LEAVERTON HAS STATEMENT

TO THE CITIZENS OF CORYELL AND HAMILTON COUNTIES:

In 1958 you nominated me or your State Representative by a large majority; for that I am grateful. I've tried to show my gratitude by service. I am not perfect. I have made mistakes but I believe that my over all accomplishments will warrant you in returning me for a second term. May I mention a few things I have done.

I am a small stock farmer. My interest is largely the same, I supported the Farm Bureau including the Milk Inspection bill that did not pass. I secured a poultry diagnostic lab for my district, helped pass an animal health optional program, restored the appropriation for the eradication of rodents and predatory animals and voted an appropriation for extending and broadening our extension and experimental services and placed myself with the interest of the farmers and ranchers consistently.

I voted for improved schools so vitally important to our children our economy and our defense. I was the author of the bill that made Tarleton State a 4 year college. I sponsored in the house the appropriation that relieved the dire need at the State School including the maximum security building with lock and fence that will check the awful depredation of the more vicious boys. I made a sustained effort to raise the standards of our public schools.

I gave support to our highways with checks on waste an extravagance where possible. I fought successfully against the bill that would take our money for farm-to-market and spend it on free-ways in the cities.

I supported every effort to put into effect the improvement of old age care as voted by the people. I requested the submission of the welfare program to the special session then in progress. I gave support to a Constitutional Amendment to give a \$2000.00 State Exemption on homesteads to people 65 years fo age and over. We passed bills helping the blind, dependent minors and to provide a safe and decent home for our old people instead of the fire trap wreck they now occupy.

I voted for the things I thought vital to the State and my district, but I constntly avoided waste and wild spending. I was called a moderate conservative; if liberal, it was in the interest of schools.

I didn't expect my district to go free of taxes; I did try to see that it was treated fairly. That's why we were in session so long. I favored the tax in accord

THC Tuesday Announces "Advanced Planning Program" of \$100 Million

Tuesday, the Texas Highway Commission announced authorization of \$100 million "advanced planning program" for state and U. S. highways, and included are 4 projects for Coryell County.

The program includes work in cities and rural areas but not FM roads or on interstate highways which will be handled in separate programs. A state expenditure of \$14 million for right-of-way is included and \$86 million will be required to cofplete work on the projects which are "handled in a 3-year cycle."

Coryell County's part is: "1.6 miles on U. S. 84 in Gatesville, from the Leon River east to SH 36. \$284,000 for right-of-way and construction."

"In Gatesville from SH 36 east to east city limit. This will be 0.8 mile on U. S. 84, costing \$100,000 for right of way and construction."

"6.7 miles on U. S. 84, from east of the city limits of Gatesville east to FM 1829, \$800,00 for the purchase of right-of-way and construction."

"5.5 miles on SH 36 from 3.0 miles north of Gatesville to 3.0 miles south o Gatesville, \$30,000 for 'protective buyig' of right-of-way."

Texas Youth Council turned down Tuesday an extensive program suggested by its chairmans as a means of correcting and preventing juvenile delinquency.

W. C. Windsor Jr., Dallas, chairman, said members Robert Knebone of Houston and Louis Henna, Round Rock "indicated they didn't want to be associated with the report."

The proposal would make extensive use of public school and state hospital facilities in programs designed to furnish delinquents or potential delinquents with supervision, care and training.

Windsor said the other members felt adoption of the program would put the council into fields occupied by the Stat Board of Education and the State Hospital Board.

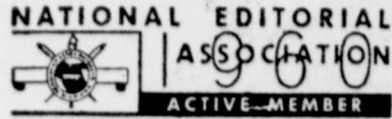

An Analysis Of Our City Government

The primary purpose and responsibility of a city government is to provide the people with those services and supply those needs which they can not provide at themselves. Of course most of these needs and services cost money. I am aware, just as you are, of the heavy tax burden that has been placed upon us by our local, state and national governments. I am not in favor of higher taxes but I am in favor of a realistic tax equalization program, and the maximum use of the available tax money, which can best be accomplished through careful and long range planning. Here is a brief study of some of our city problems:

PUBLIC HEALTH AND SANITATION. Perhaps the most important responsibility of our city government is to provide a good public health and sanitation system. Included in this category are the sewage disposal plant, our garbage disposal system, and our

Our present sewage disposal plant is heavily overloaded and raw sewage is being dumped into the Leon River. A new modern sewage disposal plant is needed with enough capacity to take care of our present need and any growth that is anticipated for the next 10-20 years.

Most cities have long ago abandoned the method of garbage disposal that Gatesville is still using. Instead of using the open dump grounds, these cities are using the modern sanitary fill method of garbage disposal, whereby the garbage and trash is buried. Many cities use this method to fill in gullies and ravines; thereby rehabilitating blighted areas instead of creating them.

