MRS. ZORA GRAY, 67, DIED FROM INJURIES IN WRECK: ACCIDENTS IN NUMBERS

Tuesday evening was a bad day for Coryell County.

Mrs. Zora Gray, 67, died in Corvell Memorial Hospital early Wednesday morning following an accident 8 miles north of Gatesville on Sta Hwy. 36 at 9:15.

John Robert Cole, 20, of Gatesville, driving a '56 Chevy, and Henry Frank Hudspeth, 18, of Levita, driving a '49 Ford figured in the accident. Cole's car, State Highway Patrolmen said, hit the Hudspeth car in the rear, forcing it off the highway and it overturned. Mrs. Gray received a deep gash on her head and another one in her stomach. Cole suffered possible chest injuries, and Hudspeth was apparently not injured. Mrs. Lilie Hudspeth, 45, was also bodly injured in the accident and remained in the hospital. Jeanette Diserens, Rt. 3, received a right arm injury and was bruised and cut. John Thomas Diserens was uninjured.

Are you the kind of fisherman whopasses the buck when it comes time to clean your catch?

Well, Mr. Fisherman listen closely and take heed. Cleaning fish doesn't have to be a problem any longer, says: the Evinrude Boating Foundation. It's a lot of fun catching fish and it can be almost as much fun to clean them... if it's done properly.

Using a sharp, narrow-blade knife, cut through the back bone of the fish just behind the head and gills. Take up the fish in one hand and cut the skin around the dorsal fin and all of the way back to the tail along the spine. Take hold of the dorsal fin and pull it out. Don't cut off or cut out: the dorsal fin because there would bea good chance that many needle-sharp bones would remain in the flesh of the

Now grab hold of the skin just behind the head and pull it from the flesh of the fish. A pair of pliers can be used to make the job easier on larger fish. Stick your finger in the "incision" behind the head and pull the flesh from the skin.

Follow these directions and you will stay clear of cleaning up a mess of scales. I've been cleaning all of my lunkers this way for a long time and have found this method to be sound

D. . . sound if you follow directions!

Fishing is a lot of fun and a good, clean sport. Cleaning the mess afterward was a chore usually pawned off on other members of the family. Now it's easy and simple. it's easy and simple.
