### "School Specialist" Taken For Burglary of Elementary And Oglesby School Jobs

Lee Alton De Spain, 35, of Dallas, known in 'circles' as the School Specialist, was apprehended after someone got his pickup number in Athens. He has already admitted, Sheriff Cummings says, to 35 school jobs.

He is reported to have confessed to the Gatesville Elementary School job which was Nov. 19, 1959, at which time he pried open a window and knocked out some building tile and took \$165 in cash and \$35 in checks. He parked his pickup about 2 blocks away, after he left Dallas about 5 p. m. that day, went to Waxahachie, and then took FM highways to Gatesville.

After the Gatesville job he continued to Oglesby and rode around until he found the school, parked 2 blocks away and repeated his 'mode of operation' and made away with \$150 there.

There, he parked back of the football field, entered the building as usual, and cleaned the money out of the safe. When he was taken to Oglesby, he didn't recognize the town, but when taken to the school, readily admitted that it was one of his jobs.

Sheriff Cummings said there's no telling how many other jobs he has performed, and he readily admits one when he is taken to a school, if it was one of his.

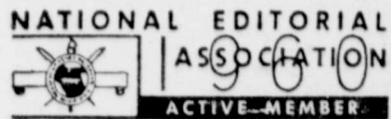

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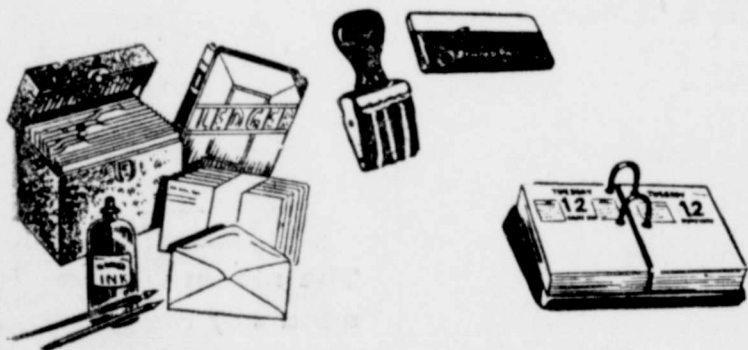
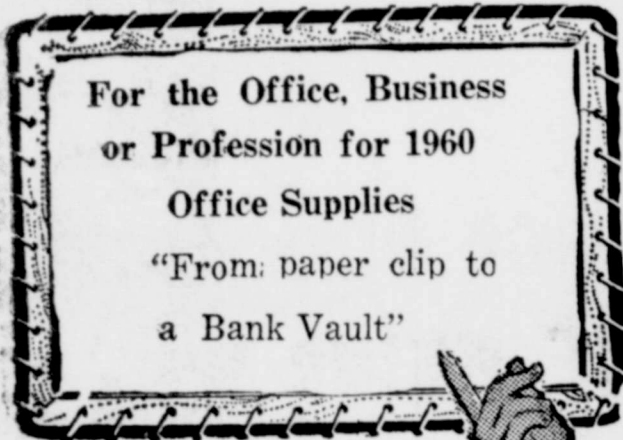

A steam iron can be very handy  
for pressing wool garments. Never  
use it on the right side of the gar-  
ment. The hot metal of an iron  
tends to overheat the soft surface  
of the cloth making the fibers brittle.

If the iron does not give enough  
steam for pressing heavy material  
or for shrinking out fullness place  
a wet cloth over the material and  
touch the cloth with a hot iron.  
When creating steam this way put  
the iron down so that it barely  
touches the wet cloth then lift it  
straight up. For best results in making  
the material look soft use this  
back and forth. A wool pressing  
patting motion instead of ironing  
cloth is another useful aid in giving  
wool a soft look instead of a  
hard shiny one. Place the cloth  
next to the right side of the gar-  
ment during pressing. The cloth's  
soft surface protects the surface of  
the garment.

The iron and wool raises static elec-  
tricity which helps raise the  
soft wool fibers.

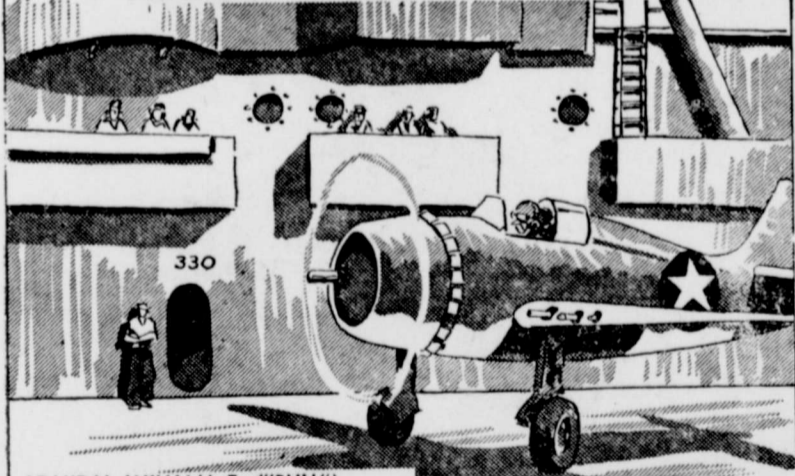

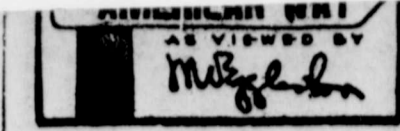

**PROGRESS ON CORYELL HWY JOBS GIVEN IN STATE HIGHWAY REPORT**

**RESIDENTIAL GAS LIGHTS CARRY ENGLISH ACCENT IN BEDFORD**

A new residential development at Bedford in Tarrant County, Texas, carries an English accent which features illumination of streets with gas lights formerly used in London during Queen Victoria's reign.

Negotiations for purchase of the gas lights began when the Stonegate Company, developers and president of the Anglo-Texan Society, Sir Alfred Bossom, asking for suggestions and information that might be used to re-crete a genuine early English atmosphere in the development which has been named Stonegate.

Sir Alfred responded with a word that the borough of Westminster in London (site of such historic landmarks as Westminster Abby, the House of Parliament and Buckingham Palace) was replacing the township's century-old lamp posts and would be willing for adding an authentic historical note to Stonegate.

A half dozen of the columns, each weighing 784 pounds, have been installed on Bedford Road in Stonegate addition. They arrived by ship in Galveston and were hauled to Ft. Worth for assembly by Lone Star Gas Company. Additional English gas

lights will be used if they are available, but if enough cannot be procured American manufactured gas lights will be added to cast a soft glow over Stonegate which has been planned to carry a British theme throughout.

The Stonegate Company received approval of the Bedford City Council to install the gas lights for street lighting. Each intersection of streets will have a gas light, and the longer blocks call for installation of a light midway between intersections.

The 350-acre residential development calls for a total of 1,000 houses to be built within five years, 220 of which are scheduled to be finished in 1960. Stonegate is said to be the only suburban area in the Southwest with all streets to be illuminated by gas lights.
