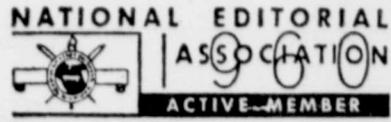

Good Values in Finance and Small Loan Companies

In the past year finance and small loan company stocks have been extremely poor market performers. Of the thirty major industry groups traded on the New York Stock Exchange the finance group acted as the poorest in 1959 and was off 11.64% versus an 8.83% gain on a dollar basis for the overall market as recorded by the Hemphill, Noyes Average. This sub-average performance can be attributed to several factors prevalent last year which will not come into play under present market conditions and outlook. Today there are several issues which offer excellent statistical values even though the growth prospects are limited. Among issues in the group that we believe offer above average attraction are, Commercial Credit in the finance field and Beneficial Finance among the small loan companies.

Last year saw the intensification of many problems confronting this industry. By year end, with profit margins under pressure and future prospects mixed, investors were loath to consider these issues even though they looked statistically underpriced and could have been bought for income. Historically, these issues have been noted for their defensive characteristics and attribute that will probably be appreciated in today's market a lot more than it has been in the market of the past year and a half.

Cost of money has risen and interest on the profit of finance companies has risen more readily un-

derstood when it is realized that one-third, and in some cases substantially more, of total expenses for an installment finance company are interest requirements on money borrowed to finance consumer loans. This does not only include the rather substantial long term debt which most finance companies carry but also the short term paper including 90 day notes and bank loans. With the bond market showing more firmness the near term outlook for money rates is not expected to be the problem that it was last year. The significance of this can not be underestimated for while this is not a discussion of the bond market nor will this be an attempt to project the future trend of interest rates there is sufficient evidence to indicate that 1960 will not bring the pressures that occurred in 1959.

1960 Prospects:
At the close of 1959 and in January 1960 most economic forecasters projected an excellent year in 1960. Now some of these forecasts (but not all) are being revised. However, the most pessimistic still forecast a good 1960.

All of this spells a reasonable improvement in results for the finance companies. Were it not for present money market conditions and the highly competitive nature of the field profit improvement would be more impressive. **FNS**

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"
By C. WILSON HARDER

It will probably be around May or June before this session of Congress takes action on taxation, but perhaps this is the time for Congressmen to receive the views of the people.

There are many inconsistencies showing up in the various programs.

For example, there is quite a drive on to raise Social Security taxes in order to provide for medical insurance. This could probably result in the government virtually fixing medical fees.

Yet, on the other hand, there is a drive to eliminate as income tax deductions the present provisions made for medical expenses.

There is also a move to eliminate income tax provision that makes it possible to deduct money spent for interest on loans, mortgages, et al.

Yet, on the other hand, there is also a drive to permit the government to pay higher interest rates on loans it makes. This, of course, would result in all the interest rates going up. Thus, government which has already fed the fires of inflation with extravagance, foreign give aways, and other schemes, would again give inflation another boost.

This twin development, if it occurs, raising interest rates, and not permitting tax deductions for interest payments, could easily wipe out entire independent business structure.

When small business today is

able to borrow money for operating or expansion needs, it is having to pay, thanks to government fiscal policies, at least 6%. Unless permitted to deduct interest paid, in many cases firms at this rate would end up in the red.

In addition, many things that small business now sells on installment terms, would soon experience a sales decline when purchasers discover that they could no longer deduct from income tax the interest paid out.

