BRIDE GOES UP RIGHT IN TWO-AISLED CHURCH

When the church has two aisles, instead of a center aisle, the bridal party uses the right aisle for the procession to the altar and the left aisle for the recession. In reverse from standard wedding order, the bride's family sits at the left side of the right hand aisle and the groom's family to the right of the left aisle. This way, the bride will side and will return - married - walk to the altar on her family's on the bridegroom's side.

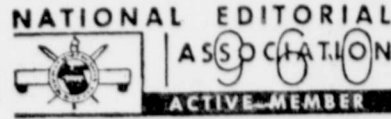

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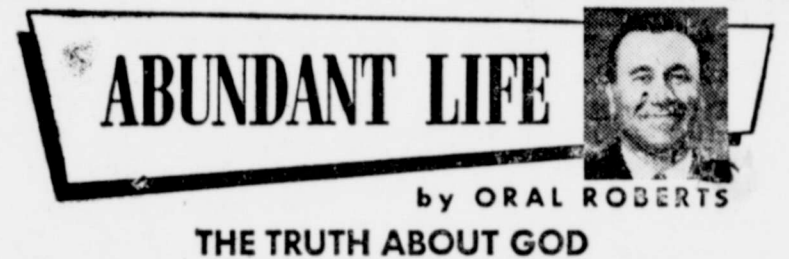

dens of Xochimilco, the picturesque mountainside spa of San Jose Purua, a day at the fabulous Pacific resort of Acapulco, with stopovers in historic towns and cities such as Taxco, Cuernavaca and Morelia.

Joining Sr. Rodriguez in his invitation for the Farm Bureau tour was Prof. Carlos Paz y Puentes, executive secretary of the National Confederation of Texas Water Development Board, which has yet to complete and finance its first actual loan.

Meanwhile, some two-third of all land under cultivation in California is irrigated, while the total irrigated area in Texas in June, 1959, was 7,140,443 acres. This 7,140,443 acres was less than one-fourth of the 33,633,800 acres counted as cropland in Texas.

There has been little expansion of irrigated areas in Texas during the past decade. One of the outstanding events in Good Neighbor exchanges between Texas and Mexico is the 11-day tour of Mexican agricultural centers being sponsored July 14-24 by the Texas Farm Bureau.

Heading the tour is J. H. West of Bishop, president of the state farm organization, and Mrs. West. The visit to Mexico was planned as a combination goodwill, pleasure and educational trip.

In his official invitation, Sr.

ter of Agriculture of Mexico, Mexico, stated that "it is my sincere hope that as many members of the Texas Farm Bureau as possible may be able to come. We are looking forward to showing our good Texas neighbors what we are doing in the field of agriculture to advance the welfare of our farmers."

The tour will be many points of agricultural interest, such as the highly regarded National School of Agriculture at Chapingo. Sight-Professor Paz was an honored guest at the 1958 Texas Farm Bureau convention in Austin in 1958.

One of the highlights of the tour will come on July 18, when the visitors will be special guests of Governor Gustavo Baz in Toluca, capital of the State of Mexico. On the way to a special hospitality program in Toluca, the Texans will stop at the Rancho Dona Rosa to inspect the principal crops of potatoes, corn and alfalfa. They will also inspect the Santa Elena Experimental Farm, which specializes in certified seeds for corn and potatoes.

The July 18 trip will be part of a three-day tour out of Mexico City which, in addition to Toluca, will also take in San Jose Purua, Mreia and Patzcuaro. On July 21, the group will leave Mexico City for a four-day schedule of visits which will include Cuernavaca, Taxco and Acapulco, returning to the capital on July 24 in time to depart for home.

It is anticipated that the Good Neighbor policy of Texas and Mexico will gain materially in viewpoints and personal experience.

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## WATER DEVELOPMENT SPENDING LAGS

While Texans have been virtually unanimous on the urgent need for development and during the past decade, actual State spending for such a program has lagged far behind other Western and Southwestern states.

