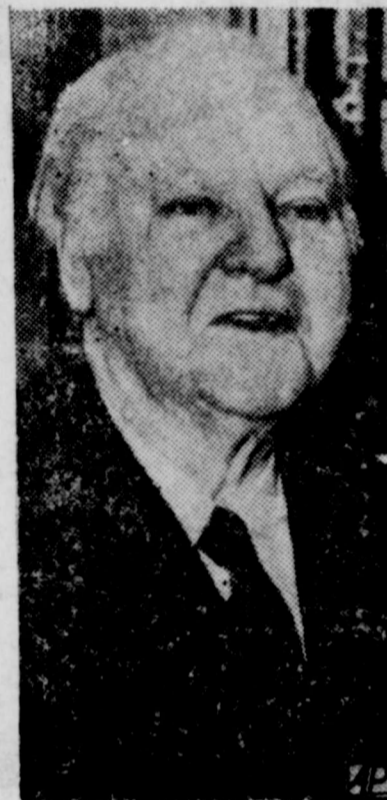

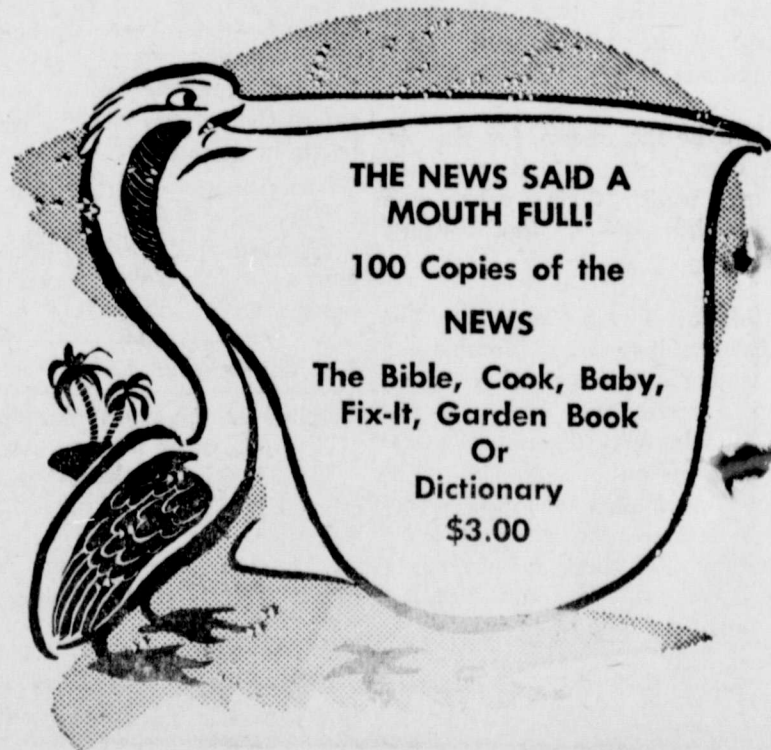

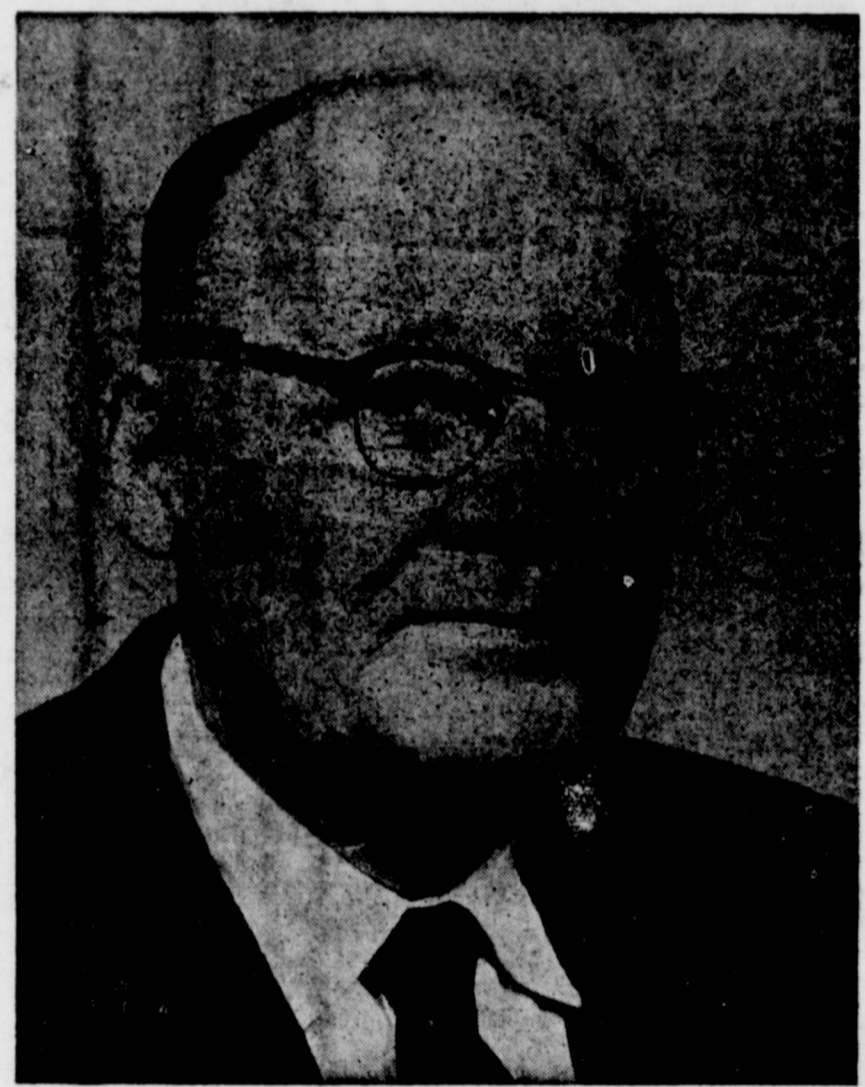

GIVES KEY POINTS

Jerry Sadler today laid down key points to his program for



overhauling the mixed-up responsibility and management of State-owned lands.

