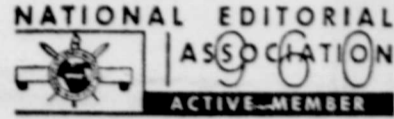

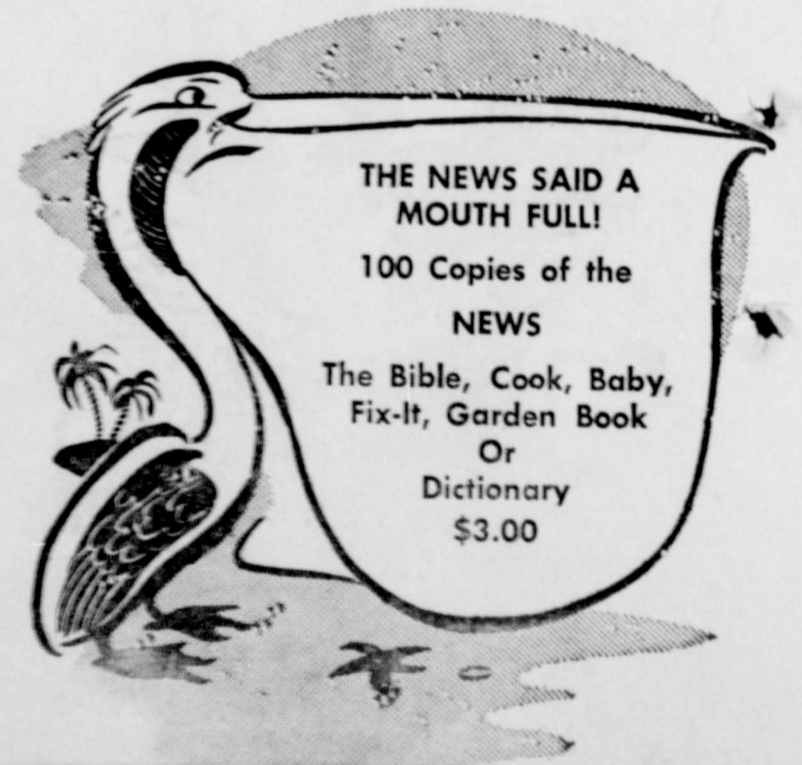

In Hospital; Has Window Tyler Man Has 18 Months Garden In Room

TYLER, Tex., April 7—The hold- of Tyler's record for general hospitalization was discharged last weekend after 18½ months in Medical Center hospital.

The patient is Charles E. Massey, 55, whose hospital bill was nearly \$13,000, most of it covered by insurance.

On Aug. 15, 1958, Massey was admitted with injuries of the spine, back, pelvis and left leg suffered in a four-vehicle collision. One vehicle was the truck he was driving for Cooperative Rose Growers of Tyler.

Massey doesn't remember exactly where the collision occurred ("Somewhere between New Orleans and Alexandria, La.," he says) that threw him out of the truck 50 feet on his back onto a bridge railing.

"He hit me so hard they gave my company a complete loss," he says. "I'm covered by compensation and liability and won't be out a dime."

Neither the long-term hospitalization, nor the fact that he will be a cripple for life—nor his doctor's advice of no work for a couple of years after he gets out of the hospital have broken the spirit of this remarkable man.

And add to that the brace he received recently to compensate for a left leg "four and three-fourths inches shorter" than its mate.

After seven operations on that leg, Massey, in the characteristic, cheerful way he has of putting things, points to a long incision scar and says:

"At one time, you could have put a carton of cigarettes in there."

Probably the biggest handicap of his hospitalization has been a loss of appetite for hospital food. Massey's gone down from the 190 pounds he weighed when admitted to 160 pounds.

"The hospital has fine food," he explains. "It's just that my stomach is so torn up with taking antibiotics I can't eat it."

So the Patient in Room 203 has turned it into his own private kitchen with a hot plate to boil eggs, make coffee "and warm up all kinds of canned foods." Even tamales.

Room 203 also sports a healthy garden on its window sill hanging from a large begonia plant to a desert cactus—and usually several starter pepper plants. Massey plants the pepper seeds in the many plastic containers in which nurses have delivered him hundreds of pills.

"They've carried many a one of those plants out of here as gifts," said the patient with a green thumb.

However, pepper plants in plastic cups are not the only gifts bestowed by the patient with "a suitcase of get-well cards."

Out for one of his periodic therapeutic jaunts, Massey stopped off at a downtown Tyler bank to do his Christmas shopping.

One purchase?

Thirty-eight silver dollars—one for each of the employes on the hospital's second floor.

Christmas, 1959, was better than usual too because he had his holiday dinner away from the hospital. Mrs. O. Z. Beall of Tyler, his sister-in-law, was hostess to Massey and his daughter, Miss Charlene Massey, with whom he maintains an apartment.

But as usual, Massey was gone only a couple of hours. After dinner, it was back to the hospital where he has spent every night of his hospitalization.

"I'm tearing their day record all to pieces," he says. "And