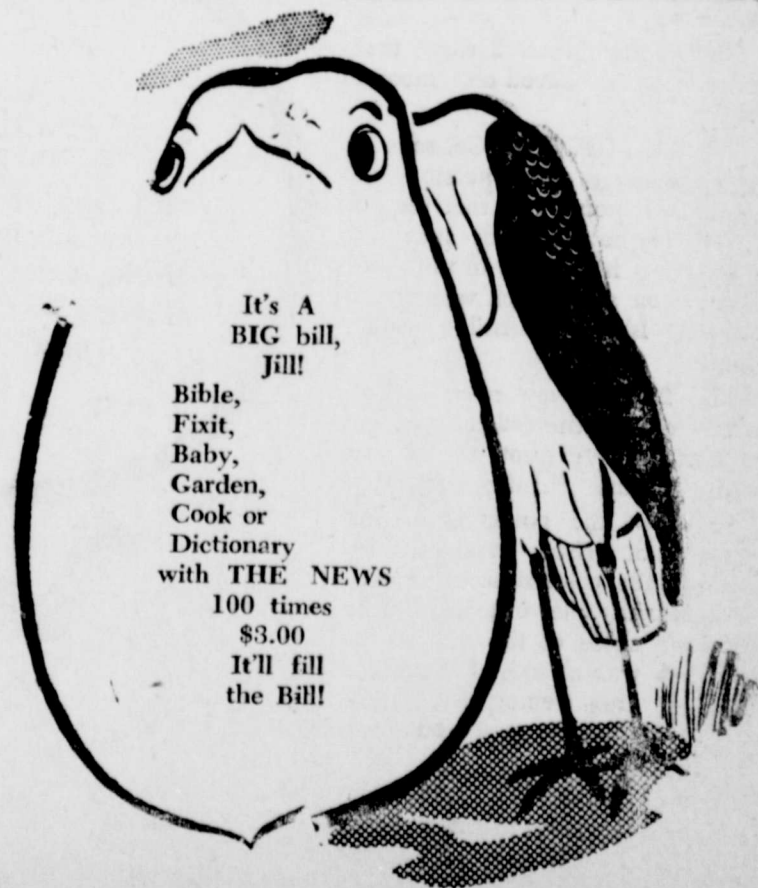
There is also a strong move to again raise the gasoline tax, and also the postal rate. As any small businessman knows, both the gasoline and postage used in operations become quite an item of expense.

None of these proposals have much effect on the huge corporations. As big public stock owned corporations, if the interest rates are too high, they just cut down on dividends to stockholders, using their earnings largely for financing. Other taxes are passed along to consumers.

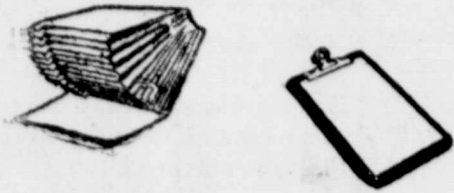
So the net result is that the consumers and small business pay these increased taxes.

There seems to have escaped from official mind the fact that a billion dollar cut in expenditures is the same as a billion dollar increase in taxes.

Yet so far there have been no complete and concrete plans presented for cutting the costs of government. Yet nation's independent businessmen, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, have often pointed out there are ways of cutting huge sums off government expenditures without weakening true national defense one whit.

