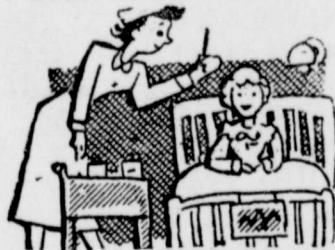

What To Do In a Tornado

● People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

● In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.

● The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).

● Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.

● Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

'You'll Be Numbered Startin' April 1: but You Won't Know What Your No. Is

Startin' April 1, the 18th Decennial Census will begin, and 160,000 census takers start on rounds. Advanced forms have been distributed - have them ready. Save your time, and the Censuser.

At every 4th house, they'll leave a Census Household Questionnaire and you'll be requested to fill it out in 3 days and mail to local census district office in a pre-addressed postage free envelope provided, all of which is 'off the record' to all but the census.

"T-night" is transient night, and is Mar. 31. Forms are left at hotels, motels, and other large transient places, and Censusers will be on hand to help fill out forms.

Censusers identification will be a red, white and blue identification card worn on lapel, bearing seal of Department of Commerce and words "Census Enumerator." Also a brown portfolio and in green ink "1960 Census of the United States." Don't give no information to nobody else about nothing.

In a recent address, former President Herbert Hoover had a word for the clergy on the infections from Karl Marx. He stated that the spread of the Karl Marx virus was of particular concern to America's clergy. Regarding this, he warned:

"More leaders of the Christian faith need realize the ultimate end of this infection among us. The real meaning and purpose of socialism is the government operation of all commerce and industry, and the reduction of life to pure materialism.

"This infection creeps through our nation by deluded and misled men and by disguised organizations, fronts and cults. These agents of infection are like hermit crabs which crawl into such terms as 'liberal,' 'progressive,' 'public electric power,' 'managed economy,' 'the welfare state,' and others."

And after reminding that communists cling to the Marx declaration that "religion is the opiate of the people," Mr. Hoover said:
