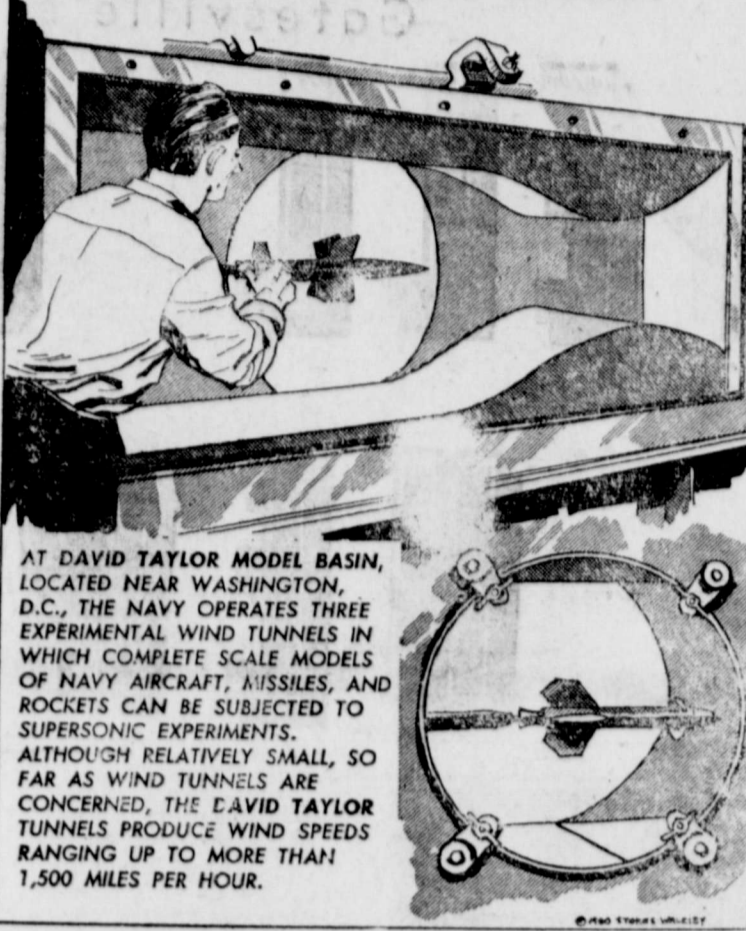

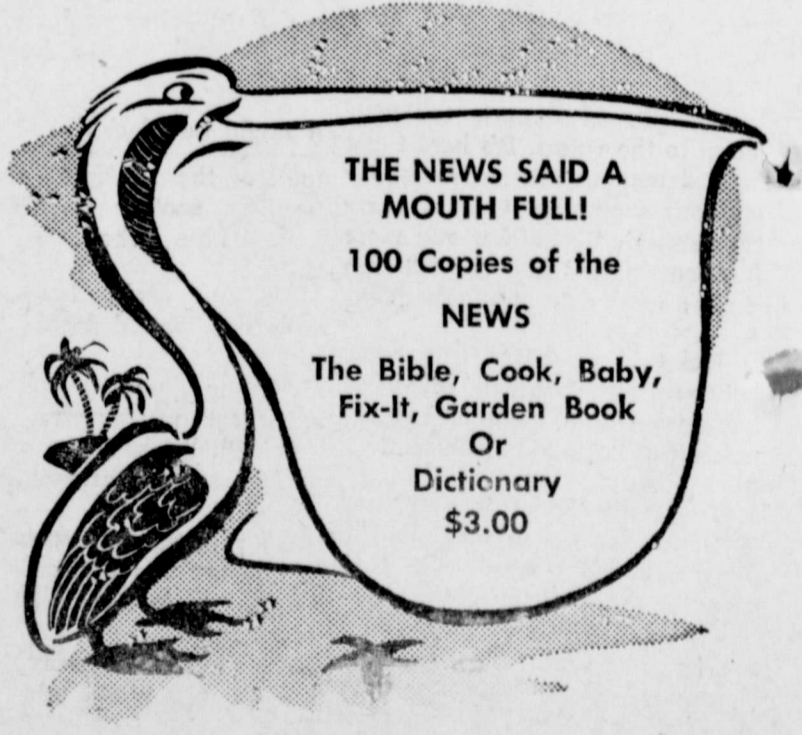

McCarter and other personnel executed a parachute jump from 1200 feet as part of an air mobility exercise which was one of the features of the festival.

