"3 JONES BOYS" HIT WITH THOMAS KID: TWO S. STAS. BURGLARIZED: NEGROES

"3 Jones boys" and Bobby Joe Thomas, on probation from SSB, "hit" Gatesville Thursday night, and more particular Van Cleve's Skelly Service Station and the Phillip 66, operated by the late Dub Henson. The Jones boys were Harlen 25, Johnny 19 and Bailey.

Don't get excited, they're all colored, and claimed no kin to Mat Jones, Deputy Sheriff A. D. Chesnut said, they said.

They hit the Phillips station, broke out a window, rifled the cigarette machine, and got a small amount of money. At the Skelly gasserette, they broke the lock on the front door and got 2 cartons of spark plugs, some pennies, etc.

Touring white boys, Jackie Palmer and Jim Riley, saw them and called Sheriff Winfred Cummings about 2:30 a. m., and he chased, calling Waco police who put up a road block and captured them just at the city limits. They confessed to the 'jobs' here, some at McGregor and some in Waco.

WASHINGTON AND SMALL BUSINESS

Every ship that sails the seas has designed into its hull a resistance to storms. If it lists to one side to say a 60 degree angle, or so, it is built to recover from this list and come back on an even keel. However, if it lists over beyond the limits the hull was designed for, the ship usually founders.



And there is considerable doubt at present over the wisdom of the maneuvering of credit the past few years by the Federal Reserve Board. As expressed by these observers, there is always the danger the Federal Reserve Board governors can take action that will founder the economy.

For some time, the nation's independent businessmen, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, have been in favor of there being small business representatives on the Federal Reserve Board.

The Federal Reserve Board is a fairly new-fangled thing. It was not started until 1913, about the same time the income tax law was passed.

In the past few years, with taxes to finance foreign give aways holding down business reserves, credit, in one sense of the word, has become more important than cash.

The Federal Reserve Board has in actual fact become a national business

made scarce to hold off inflationary forces. If economy declines, credit is loosened.

In the three business recessions of the past ten years, 1954, 1958 and the first part of 1960, several months prior to the slump taking place, credit was made scarce. In 1954 and 1958 the ship was put back on an even keel by loosening credit. It is too early to tell what will happen in 1960, but it is felt that this frequent listing of the ship may result in a situation where it cannot right itself.

The governors of the Federal Reserve Board are, by and large, men of integrity. But they are usually drawn from the rarified atmosphere of major financing.

Grandiose plans by a few big industrialists mean nothing if Main Street cannot sell the products of these factories.

It is also possible that to combat inflation, credit should be made scarce for purpose of building more productive capacity. But that does not necessarily mean that low cost credit is not needed to expand distribution facilities in the nation.

It is quite possible for the controlling body of a nation's credit to get so engrossed in one segment of the economy that it loses sight of the others.

And after all, the furnaces of Pittsburgh, the assembly lines of Detroit, are useless junk unless there are healthy distribution facilities on Main Street. Thus, handling of nation's credit is too vital a thing to be left with a restricted viewpoint. Small Business representation on Federal Reserve Board appears to be long over due.