Figures compiled by the U.S. Bureau of the Census have placed Texas next-to-last in a list of 18 Western and Southwestern states in its per capita spending on water and soil resources.

The annual per capita expenditure for developing and conserving water and soil resources in Texas was figured at 11 cents, compared with \$2.34 in California, \$1.36 in New Mexico, \$1.15 in Utah, \$2 cents in Montana, \$37 cents in Wyoming, 64 cents in Arizona, 53 cents in North Dakota, 54 cents in Nevada, 52 cents in Colorado, 35 cents in Oklahoma, 21 cents in Iowa, 18 cents in Nebraska, 16 cents in Kansas, 14 cents in

and 13 cents in Idaho. The only state below Texas on the list cents a head of its population on water and soil.

The vast progress exhibited by California in taking the lead in water and soil development is pointed up by a proposal which will be voted on this fall. The proposal is to issue some \$1,750,000 in State bonds to pay for the world's largest water distribution system, designed to take care of all California water requirements for agricultural, industrial and municipal use for years to come. It has been noted that such a proposal in Texas so fantastic as to merit little if any consideration.

One of the few steps taken by the State toward extending State help in water programs was the approval by the voters some years ago on a \$100,000,000 revolving bond fund to assist local projects by loans when they could be financed in no other way. This brought about the establishment of the

**MRS WILL PITTMAN QUILTS 167 FULL SIZED QUILTS AND 56 BABY SIZE QUILTS**

TYLER, Tex., July 14, (AP) — Mrs. Will Pittman has made 167 full sized quilts and 56 baby-bed quilts in the last eight years.

Mrs. Pittman is 81 years old. "I've always made quilts," she said recently, "but until 1952, I didn't begin to count them. I know the number is several hundred."

She gave each of her nine children six quilts when they married and she has made a "Dresden Plate" pattern quilt for each of her grandchildren, who number 22. She also has 36 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

Since the first East Texas Fair in Tyler, Mrs. Pittman has been an annual exhibitor. But she has exhibited canned foods, vegetables, and other items, but never any of her quilts. She vividly recalls the early days when she and her husband loaded their children in a wagon and drove over "pig-tail" roads to Tyler for the fair, staying until the fireworks were over at night. She also exhibited at the Texas State Fair in Dallas many years.

Mrs. Pittman was born at Lindale and has resided on the same farm since 1900. She was married at Mt. Lebanon and was widowed 11 years ago.

She is a charter member of the Wood Springs Home Demonstra-

tion Club and seldom misses a meeting. Before the Wood Springs Club was organized, she belonged to the Neil's Chapel Club, one of the first to be organized in Smith County.

She attributes her good health to a cup of hot water first thing in the morning and a lemon before breakfast. She eats three full meals a day and doesn't snack between meals or before bedtime.

She lives alone in a six-room home. She does all her own house work and her home is spotless.

**JOSEPH CORBETT, JR.**

Corbett, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives," is wanted for escape from the California Institution for Men, Chino, Calif., where he was serving a 5 years' to life sentence for murdering an Air Force sergeant. A Federal warrant was issued at Los Angeles, Calif., on March 21, 1960, charging him with unlawful interstate flight to avoid confinement for murder.

A white American, born on October 25, 1928, at Seattle, Wash., Corbett is 6 feet 1 inch to 6 feet 2 inches tall and weighs 160 to 170 pounds. He has light brown hair, hazel eyes, a fair complexion, a medium build, and has worked as a clerk-typist, laborer, warehouseman, laboratory technician, and alkyd-resin cooker for a paint manufacturer. His two upper front teeth slant inward and he wears glasses, reportedly being extremely nearsighted and capable of seeing only close objects without them. He has a mole under his chin and a C-shaped scar on his right thumb.