An intensive control and elimination program is needed in Gatesville during the summer months when flies and mosquitoes are most prevalent. Of course a modern sewage disposal plant and the use of the sanitary fill method of garbage disposal would eliminate a considerable portion of the breeding places of these insects, and thereby reduce the cost of the pest control program. Also, in order to protect the lives and health of the people, our city ordinance for the vaccination and control of dogs should be strengthened and rigidly enforced.

CITY STREET PROGRAM. Nine years ago when I came to Gatesville I was told that Gatesville had a greater percentage of its streets paved than any city of comparable size in Central Texas, and perhaps this was true. Since then the city has used no systematic method of paving our streets. About the only streets that have been repaved are those where the people have made the loudest squawks, and those where personal reasons or political expediency has prevailed. Most of the remainder have developed into pot-holed, rutted streets that require constant patching. If we are to have a good system of paved streets at a minimum of cost we must have long range planning. Included in this would be the use of top grade materials in our street construction. In the long run it is just as expensive to use second grade materials because of the high cost of maintaining poorly planned streets constructed of second grade materials.

YOUTH RECREATION AND GUIDANCE. Many years ago, in the so-called "horse and buggy" days, parents were able to provide and supervise the recreational needs of their youth. But now, whether we like it or not, our pres-

much of this responsibility away from the individual parents, and it has become a group problem that can best be solved through group action. Proper recreation for, and proper guidance of our youth is not only the responsibility of the individual parents but it is the responsibility of our city government, our schools, our civic organizations, and the churches of our community. None of these alone can furnish the necessary guidance and recreation that our youth (or teen-agers) deserve. But I firmly believe that if all of these agencies can be brought together into a youth guidance council the needs of our youth can be met.

CITY PLANNING AND ZONING. These two are not the same thing but instead they might be called twin brothers. The purpose of zoning is to try to keep present land use from further deterioration and confusion. "Zoning," someone said, "is aimed at keeping the pig out of the parlor." City planning, on the other hand, explores the future. Its aim is to conserve our land resources and plan for their orderly future development. In a growing city there are always the problems of increased car and truck traffic, housing, water supply, sanitation and health facilities, schools and recreation areas, the location of factories and commercial enterprises. Should we let expansion remain unchecked, with the possibility of an oil refinery in a residential district (not likely in Gatesville), or should we attempt to find the best places for factories, stores, schools and homes. Gatesville needs a modern, flexible zoning ordinance and a permanent planning commission if its growth is to be logical and wholesome instead of haphazard.

Some of our other problems are traffic and parking control, police protection and law enforcement, parks and playgrounds, and adult recreation and education.

PUBLIC RELATIONS AND PUBLICITY. A very important, but presently neglected, phase of our city government is its public relations and publicity program.

City of Gatesville, Texas

If our city government is to function properly and efficiently, it must keep its citizens informed of its work, its problems, and its progress. Our city government is a big business, and just like a private business, it needs good public relations if it is to be of maximum service to the people. The individual problems of a citizen may be times seem small to the city government but they are often very large to the individual, and these problems deserve the consideration of the city administration. All citizens deserve to be treated fairly and equally. In this way only can we hope to develop pride in our city, and respect for our city government. A good public relations and publicity program would cost the city no money, but the dividends it would pay are unlimited.

It would be foolish of me to promise you that if I am elected Mayor I would solve all of the city's problems. Just as it has taken years of inactivity and neglect for these problems to grow,

it will take years of concerted effort on the part of all the people of Gatesville to solve them. My purpose in making this analysis is to try to get people interested in the problems of their city government. I am not so naive as to think that my solutions to our problems are the only solutions, but I fervently believe that the best solution to a problem can be obtained if the problem is brought out into the open; discussed, debated and studied. Informed citizens make good citizens.

Again I wish to say to you: If you believe in honest, efficient government, with due regard for the rights and interests of all the people, the VOTE for me on April 5th.

