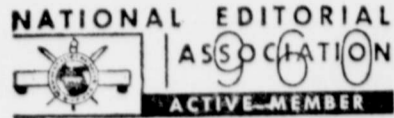

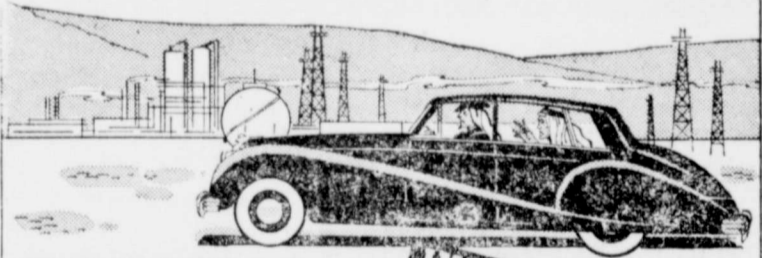

3- WHEEL ELECTRIC CAR IS SHOW-PIECE IN CORPUS

CHRISTI: 80-YEAR OLD LADY

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. July 7, (AP) — The jaunty little three wheeled car weaving its way in and out of traffic no longer startles drivers on busy Corpus Christi streets.

Driven by sprightly Mrs. Iva Tribble, the electric car, powered by batteries, has contributed to its 80 year old owner's independent way of life despite her age and a broken leg.

It's a far cry from the horses

she used for transportation as a young girl in Van Buren, Ark.

The daughter of a successful farmer and the third of nine children, Mrs. Tribble was as at home on a horse as on the ground.

Mrs. Tribble joined the growing number of electric car owners about five years ago after an automobile accident.

At the age of 75 she was trying to learn to drive a car so that she could get around on her own.

During one driving session a companion frightened her and the car crashed into a tree, leaving Mrs. Tribble with a broken leg.

That ended her desire to drive

an automobile but not her determination to get about independently.

While she was in the hospital a relative suggested an electric car which he had seen a TV star driving.

A friend vacationing in California got the address of a Long Beach man who made the small cars and made one for Mrs. Tribble that was about four inches longer than normal.

"I wanted to be sure I could prop my leg out in front," said Mrs. Tribble.

The car which looks like a golfing cart travels about 18 mph although the addition of another battery increases its speed. To operate it Mrs. Tribble got a drivers license. The batteries can be recharged at night, and they stay charged long enough for her to drive to the store or to friends' homes. She carries an electric recharger to plug into any electric outlet just in case the battery runs down.

The car is steered with a long handle. She says it costs only \$1 a month to operate.

"People who haven't seen me in it before stare and laugh, but I don't care. I go when I please and come when I please and that's what's important," she said.

No one argues with the activities of legislatures and authorities in making people recognize their family financial responsibilities instead of letting their dependents become charges of the taxpayers.

Some great and extensive work has been done by authorities in forcing the irresponsibles to look after their own, instead of adding to the burdens of taxpayers.



This is C. W. Harder quite a simple principle, that of people being responsible for their own. Yet it seems too complex for understanding by those schemers who throw the American taxpayer's money away in foreign give aways.

A prime example is the millions of dollars American taxpayers are throwing into Ceylon to develop this large rich island in the Indian Ocean.

There is only one fly in this ointment. Ceylon is a member of the British Commonwealth.

As such, Ceylon belongs to a big family that covers a fourth of the world's land area on which live 683 million people, or almost one-fourth of the world's population. The headquarters of this large family is in London where the Queen holds the title, among others "Head of the Commonwealth."

But what would one think of the money develop Ceylon from the British family of Commonwealths.

There is no substance to the rumor that the schoolchildren of Ceylon are being taught a new national anthem which goes in part "God bless the Queen and keep the American taxpayer solvent," but fact remains the U. S. taxpayer is shelling out millions to Ceylon.

This is tantamount to a family occupying a house and conning his neighbor into keeping the place in repair for them.

Until 1948 Ceylon was a British Crown Colony which meant that British interests made money out of the island without plowing much, if anything, back into developing the island. That has been left for U. S. taxpayer to accomplish.

But of course, as a member of the British Commonwealth, Ceylon will always be tied commercially and in other ways to London, so profits made out of American-financed expansion will end up in London.

For one thing, Ceylon produces about a half million pounds of tea per year. It is possible tea from Ceylon played a part in a certain incident in Boston harbor.

This is just one of the many items that are getting the people of the nation to look with wide-eyed asstance and indignation at the billions poured out in foreign give aways.

After all, what business firm will spend its own money to develop an account for a competitor. If that happened, heads would roll at next stockholder's meeting. Yet that is what the U. S. taxpayer is doing in Ceylon, a small but basically rich member of the British family of Commonwealths.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

As evidenced by a recent nationwide poll of independent businessmen by the National Federation of Independent Business, there is a substantial desire for small business representation on the Federal Reserve Board.