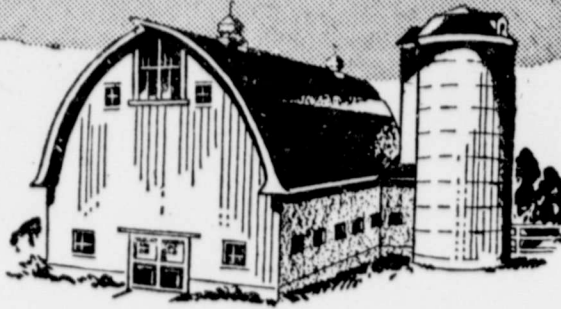
Corbett, once a premedical student, is interested in scientific matters, avidly reads technical and travel books, and is intensely interested in firearms and target practice. He reportedly has a superior general intelligence and generally lives quietly and neatly but becomes erratic when drinking alcoholic beverages.

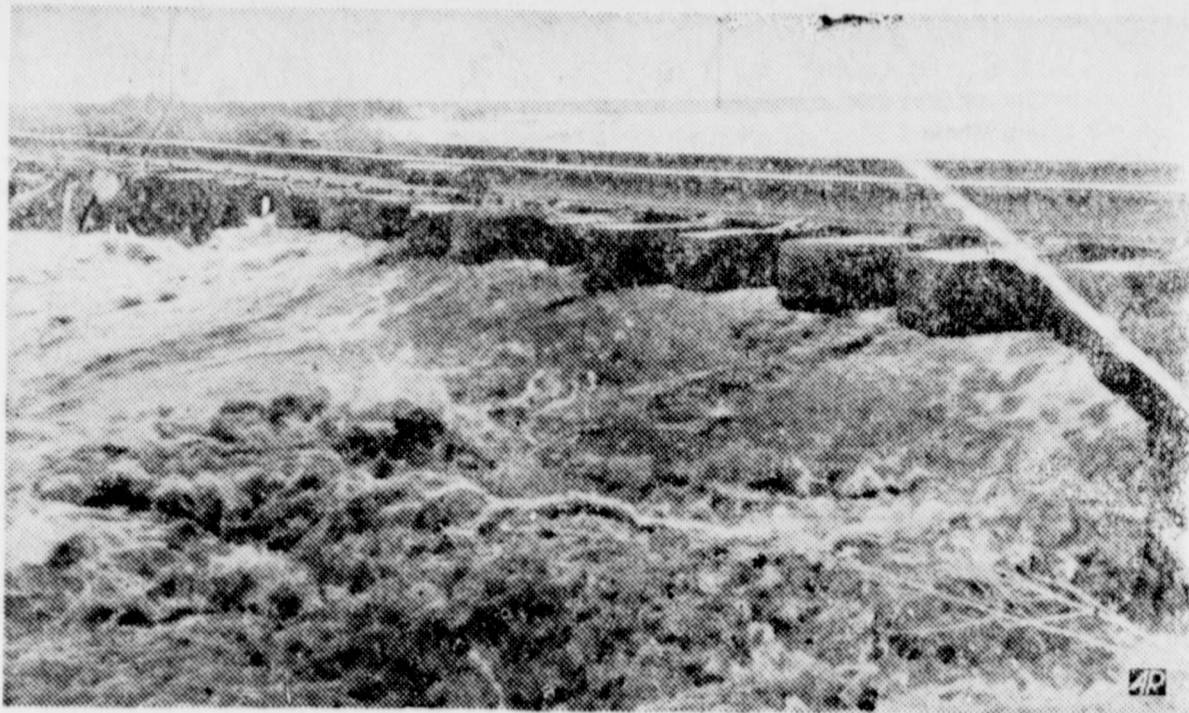

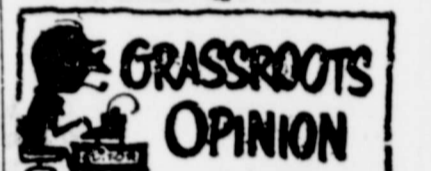