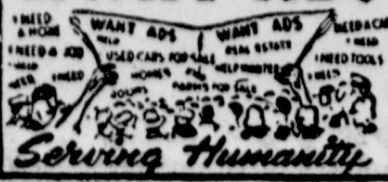

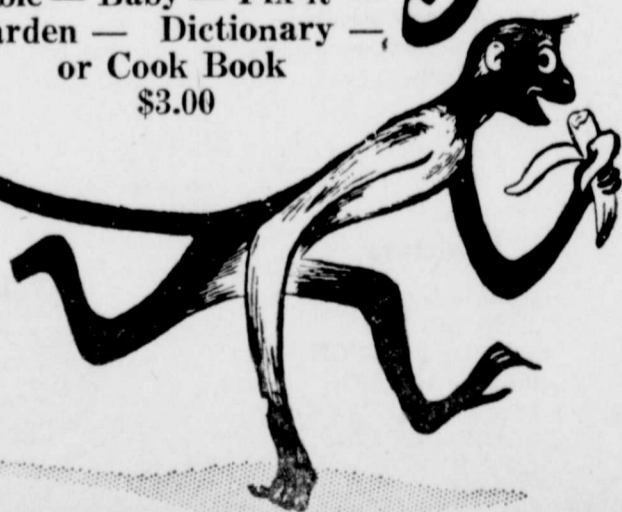

Dear Friends:
 The Small Watershed Flood Prevention Program is probably our most vital conservation program. It is administered by the Soil Conservation Service of the Department of Agriculture because there is simply no way of separating soil and water conservation in the upper reaches of our streams where most of our water falls. If that water can be so directed as to move slowly, much of it will sink into the ground and the streams will have time to carry the water to the sea. That is why we have flood prevention programs that prevent the destruction of property

The first Flood Prevention project in Central Texas was in the Cow Bayou. This was a demonstration project in which the Federal Government paid all the costs except rights-of-way. Our State law has not authorized any local organization which can distribute these costs. Federal money has been available for several years to complete this project but could not be used because there was no local organization. I understand this money will be used for other purposes next fiscal year.

The first locally sponsored project approved in Texas was the Lower Brushy. This project is well under way. There are now three other projects in our district which have been approved for construction, and several others which have been approved for surveying.

There has been a great increase in approved projects all over the United States. For a time we, in Texas, were able to do more work than some of our neighbors because our State S.C.S. office at Temple moved our projects along faster and was able to use money which other states did not use. Now everybody is demanding and using all the money which is available. The total appropriation for 1959 was only \$25,500,000 but there was a carry-over of \$16,795,833, which actually gave us over 42 million

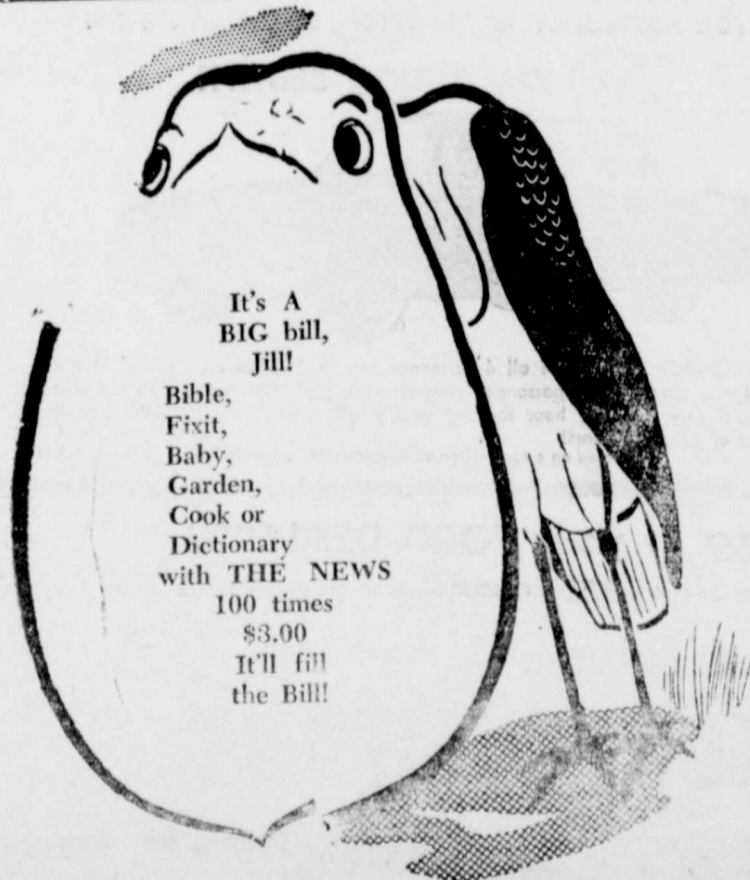
to spend. Since that time the demands have greatly increased for fiscal year 1961 the President has recommended only \$27,700,000 and the carry-over is \$2,250,000. Thus, there will be 30 million available. This a drop of about 30 per cent, and the need has increased seven fold. Unless these appropriations are substantially increased, vital work is going to be brought almost to a standstill.

I have an appointment to be heard by the Agricultural Committee of the Appropriations Committee next week. I hope I may be able to influence the Committee to increase the funds for Flood Prevention.