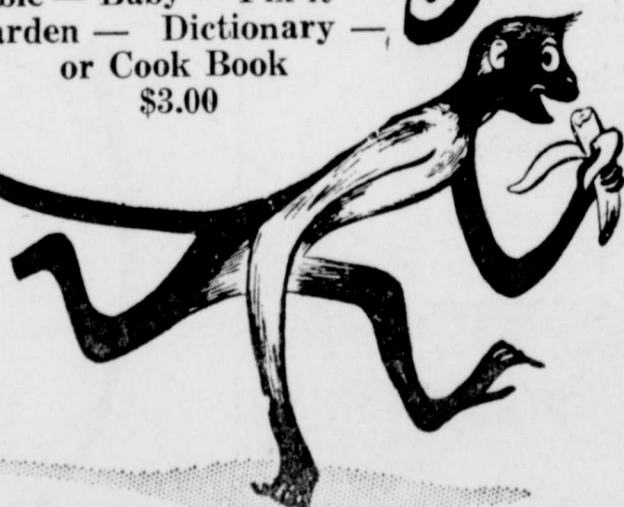

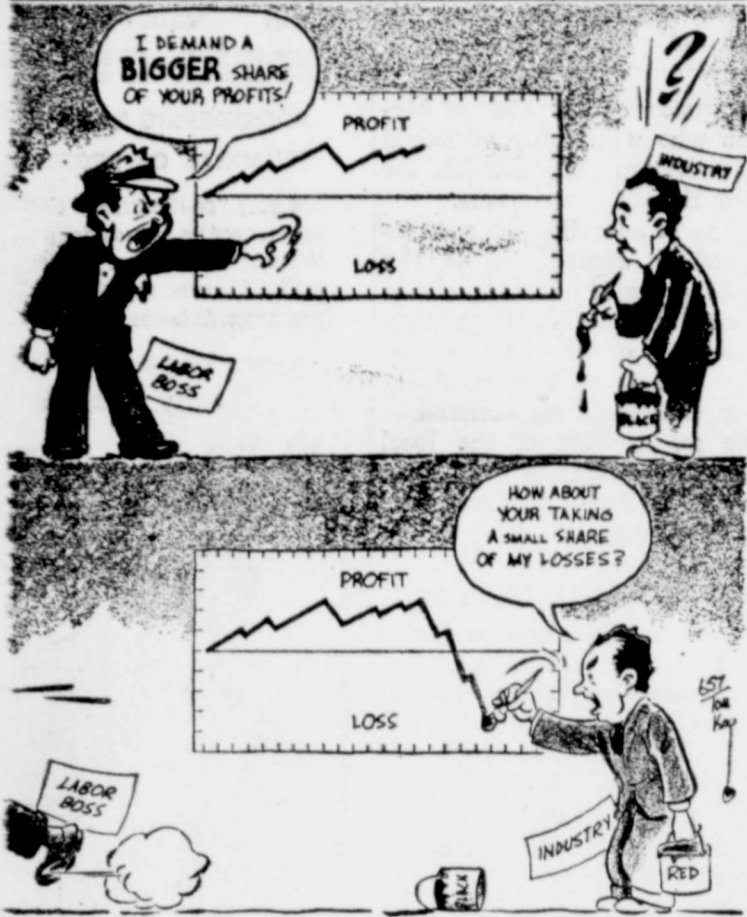

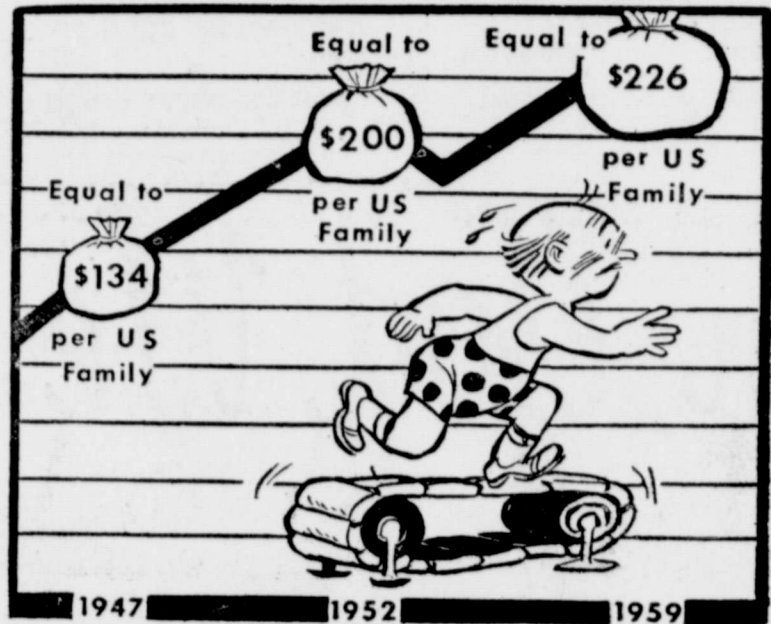

NOTHING IS TOO HARD FOR GOD

There is nothing too difficult for God!

Long after Abraham and his wife Sarah had passed the age of childbearing, God visited them, saying, "I am going to keep my promise which I made to you many years ago." Abraham fell upon his face and laughed. His was the laughter of joy, gratitude and faith that God was keeping His promise—that He was going to give them a child.
