### MISS PAT SIMS WINS JAYCEE ROAD-E-O: REPRESENTED AT HILLSBORO DISTRICT SUN.

Miss Pat Sims rode off with the top award in the Gatesville Jaycee Road-E-O — the first held in Gatesville, Saturday. Eighteen entered and 10 showed up. Her score on the written and driving totaled 320 out of a possible 400. She went to Hillsboro Sunday at 2 p. m., for the 'district' suppage.

Saturday morning a written test was given, after they passed out funny books entitled "Tommy Gets the Keys," put out by the B. F. Goodrich Company, Akron, Ohio.

Other scores were Elmo Powell 294, 2nd; Betty Brown 292, 3rd. Also Carroll Penny 277, Mimi Kay Weset 254, Gene Braziel 270, Gary Wendeborn 268, Jas. H. Sanders 269, and Delores Williams 238.

### HELMET SAVES OFFICER, BUT NOT OTHER OFFICER'S FINGER

E. C. Bauman, former of Gatesville and now with the police force at Odessa lost a part of his finger Wednesday night in a difficulty resulting from a ticket issued earlier that day for a loud muffler. The culprit bit off his finger.

Roy Aldridge in the same difficulty was hit over the head about 20 times with a tire iron after he had stopped Wesley Tucker 30, a 5-foot-4 tavern owner, who was charged with assault with intent to murder. Tucker's ankle was broken when one of a policeman's shoes went through the rear window of his car and caused him to lose control and it smashed into a parked car.

A second car pulled up when Aldridge was stopped and a man got out approached the patrolman with a tire iron. Policeman Roy E. Douglas 22 of Odessa, who was writing out the ticket for the first man shouted a warning but it was too late. Aldridge lost 8 teeth via surgery Thurs. morning and his jaw was broken.

### Purmela-Evant Vote On School Consolidation: Where Else Is There?

The 28th, Purmela and Evant will vote on the consolidation of Purmela with Evant, and qualified voters of the 2 districts will cast ballots at Evant and Purmela schools. Voting will have to pass in both, and if so, it will be followed by bond assumption elections in the district.

Purmela is to have their building for a Community Center, and money in their trustee fund is to be used for that purpose, if legal. Students now going to GISD will continue, and a bus will run thru the district from Gatesville picking up ONLY those students. An Evant school board member will resign and a Purmela member will be need. Transfer of properties will be 10 days after consolidation, provided a community center is organized.

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS AND NATURAL GAS SERVICE TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF GATESVILLE, CORYELL COUNTY, TEXAS, PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GATESVILLE:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered on or after the 10 day of June, 1960, the general service rate for sales of natural gas and natural gas service rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Gatesville by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

Minimum Monthly Bill \$1.00  
Readiness to Serve Charges \$.50 per month.  
\$.8433 gross per MCF; \$.759 net per MCF.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date.

This ordinance does not regulate any rate or charge except those specifically set out hereinabove.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth there is an imperative public need for an immediate change and adjustment in the rate for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency and the reading and passage of this ordinance at three separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and

be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the mayor.

**"GOD HAS BEEN HERE ALL THE TIME!"**

During World War II a boy from one of the churches in my town was stationed in England. He was a gunner in one of the large bombers and completed fifty bombing missions over Germany.

During a lull in the bombing and fighting, a chaplain from the air base decided to take a ride with this boy's crew. They got in the plane and soon they were out over the English Channel.

The flight was uneventful until they started over the mainland of Europe. Suddenly the air was filled with anti-aircraft shells and it looked as if their plane could not possibly escape being blown out of the sky.

It was the chaplain's job to encourage the boys. He took the microphone of the intercom and said, "Boys, be of good cheer, for God is with us."

From the rear gunner's position came the cynical reply, "He might be up there in front, Chaplain, but he shore ain't back here."

About the time the gunner finished his sentence, a shell came bolting through the fuselage near him. But by some unexplainable miracle it failed to explode as it came hurtling through.

When the terror-torn young man recovered his wits he called back to the chaplain, "Chaplain, please! I didn't

know it, but God has been back here all the time."

In a few minutes the pilot was able to set the crippled plane down safely without injuries or loss of life.

Many times God is all around us but we do not recognize Him. Often we feel we are all alone and forsaken, that no one cares or is concerned about us, but if we would just look around, we would discover that God had been there all the time.

The Bible tells us that God notices when a little sparrow falls to the ground. He is all observing and ever-loving, and He is by your side.

There is a promise in the Bible that means a great deal to me. It is, "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee." That means that God will be with me all the time; that I will never have to worry about a thing, because He will help me and meet my needs.

I am away from home a great deal. My wife and children must stay at home much of the time while I am away. One night several years ago, while I was in a crusade 1,400 miles away from home, my wife became very frightened and upset.

When she told me about it later, I told her, "Honey, don't ever be afraid again. God is awake all night long watching over you. God is with you all the time."


