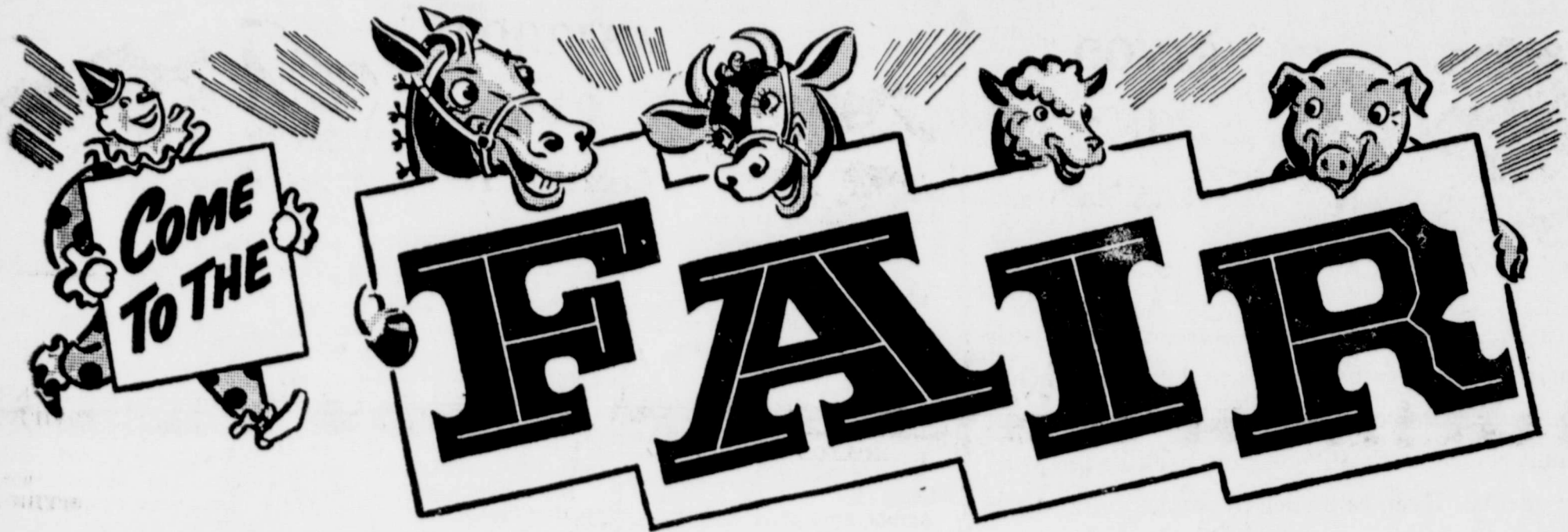
