At the Tuesday meeting of the Commissioners' Court a new justice of the peace was 'created' for Precinct 5, which is the new voting precinct No. 21, Copperas Cove and covers that city and adjoining community. Alfred Saegert was named for the next 2 years after which time the place will be elective.

Judge Norman Storm said at a later date a Constable will be named for the precinct.

Other action included receiving a delegation from Ater-Levita Communities requesting a new 2 mile stretch of country road. So far, no action was taken.



FORT HOOD, (AHTNC) — Army Recruit Sammy J. Disinger, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Dyis participating with other personnel from the 1st Armored Division in Exercise Big Thrust, a two-week field maneuver at Fort Hood. The maneuver is scheduled to end May 15.

Big Thrust, being conducted under simulated combat conditions, is providing nearly 6,000 participating troops with training in military operations expected on the modern battlefield.

"SMALL BUSINESS"

Apparently, in the official viewpoint along the Potomac, there are two kinds of Indians. There are the American Indians and the Indians of India.

It also seems apparent, if money is a guide, that in Washington they have not yet forgotten about Custer.

C. W. Harder and believe only good Indians are those in India.

Bear in mind that last year India, and Pakistan, which was a part of India, received over a quarter billion dollars of U. S. foreign aid.

The late Sen. Richard Neuberger was quite anxious to get a bill passed removing the restrictions on the Indian vocational training program. At present time, no more than \$34 million per year may be spent teaching American Indians between the ages of 18 and 35 in skills that make it possible for them to earn a living. Hundreds of American Indians wait this training.

Yet the Indians of India get over a quarter billion dollars and look for more just because their leadership cannot quite make up mind about how bad communism is for world.

Perhaps the American Indians have made a big mistake. Perhaps, they like every nation with its hand out, or any

other inside minority, should beat the tom toms that perhaps the communists are not such a bad sort after all.

And it is even possible they could have some excuse for this approach. After all, there are now about 400,000 American Indians, mostly shunted onto reservations.

In the Southwest, especially, they must depend on some of the world's most barren land.

Of course, there is never any question that the American Indians will ever approve communism. In fact, it is quite unlikely they even become good union members, which is probably held against them.

Yet the fact remains that given the opportunity to learn trades, not only would U. S. working force be enriched, but in addition, many thousands of Americans would become self-reliant and good customers of American business.

This would be the equivalent of adding another state larger in population than either Delaware or Vermont.

Thus, it is to be expected that millions upon millions will continue to be poured down the rathole that is the abode of the Indians of India.

But so far, there doesn't appear to be an extra million or two to make it possible for the Indians of America to get off the taxpayers' back. As one wag puts it "If you want to be an Indian today, you're much better off being an Indian in India than an American Indian."





LONE STAR GAS COMPANY GRANTED GAS RATE HIKE BY CITY COUNCIL

Lone Star Gas Company's application for a rate increase of 5.4 cents per MCF in each step of its rates for residential and commercial gas service was approved by the Gatesville City Council at its meeting on May 10, 1960. The new rate will become effective June 10, 1960. This increase to the average residential user would amount to only slightly more than one cent per day, it was pointed out by Lone Star's District Manager W. L. Routt.

On February 10, 1960, the Railroad Commission of Texas authorized an increase in the city gas charge of 5.4 cents per MCF. The rate revision requested by Lone Star and authorized by the City Council is the exact amount of the increase in the charge at the city gate ordered by the Railroad Commission. Mr. Routt emphasizes that the approved increase will only offset the increased cost of gas to the Distribution Division of the city gate. "The rate in effect in Gatesville prior to the council's action," Routt pointed out, "was based on our 1951 cost of service, yet the costs of serving our customers had increased continually since that year. In addition to the increase of 5.4 cents in the city gate charge, pipe costing \$100.00 in 1951 now costs \$159.30; meters are up from \$100 to \$126.70; vehicles, \$100 to \$140.29; and payroll cost per employee, \$100 to \$151.60.

The increased cost of purchasing gas in the field is the primary cause for the increased expenses in delivering gas to the city gate.

In recent years, numerous large gas pipe lines have been constructed from the gas producing area of Texas, Louisiana, and Oklahoma to virtually every section of the United States; and these new lines have vigorously competed for all available supplies of gas. Progressively higher wellhead prices have been offered by these new buyers, and Lone Star has, of necessity, had to meet these higher competitive prices for both existing gas supplies and for the new reserves required to protect the present and future requirements of our customers.

Mr. Routt expressed appreciation to the City Council for approving the Company's application. He said, "This modest in-

crease will help to provide additional funds needed by the Company to acquire and adequate gas supply."



is proper and fair. On the other hand, I don't believe that any of us would feel that it was fair for the Federal Government to step in and take sides between the towns which are competing for a particular factory. However, the House has just passed a bill which does exactly that.

On Wednesday the House passed the so-called "Distressed Area" bill. This measure, which was offered as a "relief" measure, provides that the Federal Government shall make both gifts and loans to industries which will move to the so-called "Distressed" area—generally, to West Virginia, Pennsylvania and New England, but including Texarkana and Laredo, Texas, and most of the counties around these cities.

I am willing to help people anywhere who need help but I am not willing to use tax money to move industry out of McGregor or Cameron to either Texarkana or Laredo or to some other State—and if we succeed in putting industry in some uneconomical location, is it not very likely to fail and leave the community in still worse shape?

I, therefore, voted against this measure.

Our Agriculture Committee has worked all week on the general farm bill. The one and only basic issue is whether we want to allow farmers to impose controls on themselves to stop the accumulation of further surpluses. If this is done, we should be assured of a price somewhat comparable to the prices farmers have to pay for what they buy. On the other hand, should we allow farmers to continue to build up further surpluses through unlimited production and then fix the support on their crops at some figure still lower than the low prices they have been receiving?

I believe that if farmers want to control their production they should be allowed to do so and should be assured a fair price in return. Practically all Republicans and about five or six of our 22 Democrats on the Committee believe that the Government should continue to support farm prices but at a very low level and that

up surpluses. The division on the Committee is very close. Farmers and taxpayers may have to wait yet another year to get either fair farm prices or a reduction in the build up of surplus commodities.