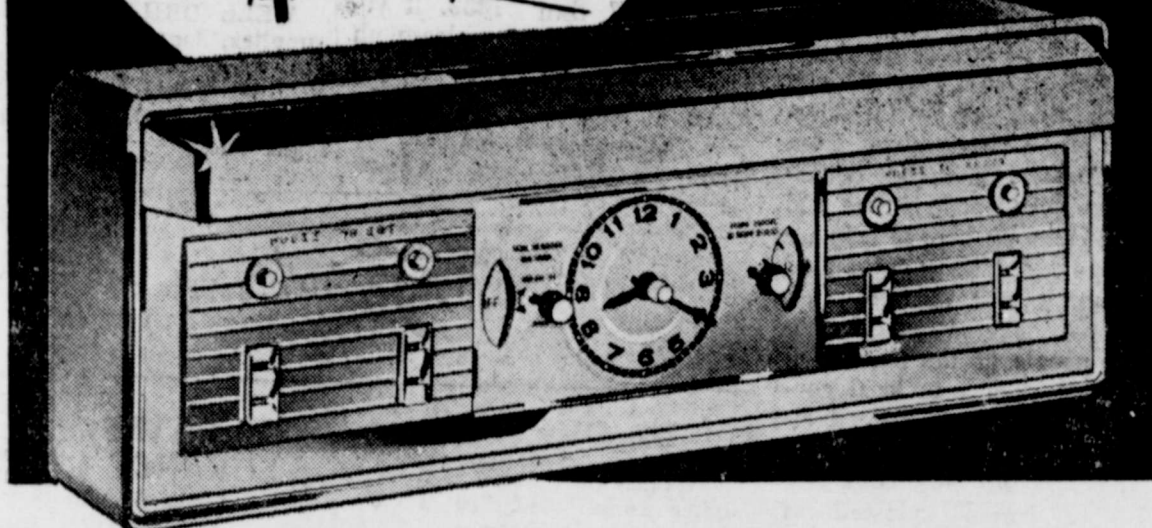

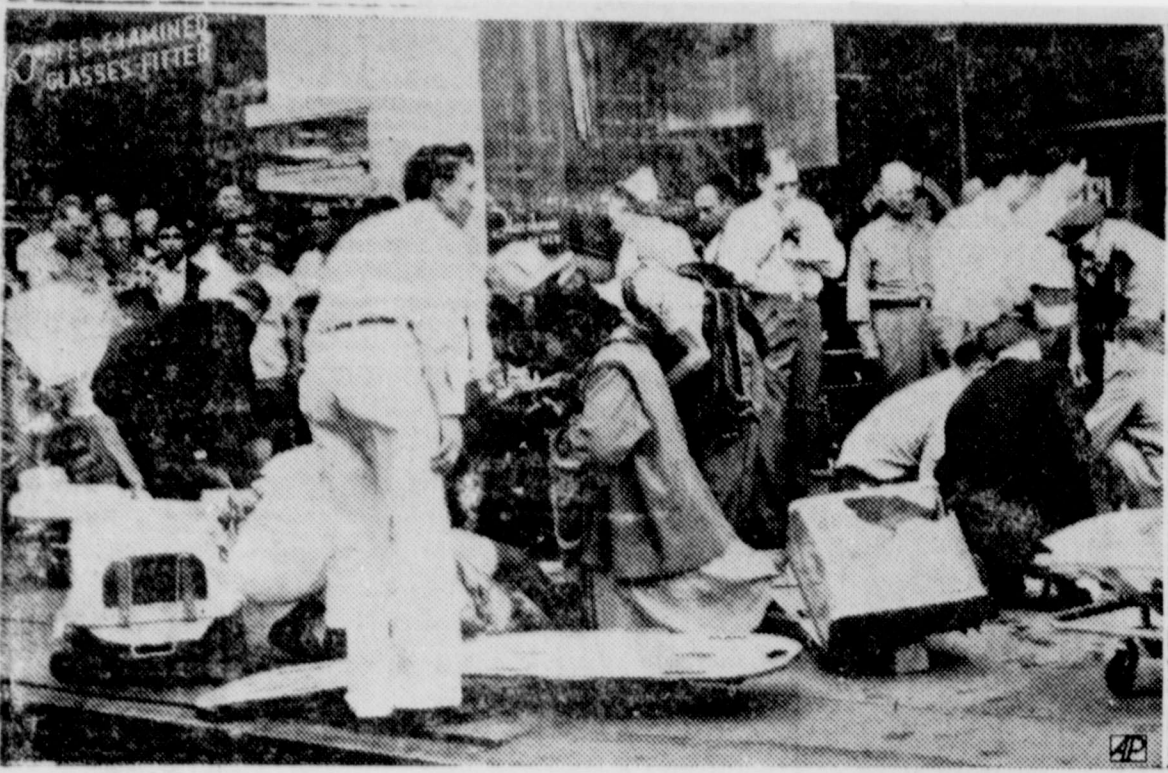

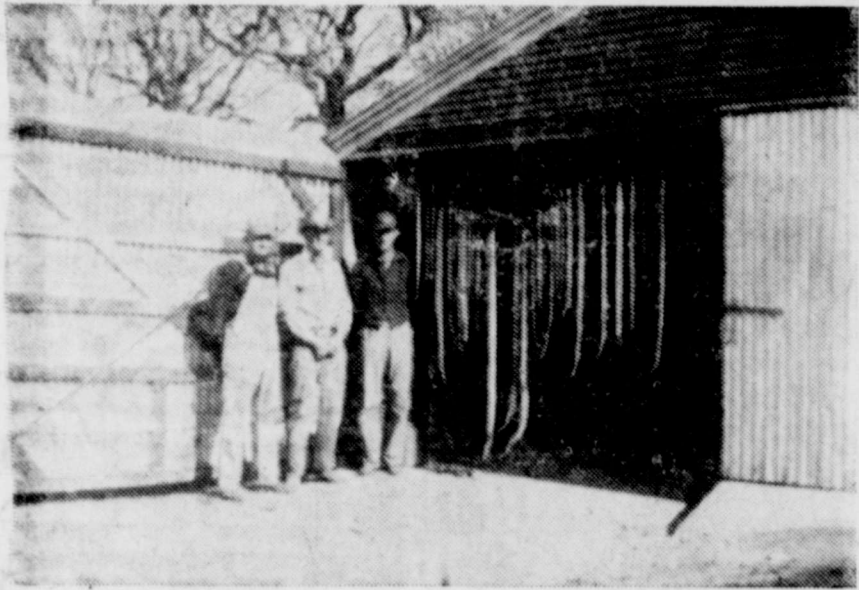

31 snakes were killed in one den on the Boyce Conner ranch, 3 of which measured over 5 ft. in length and 4 inches in diameter.

19 were killed on Keith Brook's ranch, 10 on Kenneth Conner's ranch, 23 on Mrs. Nellie Conner's ranch, 7 on Albert Hanes ranch, 20 on Mitchell Winters' ranch and 4 on the Boots White ranch.

Those participating in the hunts were: Leroy Standard, Boyce Conner, Jake Bowers, Kenneth Conner, A. C. Moseley, Grady Hanes and Boots White.

Three hunters sprayed gasoline in the snake dens, and shot the snakes as they came out for air. Mr. Standard remarked that it will be too dangerous to hunt rattlesnakes from now on, as the snakes will go farther from their dens as the weather warms up.

It is hoped that the hunters resume their fight against those deadly reptiles next winter and spring.

Dear friends:

Each year it is necessary for great groups of public-spirited citizens so come to Washington at their own expense to urge the Appropriations Subcommittee to include funds for their local Public Works Projects.