In addition, there is a great segment of the American economy engaged in home building as independent lumber yards, hardwares, and contractors in all the trades furnishing huge job employment.

Current events in the money market, which is controlled by the Federal Reserve Board, has strengthened this feeling.



By regulating the flow of currency, largely through setting what rates of interest will be charged to Federal Reserve banks for money, the Federal Reserve Board controls the interest rates that borrowers must pay.

This area is not to be confused with vast public housing projects which like any welfare activity of government, are an inflationary force.

Now, at present the governors of the Federal Reserve Board are entirely picked from the field of what is commonly referred to as "high finance."

This has nothing to do with their sincerity. The only drawback is they do not, due to lack of proper man in street background, see the whole picture.

The Federal Reserve Board is making a strong effort to control inflationary forces. This meets with no responsible argument. But there is in recent events a substantial point raised as to whether or not the baby is not being thrown out with the bath water.

Thus, here is a group of men, undoubtedly honest, undoubtedly sincere, who have the power to cut the cord of life insofar as the American independent economy is concerned. Yet in the sphere in which they have been trained, and in which they move, the small businessman is as much a foreigner to them as a native of Patagonia.

Thus, it is felt it is high time that small business be represented on this board so it will know how certain planned decisions will affect the health of independent business.

For example, interest rates have now been raised to a point whereby new home mortgages are being written for around 6 1/2%, which on a large mortgage over a long term, really boosts the cost to the consumer of acquiring a home.

Such an addition to the Federal Reserve Board might be said to be one of the vital necessities of the day.

Traditionally, and undoubtedly properly so, it has never been held that home acquisition is an inflationary force. Instead, it has always been felt that family home ownership is a great stabilizing force.

