"Coryell County showed a 4-year increase in total business sales with \$1,426,000 gain. Sales in '54 were \$13,055,000 and in '58 \$14,481,000.

"Coryell County had 208 businesses in '54 and 219 in '58.

"Payroll for the county exceeded the million mark in '58 and hit \$1,049,000. In '54 it was \$840,000."

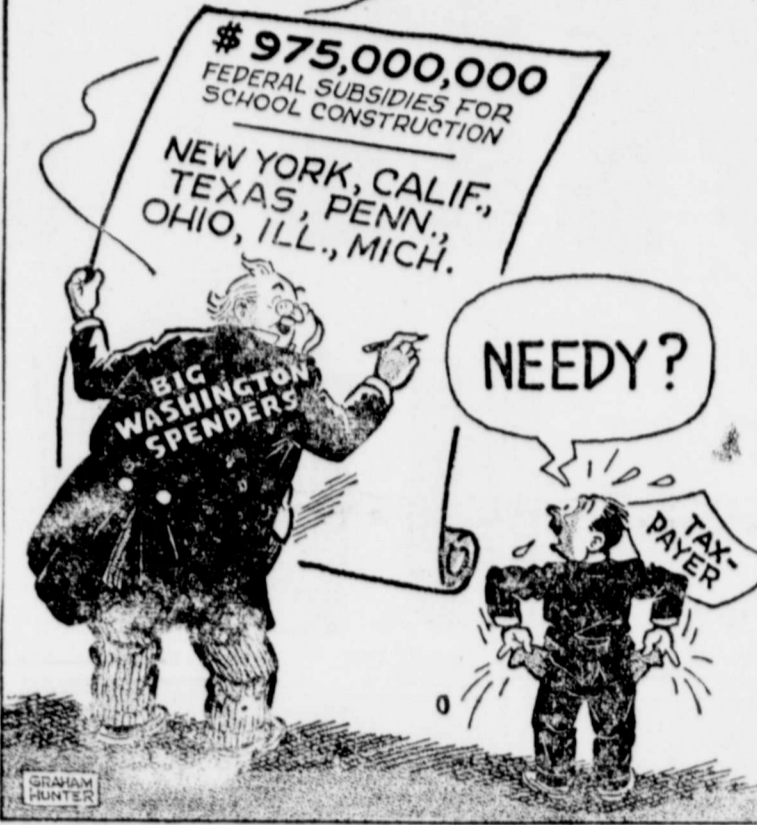

Dear Friends,

Since all sales for foreign currency actually have the effect of a loan I think that it would be much on credit than for local currency, better in most cases to simply sell.

If such sales are to be attractive to underdeveloped countries, they must be made on long time and at a very low interest rate. In addition we must be willing to guarantee delivery of specific amount at definite times. Without this assurance no underdeveloped country can dare to rely on this country as a source of vital food or fiber. I think we can very well afford to give such assurances in order to know that we have definite assured markets.

Since the underdeveloped countries all hope to develop their ec-

our young people have proved to be pretty good credit risks, so most young nations are good risks if someone will do their banking on a business like basis. I can see no reason why we can't afford to extend 40 or 50 year credit for these surplus commodities. Surely unless we do this, we are actually making sales which are too often but "gifts".

Even long time credit is of no help to a small country if the interest rate is so high that there is no prospect of repayment. Russia offers 2 per cent interest on many of her sales. I know that many people will rise up and shout that our government is paying over 4 per cent for money and will then ask if I want to subsidize foreigners.

Before answering that I want to call attention to 2 or 3 facts I need to sell these supplies. If we can't move them they are likely to wreck our farm program. (2) We are subsidizing foreigners both directly and indirectly through our present programs. We are selling for less than the world price. We are selling for foreign currency and then agreeing that we will not

chasers. We are paying freight to deliver our surpluses to foreigners.

I propose that we sell at the world price without any subsidy except favorable credit terms. I think we can afford these terms because I know that it is costing us about 14 or 15 per cent of the value of our grain each year just to hold them. Would it not be better to sell these stocks and get 2 per cent for them. Our Agriculture Committee has been trying to work out some such bill.

