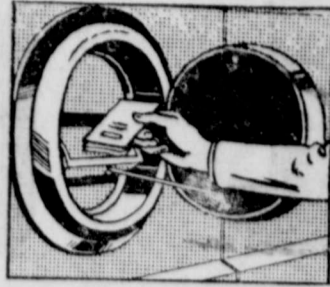

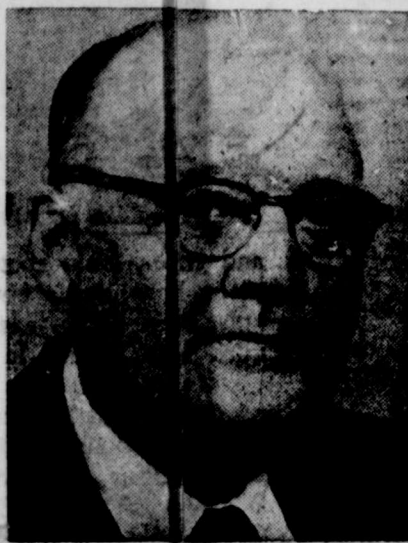

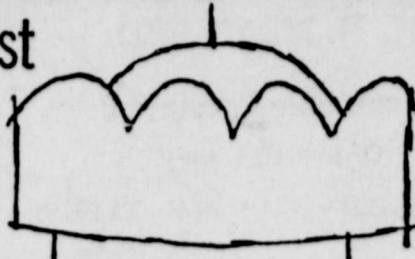

Dear Friends:

On several occasions in the past, I have pointed out that there is some good in foreign aid. The Marshall Plan which rebuilt Western Europe also probably prevented most of it from going communistic. Too many people forget that just a few years ago the Communist Party was on the verge of controlling both Italy and France. As those two Nations rebuilt their industry and put their unemployed to work, the threat of Communism diminished. It must, therefore, be recognized that the Marshall Plan which made possible the restoration of European industry was of tremendous military value to the United States because if the Communists were in control in Italy and France today our military expenditures would obviously be probably twice as much as they are. In like manner, the Nations of Western Europe are now among our best customers. Had they been allowed to remain in bankruptcy, they could not have provided any market for American goods. The

I supported this rebuilding of Europe, but when we were called upon to finance the complete development of dozens of Nations all over the world where there had never been a developed economy as there had been in Europe, it seemed to me that we were taking on too great a burden. This is not to say that we could not help ourselves and help the world by sound assistance to many undeveloped Nations, but if we are going to help these Nations, I think we have a right to demand that they should, in turn, cooperate with us. In other words, there is no reason for our building up the strength of some Nations simply to enable them to more effectively kick us in the teeth. I believe in putting "strings" on our aid. Our State Department does not believe in this. I don't think we owe anybody any aid. Our State Department seems to feel that we have an obligation to support every bankrupt economy in the world.

I would gladly vote to extend aid through development loans, food for the needy, etc., to all friendly countries, but year after year the Foreign Affairs Committee brings us a bill which requires much of the United States and nothing from the recipient countries, a bill which cloaks all of our activities in secrecy, a bill which does nothing to correct the admitted improvident and unwarranted waste to say nothing of the graft which has crept into the program.

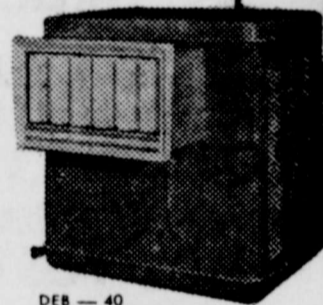

Fly fishing a new sport? Hardly. There is evidence that the first artificial fly was used about 200 B. C. for catching trout-like fish. As it was described at that time, the Red Hackle, as it was called, consisted of a hook, two feathers and a piece of red wool. It must have been used with great success because Claudius Aelian, a fisherman and writer of that generation, described the fly in every detail in some of his writings.

English-made flies were the first "professionally-tied" flies to be used in the United States. Fly fishing was pioneered in this country by Theodore Gordon who created patterns "most unlikely" to catch fish. It was later proven, however, that his flies met with much success.

Bait-casting lures go back further than the Romans when the Ancients concocted lures of stone and bone and later graduated to the metal lure. The Romans used clam shells as lures and during the 18th century, copper and brass lures were used to catch northerners in the European countries. The American spoon-type lure, as we know it today, was developed, patented and manufactured by J. T. Buel in the early 1800's. The "Father of the Spoon" found that fish hit his common tablespoon, less handle, equipped with hook, with a great amount of enthusiasm.

Spinning lures are now becoming more and more popular throughout the United States. The developer is said to be none other than Archie Spinner, an Englishman, who fished a dead minnow on a hook to give it a spinning action. The French and Swiss began making spinning lures on a large production scale just after the turn of the century. The United States has many baits which are strictly of the spinning variety, however, most of them are off-shoots of the popular casting lures.

Shell, spoon-like artificial baits were the first reported salt water lures. Capt. James Cook noted that he saw the natives of Hawaii catching ocean-going fish with this lure back in 1772. Now salt water lures are available in almost every size, shape and weight with all the trimmings.

With the many advancements made in the manufacture of all artificial baits, fly-casting, bait-casting, spin-casting and spinning, fishing has become more popular than ever for
