\$192000 FENCE TO BE PUT UP AT SSB OUGHT TO HOLD 'EM: PROMISED 10 YEARS.

\$192,000 fence! That ought to be some fence!

That's the kind that's going up at SSB and James A. Thurman, director of the council said it would take a military bolt cutter to get through. Maybe a little "juice" would help.

Senator Crawford Martin of the Budget Board said the people of Gatesville area have been promised a fence around the institutions for the past ten years.

Mr. Thurman warned the legislators that you are going to hear lots of criticism when the fence starts up.

The council asked the 56th legislature for \$2,152,000 with which to construct a new 480 bed unit to the school and they got \$1,998,000. He said the fence will be more secure than anything they have at Huntsville and said the shortage of funds may force construction of only the basic unit capable of housing 286 very tough juveniles. This is one of those cases where we will have to exercise more backbone than jawbone.

The new compound will have no guard houses but will have roving patrols.

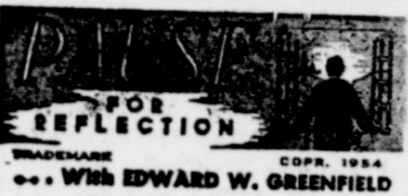

DISSECTING DEMOCRACY

Felix Morley, in his new book, "Freedom and Federalism" (Regnery, \$5.00), has supplied Americans with 300 pages of the kind of wisdom the "liberals" are sure to try to kill by silence, but which everyone seeking understanding will cherish.

With perception and historic perspective Dr. Morley tells how our federal republic has been slowly, often unwittingly, eroded by the idea of "democracy."

The Founding Fathers feared democracy. The reason: the history of democracies has always been one of self-destruction and final tyranny as majorities, led by demagogues, ride rough-shod over the undefended rights of individuals and minorities.

It was to save us from this that the framers of the Constitution carefully provided a government of balanced, limited power, with guarantee of God-given rights which no majority may violate.

What this federal system means to all of us, and what we need to understand if we are to resist the drift toward centralized power so cleverly disguised under the name of "democracy," Felix Morley's book makes remarkably clear. I have seldom read a book I can recommend so urgently!

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"
 By C. WILSON HARDER

While the furor over whether American tax money should be used to furnish birth control information to the world, appears to have subsided for the nonce, perhaps no incident has better proved the utter ridiculousness of the foreign aid programs.

Leaving aside any pros and cons on the issue raised on religious grounds, the whole question was absurd from a matter of principle.

Actually, the issue raised would be quite a laughing matter if it were not for the fact that it illustrates a very dangerous trend in the thinking in some quarters in this nation.

For here is thrown into sharp relief the international meddling mental complex of those who do so much tom tom beating for foreign relief programs.

For here is a group of bureaucratic meddlers who take it upon themselves to decide that birth control should be practiced in foreign lands, and regardless of how the people in these lands may feel about the matter, they were determined to assess the American taxpayer to propagandize this idea to the foreign peoples.

And this is perhaps also another reason why U. S. foreign aid programs have built up dislike for America abroad.

After all, people in other lands have their own customs, habits, and beliefs. And assuredly, they resent being told

Yet some groups of American bureaucrats, looking around for something to do that will perpetuate their jobs, have no hesitancy in deciding what changes people in other lands should make in their customs.

And perhaps it is natural. Any time a group of relatively minor people are given billions to throw away around the world, with very little control or check on their activities, they can in a short time attain an Almighty complex that is wondrous and fearful to behold.

We have had examples of the taxpayers' money being used to send jazz orchestras around the world, dancing teams, and all sorts of kindred projects.

It seems to have been largely forgotten that some 15 years and \$70 billions of dollars ago, the principle of foreign aid was to feed hungry people.

But that basic purpose of the postwar program seems to have largely been forgotten, perhaps because the need is not nearly so urgent.

But rather than admit there is not enough to keep the big foreign aid staffs gainfully employed, new and screwier projects must be invented.

Thus this idea to use U. S. tax money to promote world wide birth control was born.

What project these fertile bureaucratic brains will think of next to dissipate the American tax dollar is anybody's guess.

It is little wonder in many lands "Yankee, go home" is quite a popular slogan. Henry Wallace was really a piker. He only advocated plowing under