Too often we speak of the other fellow's projects as Pork Barrel. Of course there are bound to be a few unnecessary or extravagant projects over the U. S. but surely most of them are highly desirable. Who in Waco would not say that we need a reservoir and also the Whitney Dam? Who in Milam Co. would not recognize the need for the control of the floods of the Little River? Who in Temple would say that the Belton Reservoir was a waste of money? These are the types of projects which are called "Pork" if they are a long ways away. This week we have had especially large delegations from Central Texas. I think that our citizens who give up their time and money to come up here to help are to be commended. They did a good job. I hope it may succeed.

Each year there is an effort to give the people of the District of Columbia some form of local government and a vote in federal elections. I have pointed out that Washington is the only large city without any bonded indebtedness and that the tax rate here is much lower than in most cities. I can't believe that if we were to turn over local affairs to the pressure groups that exert such a great influence here that the finances of good shape.

There are many good reasons for not allowing the people who depend on the expenditures of the Federal government for the very existence of their city to have a voice in controlling that government but it is possible that some of these reasons are not as valid as they were at the time of the adoption of the Constitution. Let us therefore assume that the people of the D. C. make a good argument of the right to vote, does it not still follow that if they are to receive all the rights of citizenship the city would long remain in one of the 50 states that they should accept the burdens of citizenship? I have therefore felt that before we give them the vote that we should return to the state of Maryland from which this part of the district came. The other part

