VIPS, HIGH MILITARY AND "TOUGH 'OMBRES" FEATURE SAT. 10 AM PARADE, NFH

"Tough 'Ombres" of the 90th Division of Texans branded with the red T-O patch will roll the latest infantry weapons our of North Ft. Hood's wooded hills Friday to demonstrate their power in Uncle Sam's hands.

They will interrupt their training momentarily in the field for the spectacular arms display before distinguished Texans.

A 4-way VIP Airlift will originate at Amarillo, Marshall, Corpus Christi and Harlingen, bringing city and other government officials, C-C executives and other civic leaders.

They'll be transported by helicopter to training areas of their hometown units immediately after alighting from Air Force Aircraft. Hours later they will view the demonstration of the newly tested weapons which make the infantryman more vital than ever to the Nation's defense team. More than 8,000 from 53 Texas cities will participate.

Added to the civilian brass will be three top military leaders: Lt. Gen. Paul L. Freeman Jr., deputy commander, Reserve Forces, Continental Army Command; Lt. Gen. Edward T. Williams, 4th U. S. Army Commander, and Maj. Gen. C. Stanton Babcock, commandin general VIII U. S. Army.

Commanded by Maj. Gen. Earl Rudder, the T-Os are stressing training in the field withunits spending 4 nights on tactical problems. The big H-37 helicopter takes a major role in the 2-weeks training schedule.

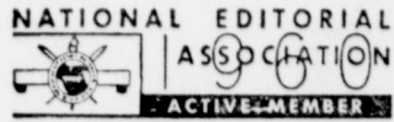
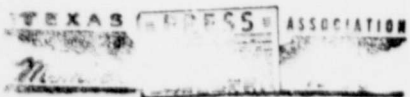

There continues to be an ever increasing flow of visitors across the Canadian-U. S. A. border, despite some fuss about Canadian money being at a premium over U. S. A. currency.

In 1959, U. S. A. visitors to Canada spent an estimated total of \$357 million more than 1958. While American tourists were distributing this vast sum to Canadian motels, restaurants, stores, etc., Canadian visitors spent an estimated \$454 million, south of the border.

During the past five years, Canadian visitors have spent an estimated \$2 billion in the U. S. A., while during the same period, Americans have enriched Canada to the tune of \$1.6 billion. Quite a business this exchange of visitors between our two countries!

The Canadian Travel Bureau has distributed more than five million leaflets over the past two years advising visitors to secure their Canadian funds from a bank upon entering Canada and to change any balance back to their own currency when they leave Canada. Posters at all border points carry the same advice. By following this advice, the American tourist can avoid a lot of headaches—keep his aspirin bills at a minimum.

And what about 1960? Unless there comes an unexpected severe collapse in our economies, indications at this time are that the 1960 tourist seasons will set new records in the number of Yanks invading Canada and Canucks trekking to the U. S. A.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"
 By C. WILSON HARDER

There is a growing problem in maintaining a healthy independent business structure in a given community. And in Washington, expert observers of the small business scene wonder whether or not it is a problem that can be successfully attacked at the federal level.



As a matter of fact, C. W. Harder there appears to be a growing sentiment that the problem should be attacked at the grass roots level.

In a report just released by a trade publication following a two year study by a marketing professor at Notre Dame, it has been found that the big food chains are moving rapidly into the field of other merchandise, plan further expansion.

In some areas of the country, chain food stores are found to be handling as many as 8,500 nonfood items, or more non-food items than food items.

The items handled included drug items, principally called health and beauty aids, baby needs, housewares, hardware, small appliances, stationery, greeting cards, toys, records, magazines, books, photo equipment, barbecue equipment, garden equipment and supplies, notions, hosiery, domestic men's apparel, women's children's apparel, jewelry, pet supplies.

...ly, the more independent enterprises there community health terms

of employment opportunities, shopping opportunities, taxes to maintain and improve the community and to provide for vital community services.

But if this chain trend goes to its logical conclusion, many communities could end up with a single store, which would end community progress and growth.

Thus, it is a general practice in each business community for a business to have a city license or permit. It should perhaps be the responsibility of local city government to revamp its business licensing system so that it would be impossible for a chain outlet, for example, licensed primarily to sell foods, to carry on lines of business which raids every tax paying independent business in the community.

Perhaps even preservation of good city government demands such action.

Or, it would be perfectly logical for a community to require an establishment handling food to be entirely apart and separate from a building handling other merchandise. It does not seem the most sanitary, not to mention aesthetic, situation for a store stocking food on one shelf to have garden fertilizer on the next shelf.

And also in the long run, such measures would undoubtedly return more food volume to independent dealers.

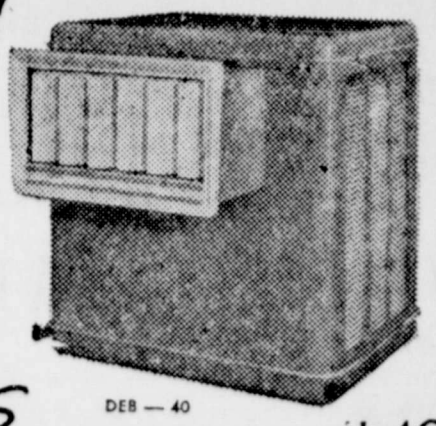

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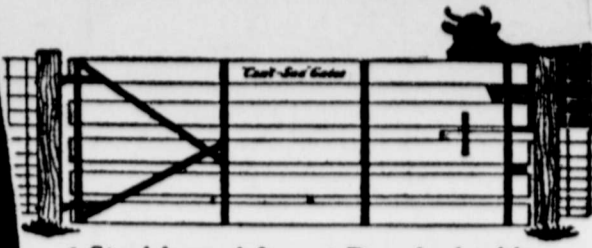
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LETTER FROM KRUSHCHEV

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"
By C. WILSON HARDER

There is a growing problem in maintaining a healthy independent business structure in a given community. And in Washington, expert observers of the small business scene wonder whether or not it is a problem that can be successfully attacked at the federal level.

As a matter of fact, C. W. Harder there appears to be a growing sentiment that the problem should be attacked at the grass roots level.

In a report just released by a trade publication following a two year study by a marketing professor at Notre Dame, it has been found that the big food chains are moving rapidly into the field of other merchandise, plan further expansion.

In some areas of the country, chain food stores are found to be handling as many as 8,500 nonfood items, or more non-food items than food items.

The items handled included drug items, principally called health and beauty aids, baby needs, housewares, hardware, small appliances, stationery, greeting cards, toys, records, magazines, books, photo equipment, barbecue equipment, garden equipment and supplies, notions, hosiery, domestic men's apparel, women's children's apparel, jewelry, pet supplies.

As a result, the more independent enterprises there are in a community the better the community health.

of employment opportunities, shopping opportunities, taxes to maintain and improve the community and to provide for vital community services.

But if this chain trend goes to its logical conclusion, many communities could end up with a single store, which would end community progress and growth.

Thus, it is a general practice in each business community for a business to have a city license or permit. It should perhaps be the responsibility of local city government to revamp its business licensing system so that it would be impossible for a chain outlet, for example, licensed primarily to sell foods, to carry on lines of business which raids every tax paying independent business in the community.

Perhaps even preservation of good city government demands such action.

Or, it would be perfectly logical for a community to require an establishment handling food to be entirely apart and separate from a building handling other merchandise. It does not seem the most sanitary, not to mention aesthetic, situation for a store stocking food on one shelf to have garden fertilizer on the next shelf.

And also in the long run, such measures would undoubtedly return more food volume to independent dealers.
