

WATER DEVELOPMENT SPENDING LAGS

While texans have been virtually unammous on the urgent need for development and conduring the past decade, actual State spending for such a program has lagged far behind other Western and Southwestern states.

Figures compiled by the U.S. Bureau of the Census have placed Texas next-to-last in a list of 18 Western and Southwestern states in its per capita spending on water and soil resources.

The annual per capita expenditure for developing and conserving water and soil resources in Texas was figured at 11 cents, compared with \$2.34 in California, \$1.36 in New Mexico, \$1.13 in Utah 32 cents in Montana, 187 cents in Wyoming, 64 cents in Arizona, 58 cents in North Dakota, 54 cents in Nevada, 52 cents in Colorado, 35 cents in Oklahoma, 21 cents in Iowa, 18 cents in Nebraska, 16 cents in Kansas, 14 cents in and 13 cents in Idaho. The only state below Texas on the list cents a head of its population on water and soil.

The ast progress exhibited by California in taking the lead in water and soil development is pointed up by a proposal which will be voted on this fall. The proposal is to issue some \$1. 750,000 in State bonds to pay for the world's largest water uis; i tution system, designed to take care of all California water requirements for agricultural, industrial and municipal use for years to come. It has been noted that such a proposal in Texas so fantastic as to merit little if any consdieration.

One of the few steps taken by the State toward extending State help in water programs was the approval by the voters some years ago on a \$100,000,000 revolving bon fund to assist local projects by loans when they could be financed in no other way. This brought about the establishment of the





Corbett, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives," is wanted for escape from the California Institution for Men, Chino, Calif., where he was serving a 5 years' to life sentence for murdering an Air Force sergeant. Federal warrant was issued at Los Angeles, Calif., on March 21, 1960, charging him with unlawful interstate flight to avoid confinement for murder.

A white American, born on October 25, 1928, at Seattle, Wash., Corbett is 6 feet 1 inch to 6 feet 2 inches tall and weighs 160 to 170 pounds. He has light brown hair, hazel eyes, a fair complexion, a medium build, and has worked as a clerk-typist, laborer, warehouseman, laboratory technician, and alkyd-resin cooker for a paint manufacturer. His two upper front teeth slant inward and he wears glasses, reportedly being extremely nearsighted and capable of seeing only close objects without them. He has a mole under his chin and a Cshaped scar on his right thumb.

Corbett, once a premedical student, is interested in scientific matters, avidly reads technical and travel books, and is intensely interested in firearms and target practice. 