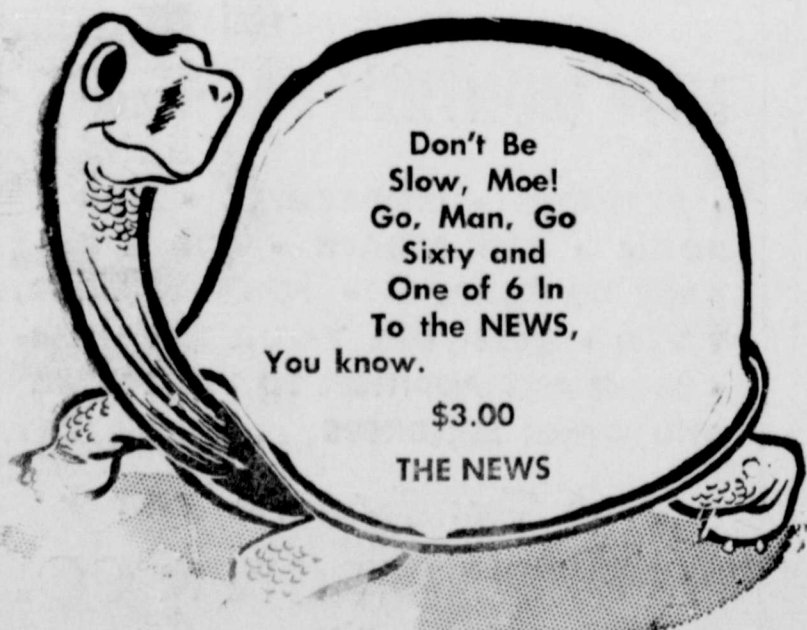

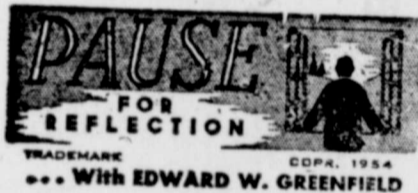

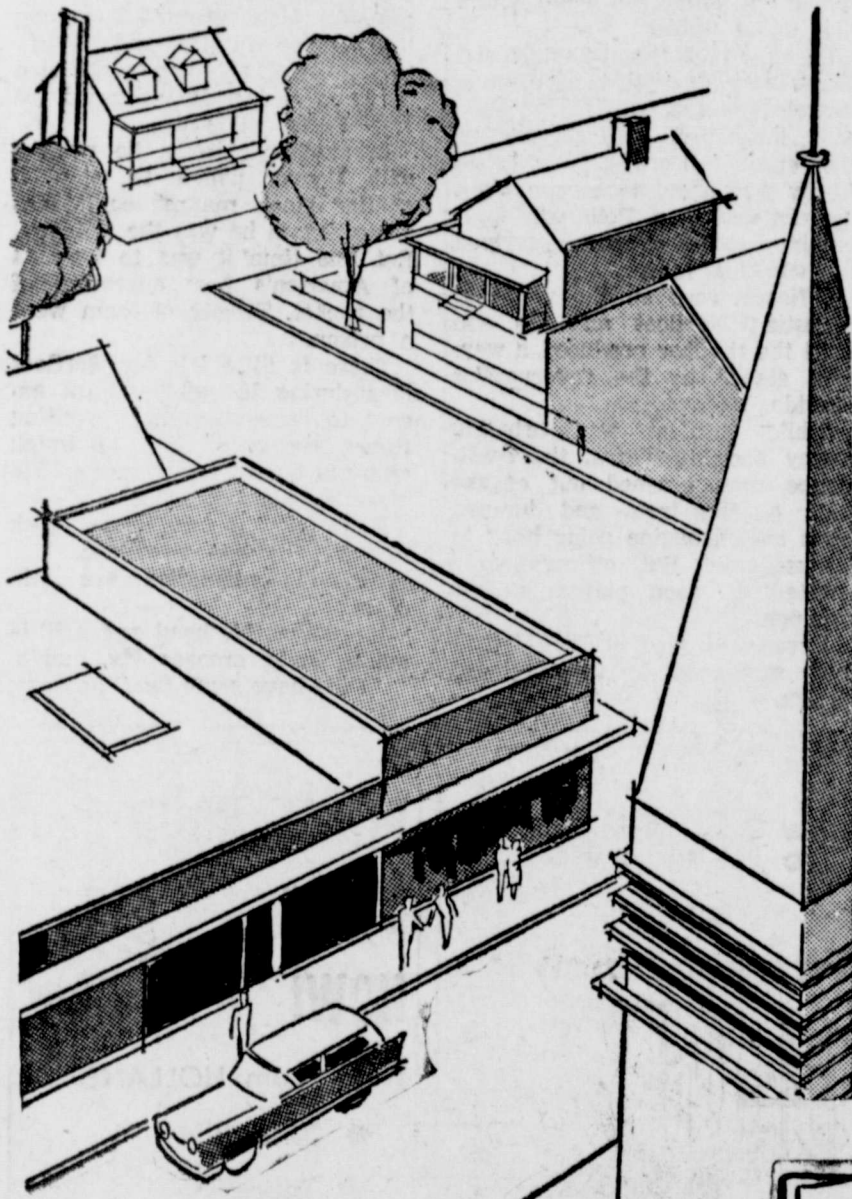

**J. FRANK NORFLEET STILL ACTIVE AT 95: WORLD FAMED PEACE OFFICER**

**HALE CENTER, Tex., Apr. 3, (AP)**—A living legend, J. Frank Norfleet, still has zest for this world, although he's 95 and ready to argue he's 100.

Norfleet, an amateur, became a sensational manhunter more than three decades ago after five swindlers took \$45,000 from him in Dallas.

The West Texas rancher saw all five placed in prison. And his activities sent at least 61 other criminals to the penitentiary.

"I'm 100 years of age, never mind what the papers say," he shouted to Emmet Collins of the Houston Post during a recent interview.

"You're 95," his wife shouted to penetrate his deafness. "He's always wanted to live to be 100, so he says he's 100. He's 95. I'm 89."

Norfleet heard more than expected. "I'm 10 years older than you by three days," he declared loudly.

His saga began in Dallas in 1919.

"I worked my way up," said Norfleet in the interview. "I was a ranch hand, then a foreman. I saved my money. I began to do a little trading to make more money. And I was able to get more. I later got my own ranch,

He received a telegra mthat Furey had died in the Texas prison.

"But I wanted to see Furey's body, Norfleet says. "In some circles he had been considered dead for eight years." The body was buried in Oakland, Calif., and Norfleet obtained permission to have the body exhumed. It was Furey all right.

In another episode, he worked with Denver police to stop a similar stock market confidence game. Again he was the fall guy. But this time it was to trap 34 of America's best operators of the rackel. Twenty of them went o prison.

There is little left for Norfleet now during his aging years except to remember those exciting times. He would like to watch quarter horse races more. He owns some good ones.

He wants to see more cock fights if he has a chance.

But the memories are still strong.

He shakes his head and a little smile creases his mouth. "I did have some fun," he says.
