Miss Louise Hall And Mrs. T. H. Hall On Thursday AM "Today"

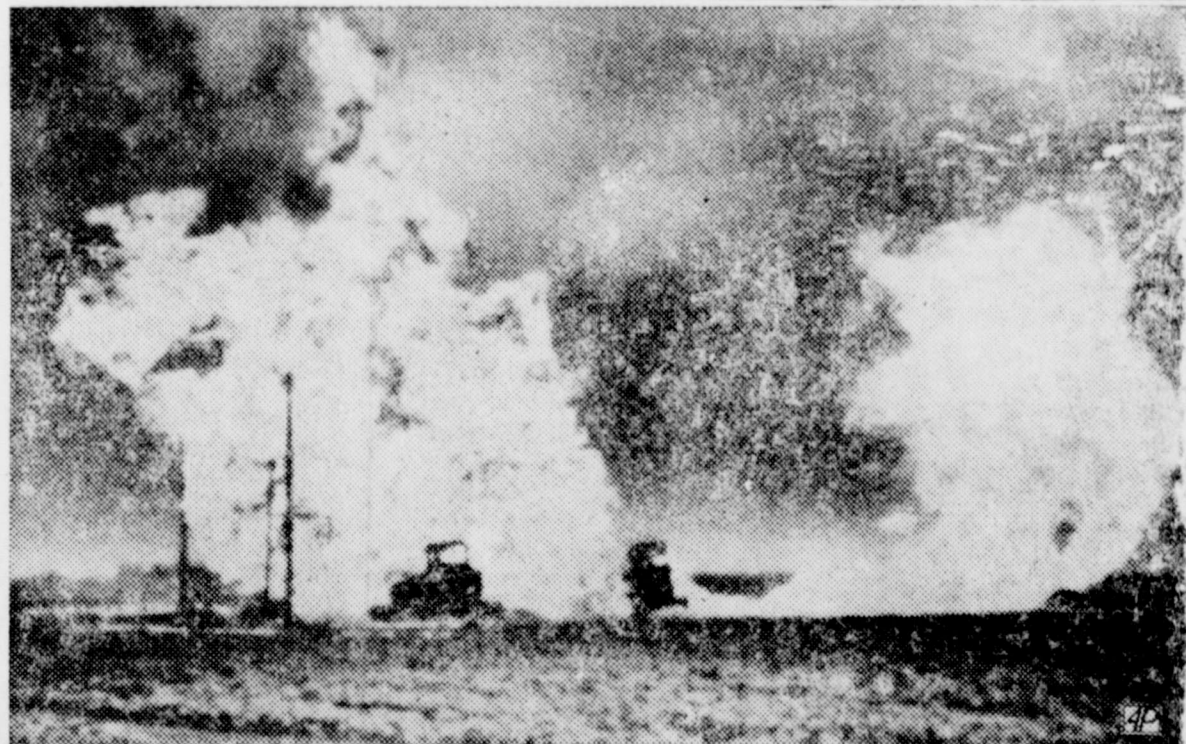
Miss Louise Hall of Gatesville was on "Today" Thursday morning and was interviewed by Frank Blair, newsman on the program.

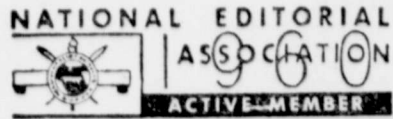
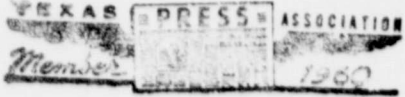

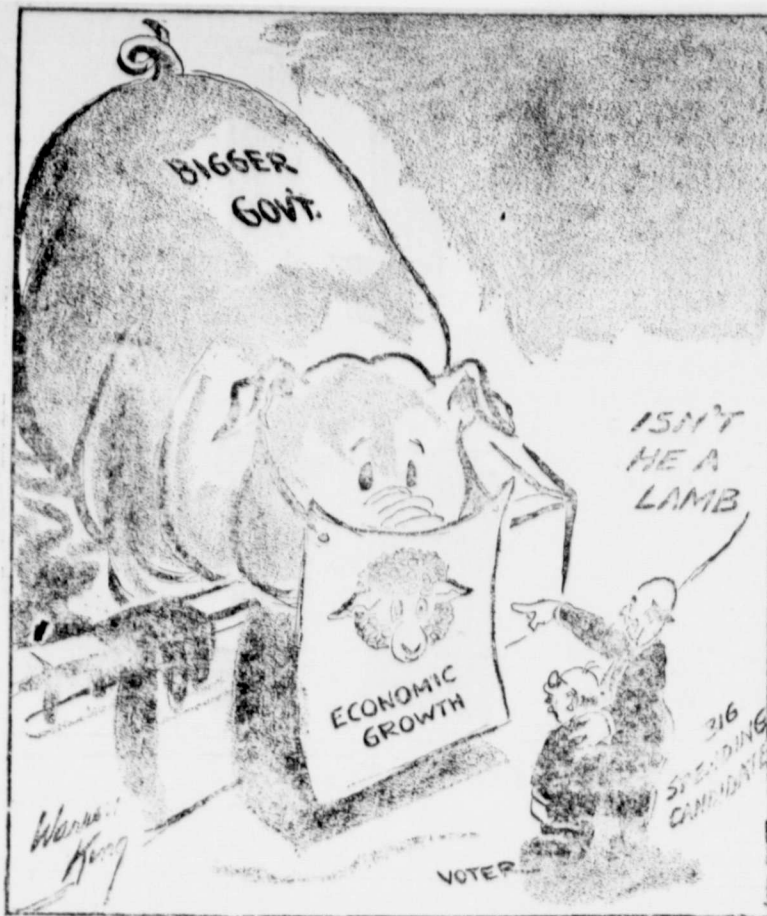

tennis courts at the new high school plan has been awarded by the school board to B. H. C. Materials Co. of Rogers.

