Ft. Hood is getting closer to a 'self-contained unit' so need for civilians or their services.

Bids for the construction of 800 Capehard Housing units have been requested by the U. S. Army Engineer District in Galveston. Average cost per unit is \$16,500 or \$13,200,000. It'll have 478 units for enlisted men, 222 for warrant officers lieutenants and captains and 100 for colonels and majors. It will supercede the 500-unit project scheduled for completion July 1, and the total housing units at Ft. Hood now are 2,583. They have about 22,000 men on the post, and a spokesman said this was still below requirements for Ft. Hood personnel. Why of you got \$13,200 units here to rent?

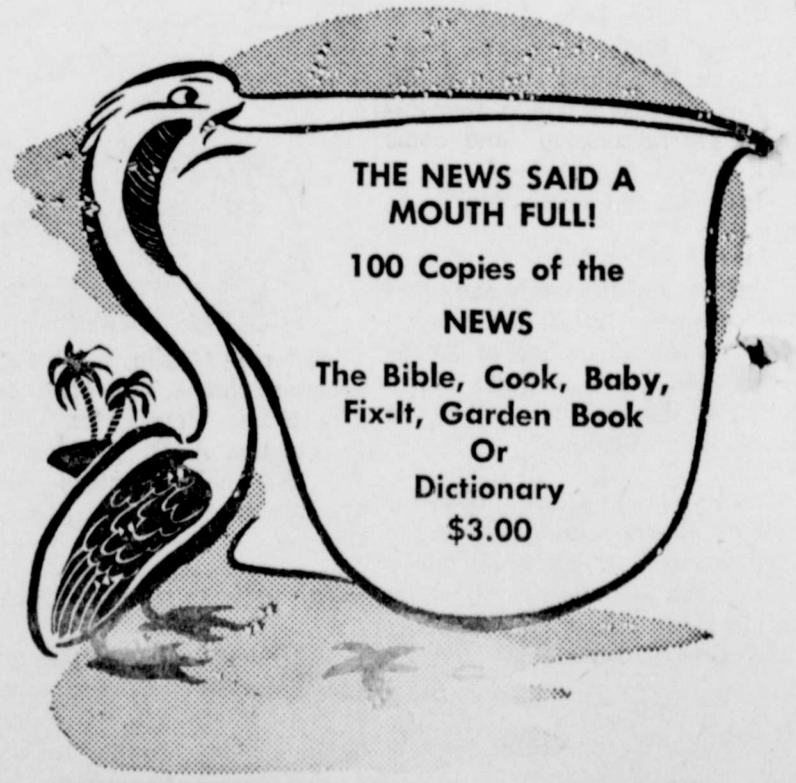

ACCIDENT SUMMARY FOR FIRST 3 MONTHS '60: DEATHS DOWN 50 PERCENT

Sergeant L. M. Hancock of the Belton Area, of the Texas Highway Patrol, released Falls, Bell, Coryell, and Hamilton Counties Rural Traffic Accident Summary for the 1st 3 months of 1960.

The Highway Patrol in this Area investigated a total of 155 accidents with the following breakdown: Property damage 100, Per-

sonal Injury 49, and Fatal Accidents 6.

Sgt. Hanhok reported a total Property Damage of \$105,635.00 with 82 persons injured and 7 killed. This is an increase of 13 accidents and a decrease of 3 deaths for the same period of 1959.

Traffic deaths in the 22 county District have decreased 50 percent during this period compared to the same in '59.

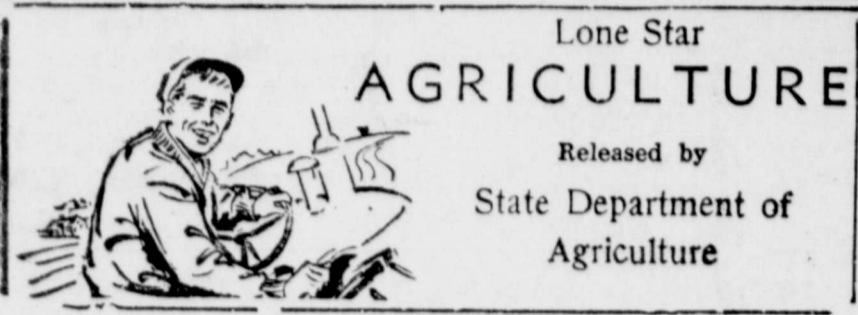

FARM LEGISLATION FOR '60's

The vague outlines of Washington farm legislation for the 1960's is beginning to appear dimly in patterns of controversy, and a better idea of what to look for next might be gained by glancing at what has happened in the past three decades.

Each of these three decades has been marked by different and distinct attitudes in Washington toward the problems of agriculture.

Going back to the 1930's, the decade of the Great Depression, there was an economic disaster that stifled the entire economy and pushed one out of every four farmers into bankruptcy. The problem then was strictly a dearth of markets instead of excessive production, and the Washington remedy was to plow up crops, kill little pigs and put the government into the cattle-buying business.

ness. The beginning of the 1940's saw the technological revolution in farm production coming to the front, producing what at that time appeared to be huge surpluses. But there was war and post-war recovery that took up these apparent surpluses, with high prices encouraging maximum production. Prices went up from 38 per cent of parity in the 1930's to 123 per cent of parity in the 1940's.