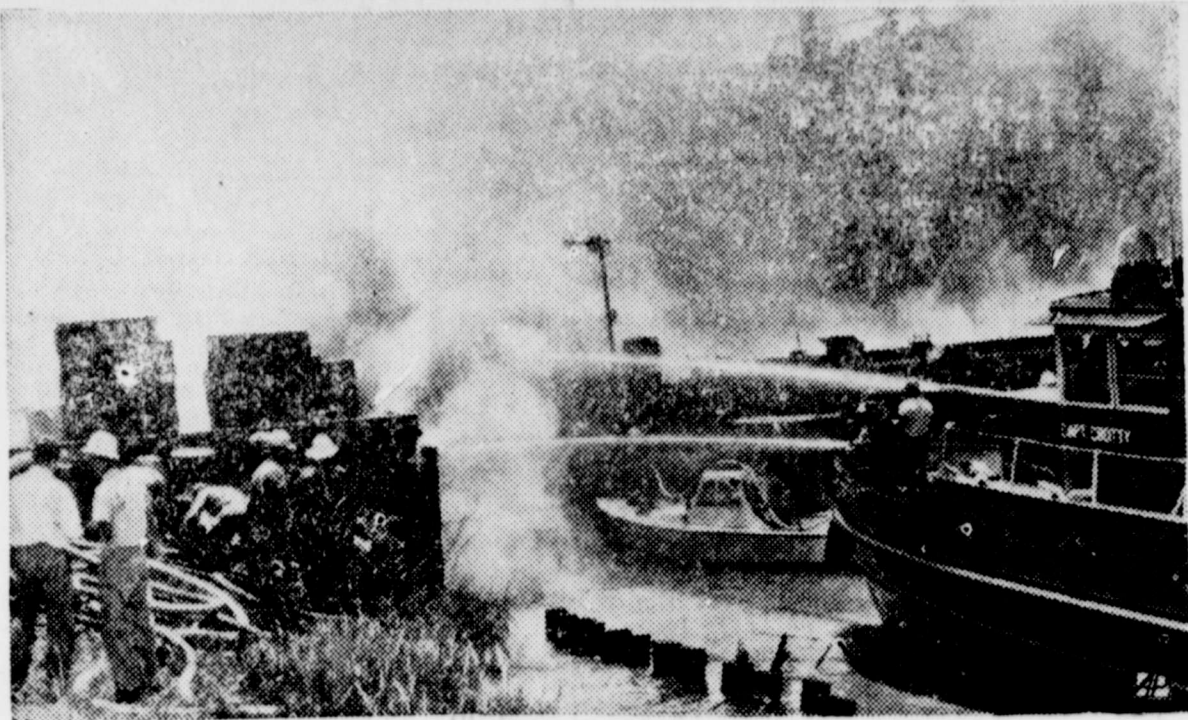

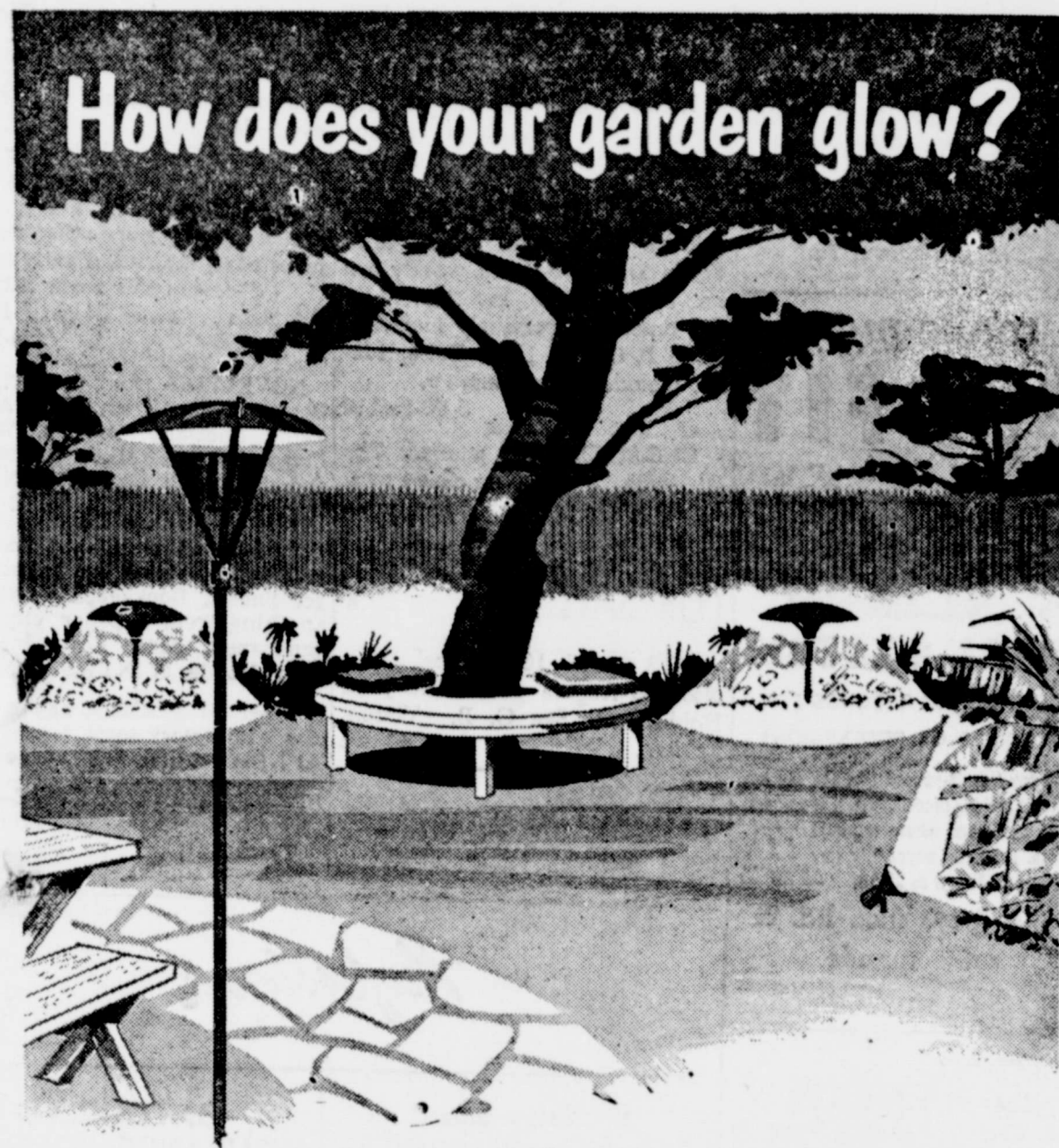

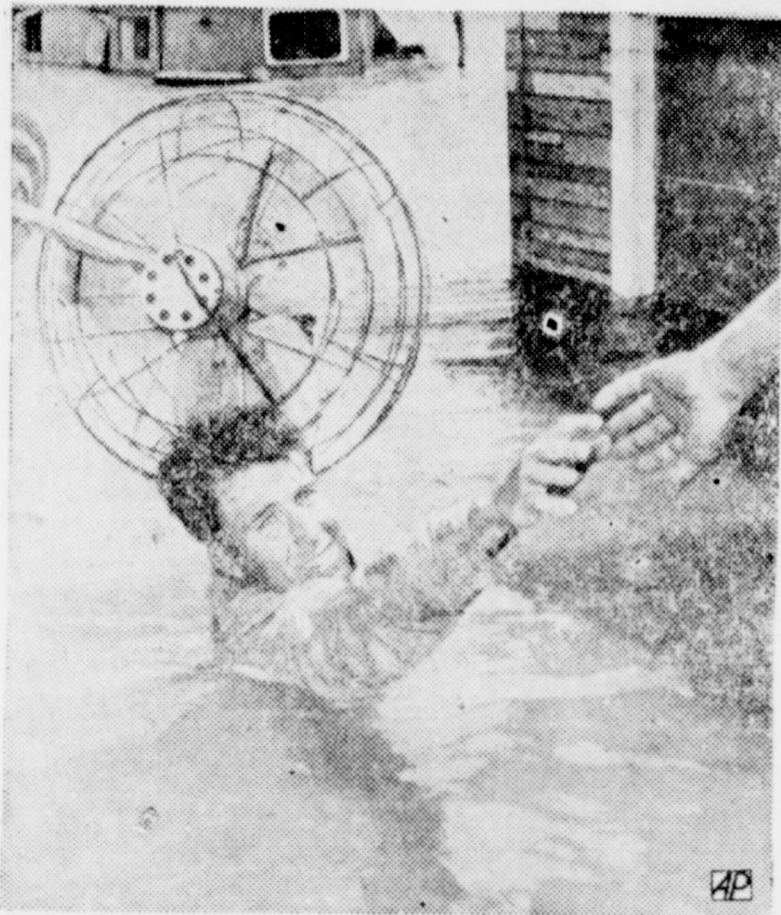

GATESVILLE SOUTHERN AGRICULTURE CONFERENCE IN TEXAS

One of the most important agricultural caucuses of the 1960 presidential election year, the annual meeting of the 14-state Southern commissioners of Agriculture, will be held June 10-13 at the Hilton Hotel in San Antonio with the Texas Department of Agriculture as hosts.

The San Antonio session will mark the first time the Southern commissioners ever have met in Texas as a group, and a cooperative effort among all phases of Texas agriculture is being extended to make their visit memorable.

This 1960 meeting of the commissioners will hold special significance because it comes only a month in advance of the Democratic national convention and will in effect, amount to a Democratic Party agricultural caucus. The Southern group can be ex-

pected to speak out in definite terms on what they feel is most needed in terms of political action by agriculture in their region.

A list of nationally prominent speakers is slated to address the meeting, and an extensive program of entertainment has been arranged.

Agriculture Commissioner S. E. (Si) Corley of Mississippi is president of the Southern commissioners, and in accordance with precedent the Texas Agriculture Commissioner, now vice president, is due to be made president at the 1960 session. Membership of the Southern Commissioners of Agriculture includes the states of Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and West Virginia, in addition to Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. Virtually all of these are due to be represented at the San Antonio meeting.

Decisions reached at the San

Antonio session may, in effect, become the basis of what will emerge as planks in the agricultural platform of the Democratic Party nationally for the 1960 election. Each of the commissioners is regarded as a party leader in his own state, and several have expressed the hope that in this meeting a Democratic program may be developed which will reverse what they regard as some of the ruinous farm policies of the present administration.

The commissioners and their staffs will begin arriving in San Antonio on Friday, June 10; and their sessions will continue through most of the day on Monday, June 13.
