From "Strictly Choice" in The Weekly Livestock Reporter, and it reports the vicissitudes of the cattle business, given recently at the Abilene Convention. It reads:

"Livestock are animals that are bred and raised in Texas and the western states to keep the producer broke and the buyer crazy.

"Livestock are born in the spring, mortgaged in the summer, pastured in the fall and given away in the winter. They vary in size and color and weight and the man who can guess the nearest to the weight and market grade is called a livestock buyer by the public . . . a robber by the rancher . . . and a poor business man by his banker.

"The price of livestock is determined in Chicago and goes up after you have sold and down after you have bought.

"A buyer for a California packer was sent to Fort Worth to watch the livestock market. After a few days observation and deliberation, he wired his office to this effect: 'Some say the market will go up and some say it will ever you do will be wrong. Act go down. I say the same—what a one!'

"When you have light cattle the buyers want 'em heavy. When you feed out heifers you find they want steers and when you get some steers finished they wanted heifers.

"When they're thin they should be fat, and when your steers are fat, the buyer tells you the market on tallow is all shot to hell.

"My auction market operator says I should have been here last week!"

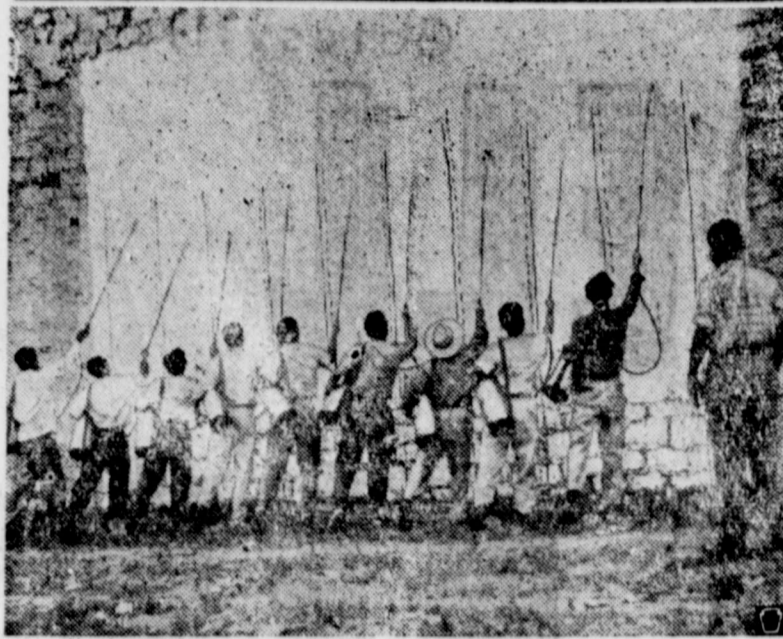

Malaria Eradication - A World Challenge

These Mexican health workers are undergoing training to become spraymen in their country's nation-wide malaria eradication campaign. Their instructor drills them in the proper method of coating with residual insecticides the interior surfaces of all dwellings where malaria-spreading Anopheles mosquitoes are likely to bite humans. Such spraying is the basic weapon of malaria eradication campaigns. Its aim is to break malaria's cycle of transmission, not to kill all Anopheles mosquitoes.

More than 7,000 spraymen in the western hemisphere alone are now protecting the peoples of their countries from malaria. The 90 Member States of the World Health Organization launched the world-wide malaria eradication campaign in 1955. These same nations have chosen "Malaria Eradication - A World Challenge" as the 1960 theme for the celebration of the 12th anniversary of WHO's founding. The Pan American Sanitary Bureau serves as WHO's Regional Office for the Americas.

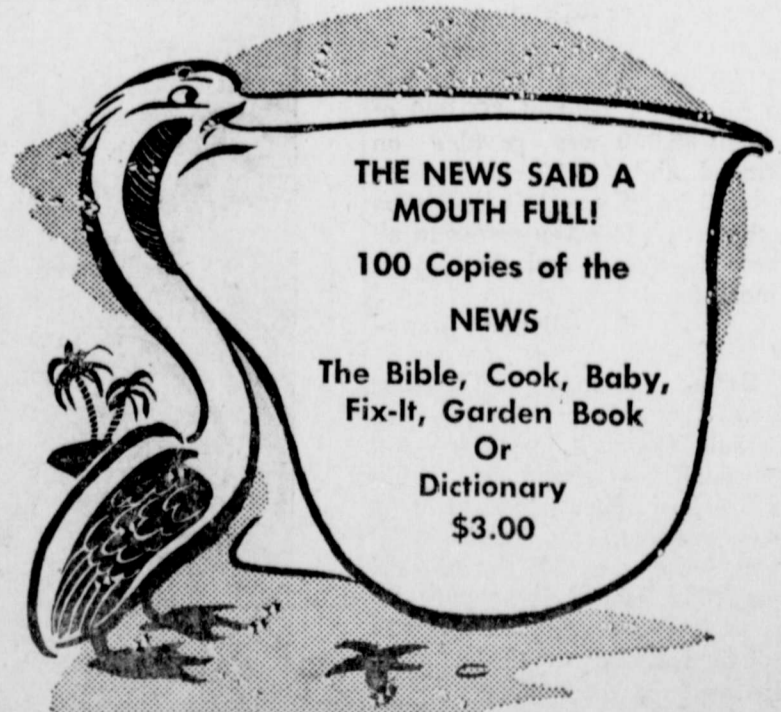

TEXAS CATTLE UP 9 PERCENT
It came as no surprise recently

when the U. S. Department of Agriculture released its figures on livestock population at the beginning of 1960, showing that cattle on Texas ranges had increased by nine per cent over early 1959.