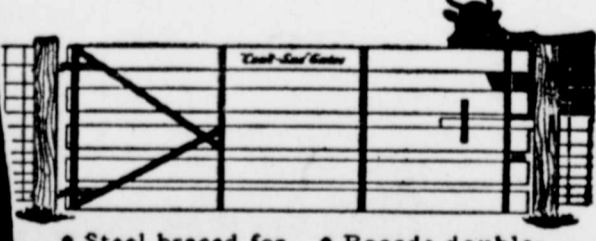

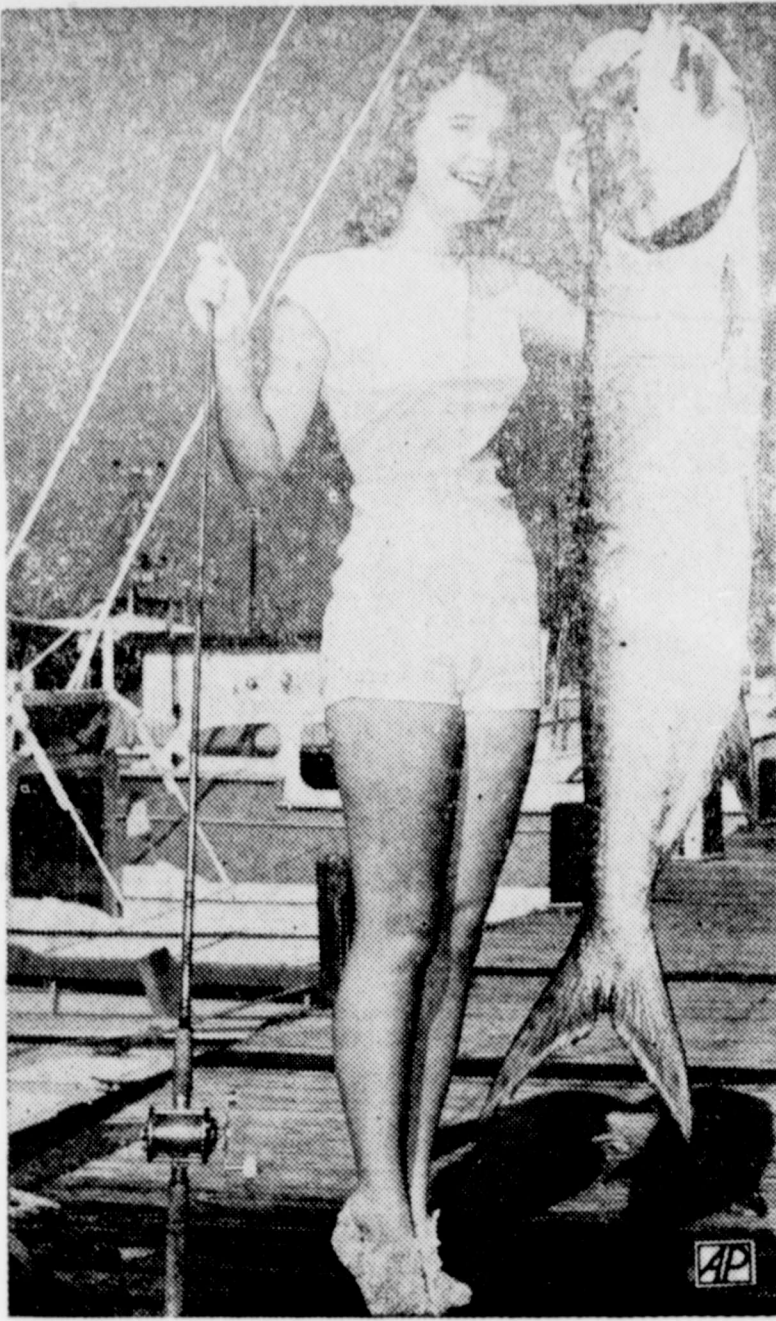

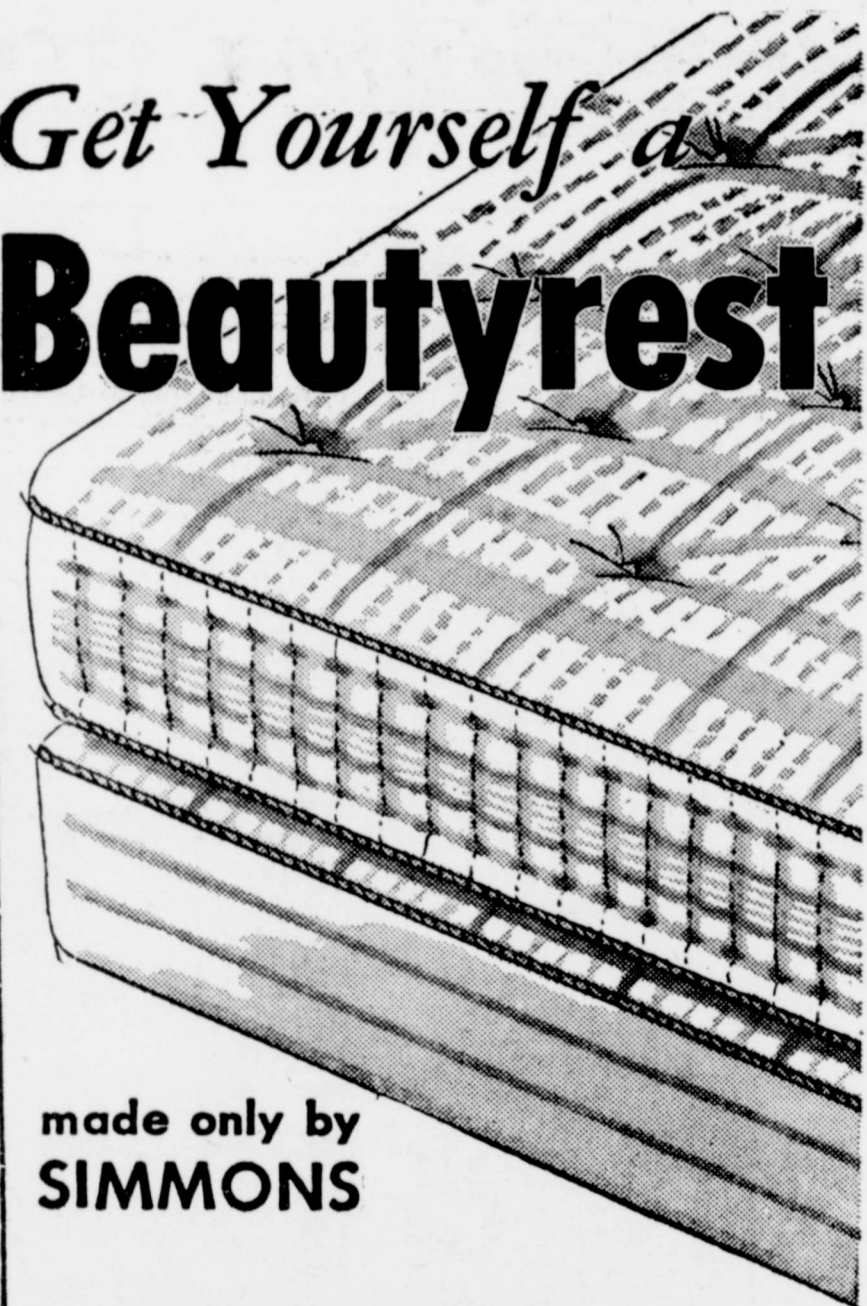