The Rogers firm's bid was the lowest of the three received. Bert Camp, owner of the company, said work on the project will begin Monday. Streets to be paved include the circular driveway in front of the building and the street running from Lovers Lane around the South and East Sides of the plant to Highway 84.

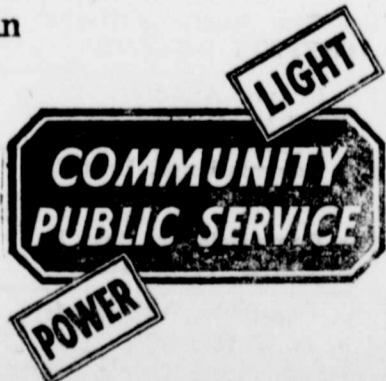

WASHINGTON AND 'SMALL BUSINESS' By C. WILSON HARDER

While it is perhaps true that one swallow does not a summer make, and thus one action by the Federal Trade Commission does not a program make, there is hope in the FTC order against Giant Food, Inc.

For this supermarket operation of some 50 units in Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia has been ordered to stop inducing discriminatory advertising allowances from its suppliers and using any part of such payments for its own use.

During an "anniversary sale" in 1955, the FTC charges, the outfit urged some 500 of its suppliers to contribute various amounts. Some 150 succumbed for a total of \$37,785.

The FTC examiner in this matter, a Loren H. Laughlin, in making the decision, wrote an opinion which masterfully stated what has become a major problem of the times.

For he said in part "Giant officials must have known that many suppliers paid the requested sums only because of its tremendous buying power. It requires no great seer to know that a concern doing over \$60 million worth of business can exert an economic pressure upon its sellers, large and small, to obtain concessions that no small competitor could possibly attain.

"For every supplier who contributed," he continued, "anywhere from \$250 to \$1000, Giant

well knew that in the cost accounting of such supplier that expense item would have to be considered and reflected at some time in the cost of the merchandise bought by other grocers. Such amounts would ultimately not only increase the cost to other grocers but would add to the consumer's cost. These attempts to obtain special concessions amount to improper pressures."

Thus, Examiner Laughlin not only stated one of the principle reasons why independent business firms are being unfairly squeezed, but also why consumers are constantly, to their bewilderment, faced with mounting costs of living.

It is very easy to see in this case, cumshaw extracted for just one incident amounted to more than \$150 per store in the Giant operation.

There are at least 40,000 stores as big as the units in this operation. Thus, to give same cumshaw to all just once per year would add \$30 million per year to food costs.

For a long time the nation's independent businessmen, through the National Federation of Independent Business, have asked for more enforcement of the anti trust laws.

This action by the FTC would seem to indicate that at long last something will be done.

It is quite possible that the efforts of the Senate Small Business Committee, headed by Sen. John Sparkman, and the House Small Business Committee, especially its sub committee on the food industry headed by Rep. James Roosevelt, is making it necessary for the FTC to get busy on its job.

SUSTAINED SUPERIOR WORK

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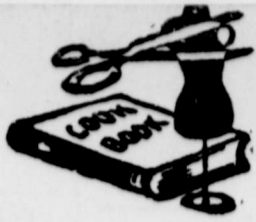

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MARKET NEWS EXPANSION URGED

One of the major recommendations urged by the 14-state Southern Commissioners of Agriculture in their 1960 meeting last month in San Antonio was expansion of the activities of the Federal-State cooperative market news service.

A resolution directed to the attention of the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture was adopted unanimously at the meeting, requesting improvement of the "agency responsible for providing the essential facts on day-to-day markets."

It was pointed out in the resolution that "the production and marketing of agricultural products has changed rapidly in recent years and is still in the process of change, and it is evident that in order to preserve a free agricultural market all interested parties must be kept fully informed on conditions in the markets."

"The Federal-State cooperative market news service is the agency responsible for providing the essential facts on day-to-day markets."

"Marketing research through its studies of some commodities has defined the problem areas and bringing vital market news ser-

vice to a point where it can meet the present day needs."

In its resolving clause, the resolution went on to "request the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture to expand investigations in this area and seek funds to implement the findings on a full cooperative basis with the state departments of agriculture in order that there may be no delay in putting into operation improved programs."

Among the improved programs contemplated by the Texas Department of Agriculture is a livestock auction market reporting service for the State, which probably will be presented to the 57th Legislature when it convenes in January, 1961.

Preliminary planning indicates that the means to initiate such a program on the part of the TDA will require an appropriation of approximately \$50,000, which will be matched by the Federal operative agreements. Demands for such a livestock auction market reporting service, to be operated on a reliable and dependable basis, have been widespread.

This demand is expected to grow along with the further extensive development of livestock auction markets in Texas.