The USDA inventory reported the total of all cattle in Texas as of Jan. 1, 1960, at 8,276,000, compared with 8,516,000 at the same time a year ago. This nine per cent increase in population was nearly double the rate of the national increase, which amounted to about five per cent.

It also came as no surprise when the USDA reported that the total value of all livestock — Cattle, hogs, sheep, horses and mules, poultry — had gone down in spite of increased numbers in most categories. The total valuation at the start of 1960 was placed at \$16,236,408,000 compared with \$18,092,870,000 a year ago.

Nationally, the livestock and poultry population figures showed these comparisons: Cattle, 101,520,-

000 this year and 96,650,000 last year; milk cows, 21,331,000 and 21,488,000; hogs, 58,464,000 and 56,924,000; sheep, 33,621,000 and 32,945,000; horses and mules, 3,089,000 and 3,142,000; chickens, 368,859,000 and 383,529,000, and turkeys, 5,673,000 and 59230. Horses and mules declined two per cent chickens fell off four per cent in numbers, and dairy cows eased off one percent.

At the same time, the USDA estimated a sharp drop in value per head of livestock, as follows: Cattle, \$136 this year and \$153 last year; milk cows, \$208 and \$219; hogs, \$16.50 and \$20.30; horses and mules, \$112 and \$101; chickens, \$1.05 and \$1.26, and turkeys, \$4.91 and \$4.65. Only horses and mules and turkeys showed a slight increase in price.

Release of the figures reemphasized the attitude of most authorities in their outlook on the 1960 cattle market, which is that the time has arrived for caution in planning any further increases of the livestock population of Texas ranges. Good range conditions in general continue to encourage the trend toward taking full advantage of the conditions, but authorities agree that extreme care should be exercised before any further heavy expansion is developed.

The aroma of the fishing season has engulfed itself in the nostrils of every angler from coast to coast. At ease men, there is still time to get your fishing tackle in shape.

If your tackle box has been sitting on a shelf in the garage or in a damp place in your basement you can be sure that it needs some attention, says the Evinrude Boating Foundation.

When cleaning your tackle box be sure to use a commercial cleaner. Gasoline is also an effective cleaner, however it is highly inflammable and dangerous to use. A commercial metal cleaner will do the job safely and effectively.

Rusty or oxidized spoons may be cleaned with metal cleaner. I opened my tackle box the other day and found two of my spoons pretty well tarnished. I used a little car polish because it was the only thing available at the time. If rust spots remain after the metal cleaner is used then try a pencil eraser... it does wonders.

Wooden plugs can be put in shape with a little paint and a paint brush. Fingernail polish also does a real good job of things. If your hooks need sharpening use a piece of fine sandpaper or emery cloth.

Flies and bucktails will be as good as new after a good steaming. Use a fan or hair drier to dry them. Now take a look and see if the hooks need to be honed.

If you have trouble with the solution of pork brine like I did, pick up a few plastic bottles from a drug or variety store. The brine won't leak and you won't have to worry about rusted bottle covers. Small plastic bottles are also good for hooks, sinkers and other small pieces of metal.

Check your fly, casting or spinning line. Replace it if it shows signs of wear. Clean and lubricate your reel, and above all make sure that it's in good condition.

Replace all damaged rod guides. A worn guide will cut or damage a new line. Also check the windings on your rod to see that they are not coming loose.

These are the things that I've been doing for the past several years and have found them very satisfactory in getting my gear in shape. Take this advice and do a good job and your fishing fun won't be marred with last minute problems.

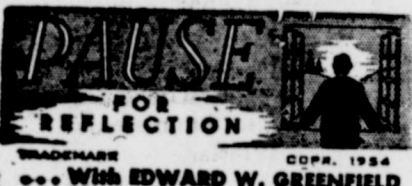

COMMUNISM IN THE CHURCHES

The National Council of Churches (NCC), charged by the Air Force manual with Communist infiltration, does many splendid things and includes sincere and loyal men. And its president is right in noting that anyone is open to criticism who plunges deeper than "little Mickey Mouse morals."

But granting sincerity and largeness of purpose, let's look at what the trouble is. When church leaders presume to voice "the Protestant conscience" and to be "obedient to the example of Christ" in dealing with issues, they need a caution or two.

They must notice that "the Protestant conscience" includes other views than those which NCC leaders express. The conservative Laymen's Committee, after five years of trying to work as part of the NCC, finally gave up in despair. Clergy leaders persistently acted as though conservative views have no place in "the Protestant conscience."

It follows that the NCC believes "the example of Christ" is on the side of the "liberals." It would be far more convincing if the example of this "liberal Christ" had less resemblance to the AFL-CIO, the ADA, the New Deal, and the Welfare State!

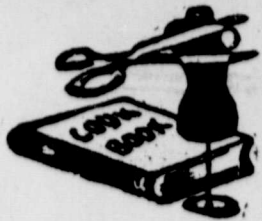