Sadler, former Railroad Commissioner and now completing his sixth year as State Representative from Palestine and Anderson County, said that responsibility for control and management of State Lands is now so divided that no one in authority knows precisely how much land is actually owned by the State.

"You can get estimates ranging anywhere from 8,000,000 to 9,000,000 acres," said Sadler. "There is lots of land in Texas, but not enough for the State to be juggling the property of the taxpayers around without proper accountability."

Sadler outlined three main points of his program as follows:

1. Require all records pertaining to State-owned lands to be deposited with the General Land Office for verification, inventory, and survey where necessary.

2. Make the General Land Office responsible for a perpetual inventory of all State Lands, showing the department or agency holding or controlling the lands, use and appraise valuations, and all other information necessary for a full and complete record of State-owned lands. Sufficient funds should be appropriated for the Land Office to keep this inventory completely up-to-date.

3. Make it one of the chief duties of the Commissioner of the General Land Office to report in detail every two years to the Legislature all changes in the inventory, including significant changes in land values.

"This program," said Sadler, "follows the recommendation of

Wiley Monroe McBroom, 75, died Apr. 18 at 3 p. m., at his home at Coryell City. He was a retired farmer.

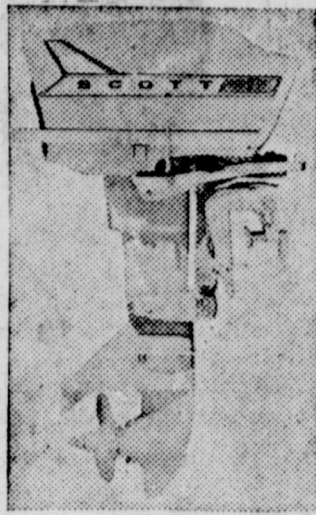

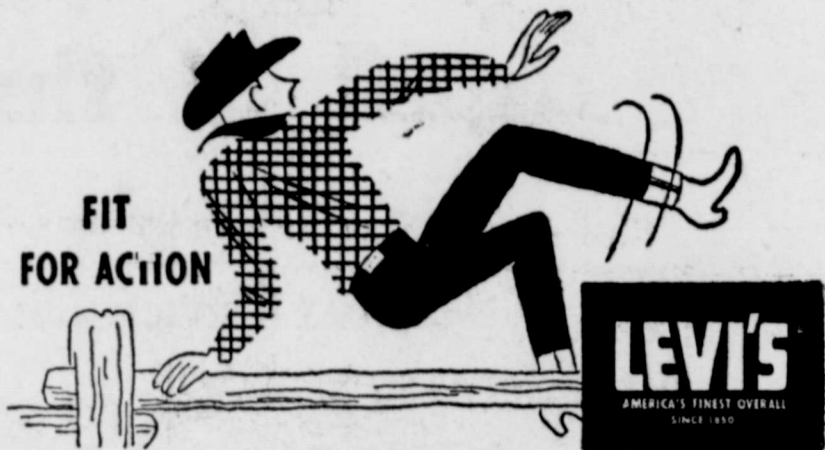

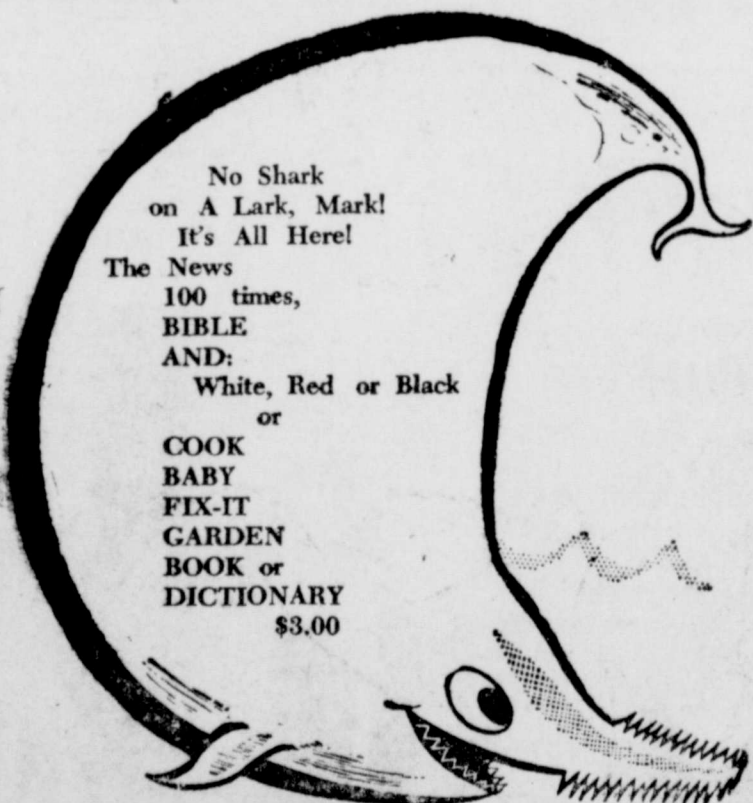
