from our Congressman **BOB POAGE**

Dear Friends,  
There is no question more vital than that of our ability to survive. If we allow the Soviet to gain hold the clear ability to destroy us such a position of power as to who doubts that they will use it? We would then face either physical or political and national destruction. This is possibly the only clear and undisputed point in the present defense controversy.

Fortunately, no one thinks the USSR now holds that power. When the President says that our present defense is adequate to deter any aggressor, I feel that we can all agree. The real problem is what will be our position 2, 3 or 5 years hence.

I think everyone who has discussed the matter with the single exception of the President admitted that Russia has the present capability of putting ICBM in action than we have. I think that some of our intelligence agencies have changed their estimates from Russian capabilities to Russian intent. This is the cause of some of the confusion and apparent misrepresentation. I think we will do well to base our actions on Russian capabilities and assume that Russia will add to her strength as fast as she can. I don't feel safe simply because someone guesses that the Russians won't make as much effort as they could.

Recently come of our high officials both military and civilian have made public statements calculated to calm our fears. Some of the Senators and Representatives who heard them and other official in off the record seal that the publication they could show the people lic and private statements do not coincide. They feel that if they could quote the classified information how meager our defenses are and they resent the attitudes of those who they feel are covering up.

As a member of the Agriculture any secret information. I cannot pass on the merits of the dispute but I do know that we now have Committee, I naturally don't have to make our missiles mobile by only 1 or 2 locations now equipped with ICBM's Surely we need constant movement on railroad trains, submarines, etc. so that no one could know where to launch an attack to destroy them. If there is doubt let us resolve it in favor of a stronger defense.



## PHONY CURE SUGGESTED

As a "cure" for the alleged extortionately high prices reputed to certain drug producers, there has been a proposal that all drug patents be taken over by the Federal Government. That surely would be jumping out of the frying pan into the fire.

John W. Anderson, President of National Patent Council, states this proposal is another example of "the basic blindness of benevolent bureaucracy to public interest and security."

There are millions of living use-disabled, or buried, long ago but medicines and through long and full citizens who would have been for patented improvements. Admittedly, Anderson's "programs for the growth

perfection of new and improved products in any field often require heavy expenditures at great risk or loss by the manufacturer. Only a few such efforts result in a useful, salable product— which product, of course, must carry the entire financial burden of the many efforts that fail."

Perhaps some drug manufacturers are charging too much for their products. Surely, however, the "cure" for this can not be achieved by stifling all incentive to create new health-giving, life-extending drugs— which would happen if federal Government assumed control or ownership of drug patents.

The Federal Trade Commission is without doubt the most wonderful bureau in the whole bureaucratic shebang.

As is well known, the FTC is supposed to enforce the Robinson-Patman act, which is an integral part of the nation's anti-trust laws. Yet almost every day in almost every city throughout the land, some huge retail operation is getting a secret rebate, or benefitting by some illegal practice.

And where, as all this goes on almost openly so that these illegal transactions are a public scandal, are the brave, and true lads of the FTC?

They are really busy.

Right now the Federal Trade Commission is going heavily into the subject of women's legs. Perhaps on the theory that no man is dead if he notices women's legs, FTC is seeking to establish it is really not dead.

There is a firm in New York that offers correspondence courses to help women fill out skinny legs, or to reduce excessively fat legs.

Now FTC is charging that it ain't so, that presumably satisfied customers of this service are not obtaining "shapely and alluring" legs. Language in quotes is FTC's own.

Therefore, it must be presumed that somehow the FTC has set up a standard as to

just what constitutes a "shapely and alluring leg."

Yet, with all this preoccupation with leg work, the FTC does not seem to be able to find what constitutes an alluring kickback to a big chain.

There is something utterly fascinating about all this. On reflection, it perhaps makes people want to stand up and salute Old Glory to know in this land there is a big government bureau busily engaged day after day in telegrams and presumably sober deliberation of just what constitutes "shapely and alluring" legs.

As nothing is said about men, presumably the formal bureaucratic listing is "legs, shapely and alluring, feminine."

Apparently FTC is as little concerned with the allure of masculine legs as it is with the widespread violations of the Robinson-Patman laws designed to provide free, honest and aboveboard competition in the market place.

It will be interesting to see how many pages of printed matter will eventually be turned out at taxpayer's expense by the Government Printing Office carrying FTC decisions as to just what constitutes shapely and alluring legs.

But presumably, until this most vital issue is settled, and there is no doubt that it will take many a long deliberation before it is officially defined what constitutes alluring legs, the illegal rebate and kickback artists will go blithely on their way undisturbed, unhampered, and unfettered. After all, in the face of such important issues, the preservation of free enterprise in America can wait.