This is already too long but I should point out that on Wednesday the House extended a number of taxes. I feel that it is unfair to continue the wartime taxes on telephones an transportation. I voted NO

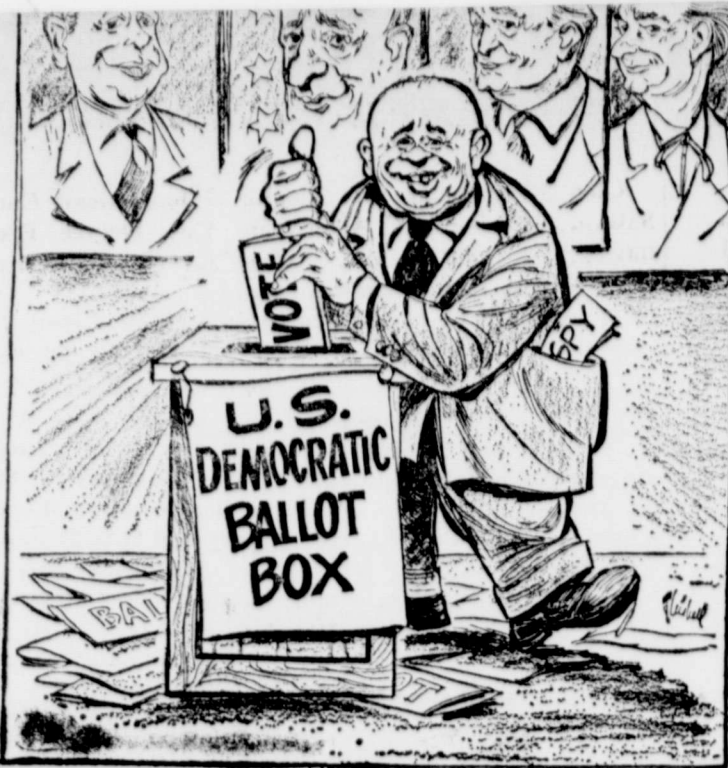

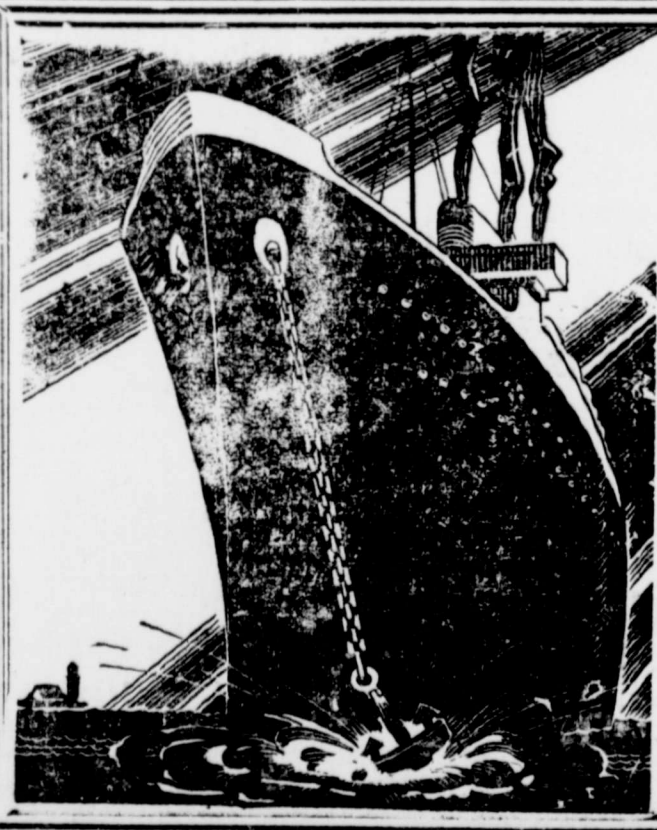

EVINRUDE BOATING FOUNDATION

By RUDY EVINS

"I've tried every one of those blame fishing theories and if you ask me they're for the birds."