But in the 1950's the vast increases in production again developed serious surplus troubles. Eventually, in 1955, a Democratic authority to flex price supports between 75 per cent and 90 per cent of parity for basic crops. This was done on the theory that since high supports had encouraged excessive production, lower supports would cause farmers to reduce production.

The theory, however, has not been borne out by the facts, with total farm production continuing to set new record highs year after year. This year, the best collective thinking of Democratic farm-minded congressmen perhaps is reflected in the "Family Farm Income Act of 1960" by Rep. Bob Poage (D-Tex.). The bill is not expected to pass this session of Congress, but it indicates what can be expected next time if the Democrats retain control in the House and Senate. It has two strengthen the income and security of family farms; second, to provide farmers with a variety of programs from which to choose. It is based on higher price supports with production under strict controls.

SHEEP PARASITES

Wet weather is good for pasture and excellent for survival of parasite larvae on pastures. The problems of sheep producers are not over.

The two main types of intestinal roundworms that cause trouble in sheep are the common stomach worm and the bankrupt worm.

The common stomach worm is primarily a wet weather infection and is particularly important in young animals and broken mouth old ewes. It is primarily a bloodsucker. If animals pick up a heavy infection, they may die without loss of body condition. They literally are bled to death. However it is usually less acute than this. The first sign is anemia or paleness of the skin and membranes of the mouth

and eyes.

Phenothiazine is a very effective treatment for the common stomach worm. Phenothiazine salt mixtures cannot be relied on for control of these parasites. However periodic administration of full doses of phenothiazine supplemented by phenothiazine-salt mixture usually gives adequate control.

Bankrupt worms on the other hand are an entirely different problem. They are much more resistant to dry weather, and outbreaks usually occur in the late summer, fall or early winter, following showers. Occasional heavy losses will occur in sheep following a shower of a quarter inch or less. When moisture becomes available the eggs hatch rapidly and the larvae crawl upon the ground and may enter the sheep in tremendous numbers in a short period of time. As a result of this, the sheep develop what the sheepman ordinarily calls "black scours." There is no anemia in this infection unless it is a mixed where the common stomach worm is also present.

Phenothiazine is relatively ineffective in treating bankrupt worm. The old copper sulfate-nicotine sulfate mixture may produce favorable results. However the best treatment is to remove the sheep from pasture and feed. Good feed and nursing without treatment is much better than treatment without feed.

Growers using fungicides and pesticides can be assured they will not contaminate the edible part of fruits or vegetable and the residue will not be excessive at harvest time if they follow the recommendations on the label.

The labeling of all fungicides and nematicides shipped must be registered with the U. S. Department of Agriculture. These applications are carefully examined to see that any directions for use meet the requirements of the law. Among other things, the USDA determines if any treatment will leave excessive chemical residue on the harvested raw agricultural products.

The following rules should be closely followed. First read the label on the bottle, then use any plant disease or nematode control only on the crop specified and in the amount directed on the label.

The omission of any crop name from the label may mean that no residue of that particular pesticide

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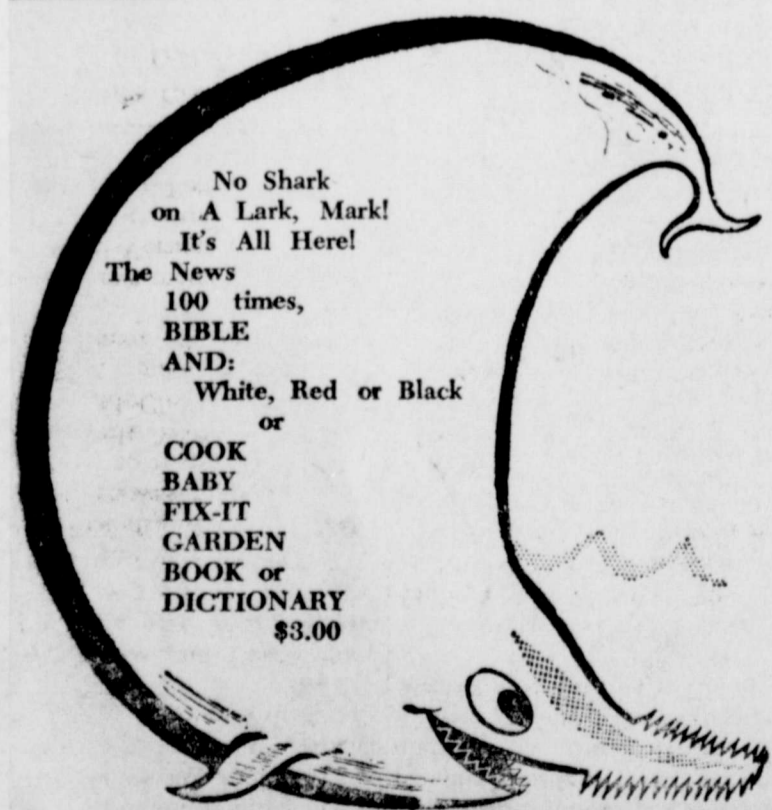
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
