



Effect of Sawing on the Appearance of Wood

The grain and appearance of a piece of wood is largely determined by the way in which the log was cut. Cross cut exposes the grain end. This is the surface seen on meat blocks used by butchers.

Lumber is never manufactured by sawing across the grain. It is

wood grain. When sawing the outer portion of the log, the cut parallels the annual growth rings of the tree. Lumber of this origin is called plain-sawn or flat grained. As the sawing approaches the center of the log, the cut crosses the annual growth rings. That type of lumber is called quarter-sawn, edge-grained or vertical grained.

Only a small amount of lumber is purposely quarter-sawn. For most purposes lumber with either type grain is satisfactory. But, for

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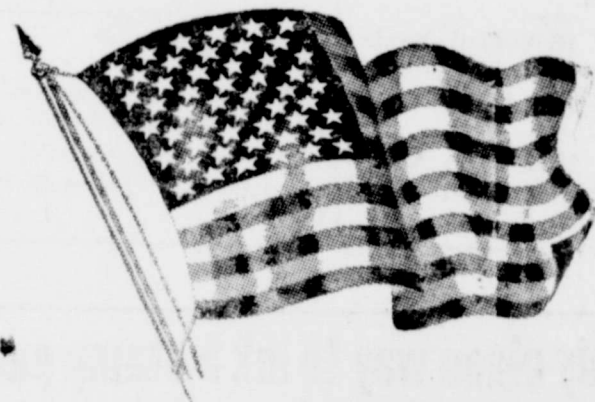


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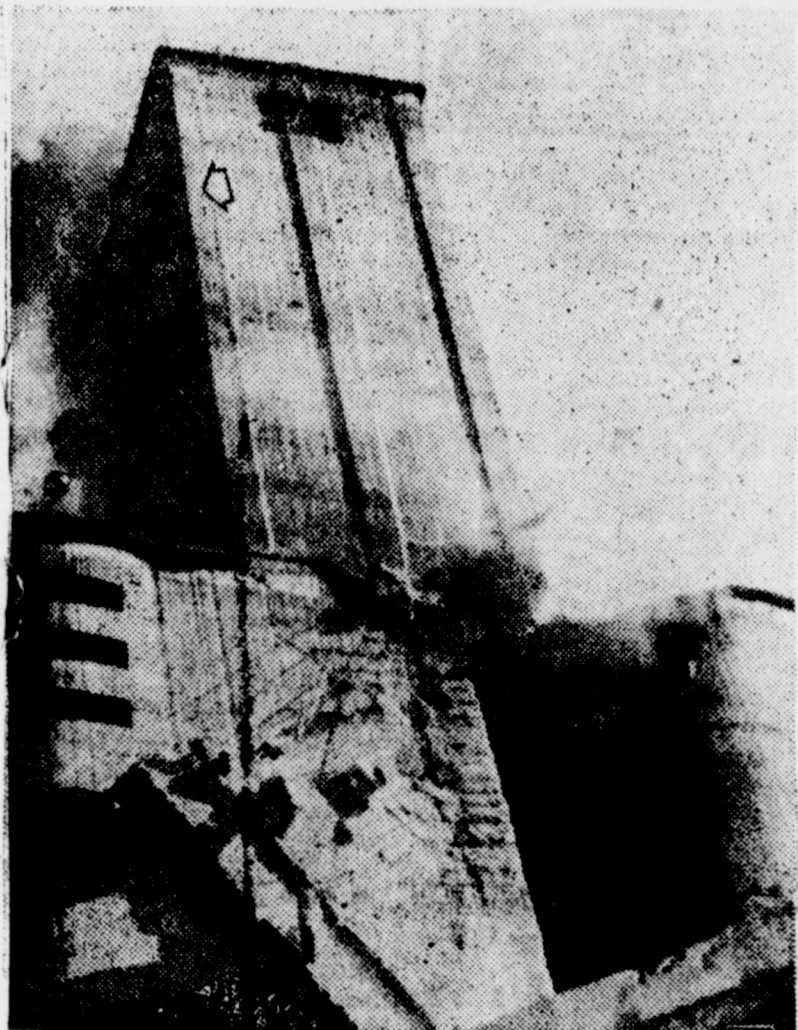

TWO MINUTE MYSTERY
THE CASE OF THE RAILROAD CRASH

On the night of July 15, the engineer of a westbound local missed signal and crashed head-on into a high speed express out of Chicago.

The result — one of the bloodiest disasters in railroad history.

"It strikes me odd that all the serious casualties were in the first seven cars of both trains," said Dr. Haledjian. "All except one."

"Jess Fromm, you mean?" asked Inspector Winters. "What makes you question his death?"

"Partly because Fromm's niece asked me to investigate," replied Haledjian.

At the impact, Fromm was standing. He was thrown back and struck his head against the ridge of the card table set between the facing seats.

"Smith now owns the whole business," said the inspector. "There's your motive. Method? He could have struck Fromm in the back of the neck with the table AFTER the crash. But how are you going to prove it?" "I should start," replied Haledjian, "with the obvious lie in Smith's statement."

WHAT WAS SMITH'S LIE?

Smith lied when he stated Fromm was "thrown back" at the impact. Anyone standing, or sitting, in a speeding vehicle involved in a head-on crash is thrown forward at the instant of impact.

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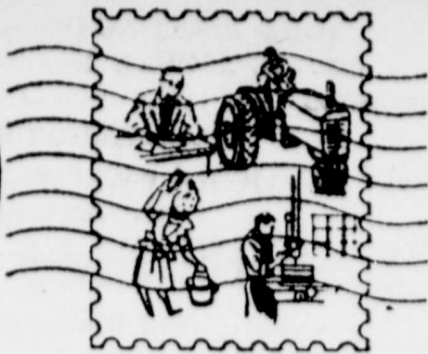

Cut Your Farm Gasoline Bills This Year

Gasoline thieves aren't always human. On many farms the worst culprits are the hot summer sun and poorly-tuned engines.

Massey-Ferguson researchers found that six 50-gallon drums standing in the sun lost 30 gallons by evaporation in a month. A vented 290-gallon tank lost 11 gallons.

But, when they put a pressure cap on the 290-gallon tank it lost only three gallons in a month. An underground tank, same size, lost seven gallons, four gallons less than above ground.

The researchers learned that the best place of all for a gas tank is under a tree away from buildings.

Poorly-tuned tractor engines use 10% to 20% more gas than necessary, they found. University of Nebraska tests showed that a simple tune-up delivered up to 3 more horsepower at the belt and 1 to 2 more horsepower per gallon of gas.