Yet thousands of anglers are thoroughly convinced that one or more of these theories are fact and not fiction. During the next few weeks I will tell you a little of what I know about these theories but the conclusion will be left up to you.

The Temperature Theory is one that is being marketed to a great degree today. A veteran guide of Wisconsin lakes swears by it and says he has caught fish in waters that have been "fished out."

Cold water species, trout, salmon, etc., usually prefer water that ranges between 32 and 59 degrees Fahrenheit. The other group, the warm water species, perch, bass, northern, walleye, etc., prefer water up to 70 degrees.

There are hundreds of theories available to all fishermen. If all of these theories, or even two or three of them, were combined there would be a seven to ten or more degree range in temperature where these fish are said to feed. Here are two examples of the Temperature Theory.

- Theory A:
- Walleye, Northern—58
  - Large Mouth Bass—68
  - Small Mouth Bass—62
  - Muskie—67
  - Panfish—63
- Theory B:
- Walleye, Northern—55-70
  - Large Mouth Bass—70-72
  - Small Mouth Bass—67

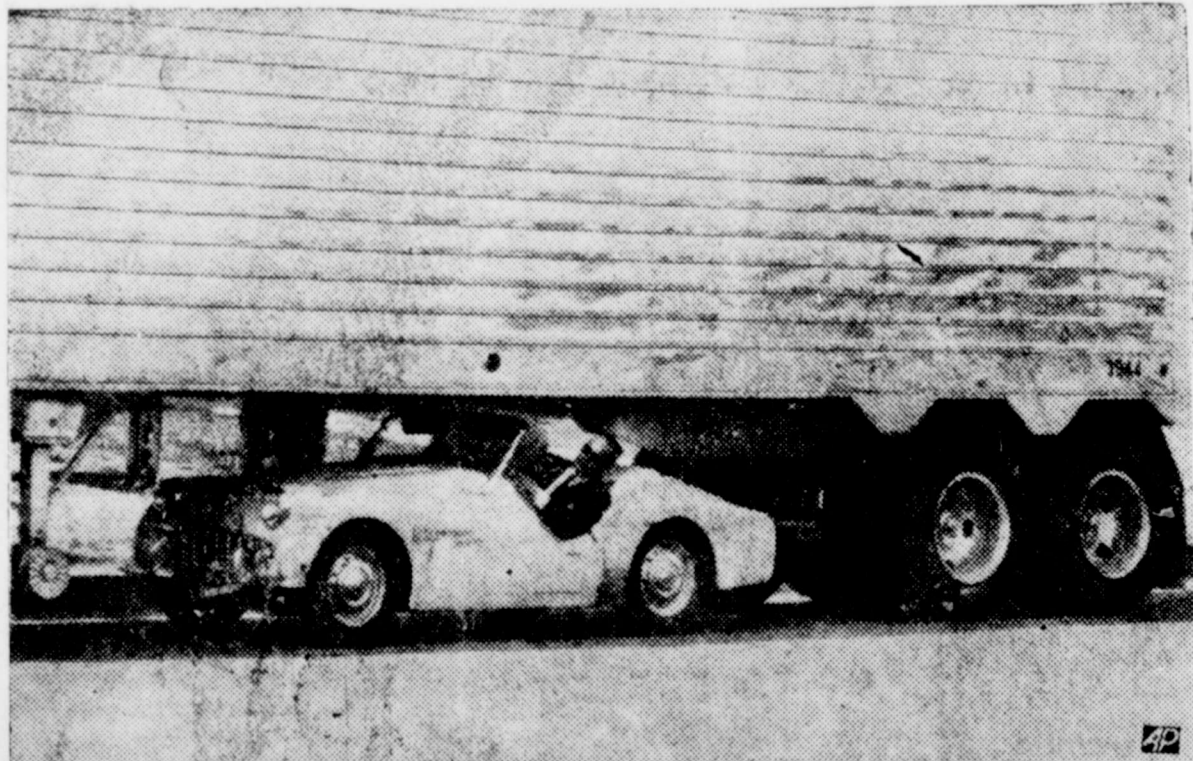