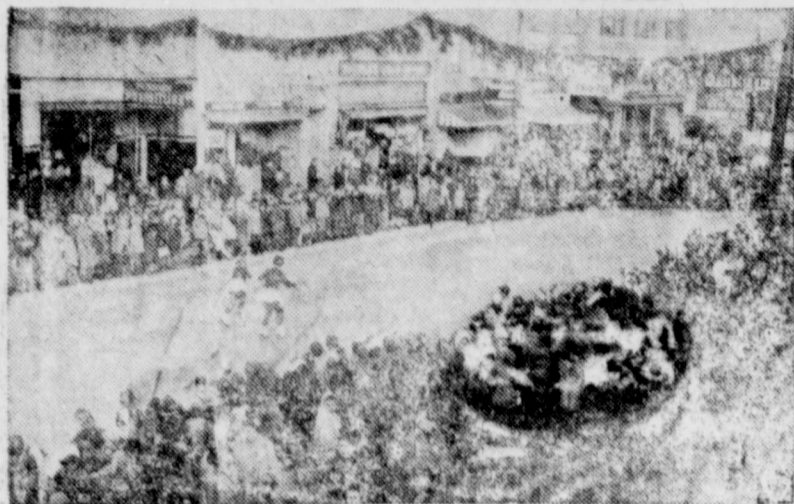

Throughout an 18-hour schedule, the city and its citizens staged one whopper of a jamboree on the city's main street. They expressed thanks to Harnischfeger Corp. of Milwaukee, and 350 of its dealers and executives representing the 50 states and Canada.

Reason behind the "thanks" dates back 12 years when the company helped lift the community from the depths of a localized depression and changed it into a prosperous industrial center with healthy weekly pay checks putting new life into the city's economy.

An abandoned woodworking factory was first converted to a welding supplies plant by the company. The community and its new industry hit it off famously and, a year later, the company built a spanking new plant to manufacture P&H construction cranes and exca-

vators, which are prominent in building the federal highway network, state and county roads. Now the company's two plants have more than 1,000 workers with a payroll running \$500,000 per month and a promise of better things to come.

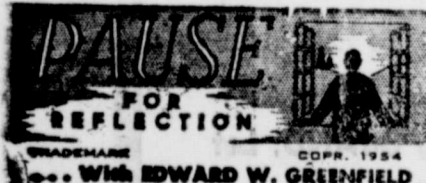

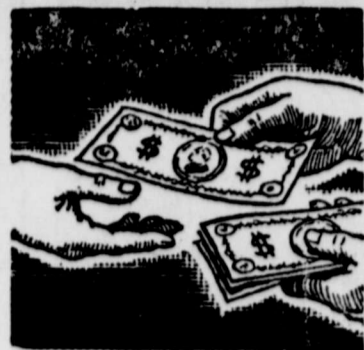

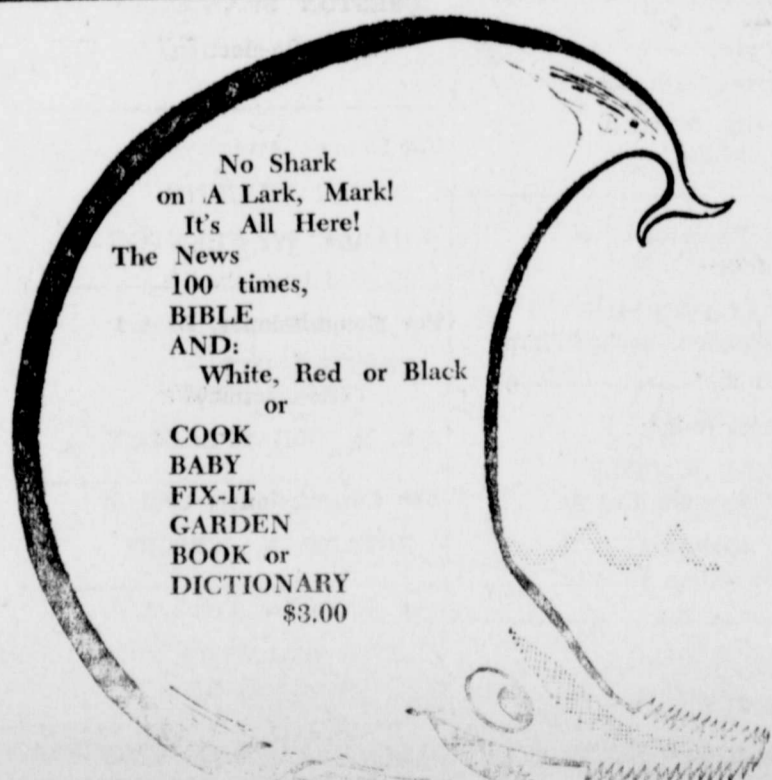

AN EDITORIAL

YOU AND ADVERTISING!

There is a lot of talk that the advertising industry might be investigated by this one group or another.

There is nothing wrong with that unless the result were to try to put some sort of regulatory strait jacket on an industry in which reactivity is the heart beat.

This might not seem a calamity of great national significance except that the dynamics of the advertising industry are inseparably intertwined with the booming health of the industrial economy—and this involves the well-being and daily life of everyone.

No serious threat to advertising or to the public interest would be posed by an objective scrutiny. The threat would be serious only if the scrutiny were concerned with rigging up and spotlighting the fractions without at the same time discovering and weighing the virtues on the other side of the scales.

Most of us now realize that some TV Quiz programs were rigged, some disk jockeys took payola, some commercials skirted good taste, and, some other commercials tried to deceive. To the extent that these things were deliberate, wrong. Matur heads in the industry are working quickly to correct the malfeasance and to discipline the scalawags.

Overriding these individual situations, most of us also know that the advertising industry in total effects a high level of morality and, indeed, seeks in its messages to prod our natural ambitions to
