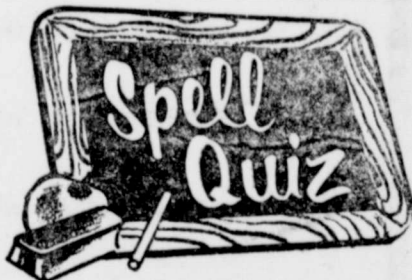

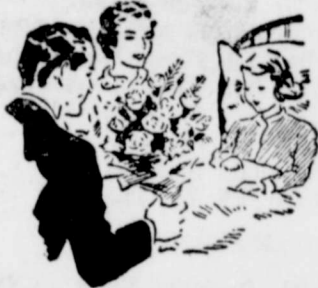

This weigh is expressed as a percentage of the weight of the wood when dry Thus if a green piece of wood is said to have a moisture content of 75 per cent, it means that the waer in he wood weighs 75 per cent as much as the dry wood

The moisture content of green wood is approximately the same as the moisture content in the living tree. In come species of wood the moisture content is over 100 per cent. In other words the weigt of the waer in the wood is greater than the weight of the dry wood. Sapwood usually has a high er moisture content than heart-wood.

When dry wood absorbs moisture it swels. When wet wood is dried it shrinks. The swelling of wood sometimes causes drawers and doors to stick in wet weather Shrinkage of wood may open cracks in furniture and flooring Exposed wood cas be protected from moisture by treating with water repellents ro by coating with a suitable finish. Wood used indoors should be installed dry and kept dry to prevent swelling and shrinking.

Dry wood is stronger than green wood. That is the rea why so much impotance is attached to the use of dry wood and the

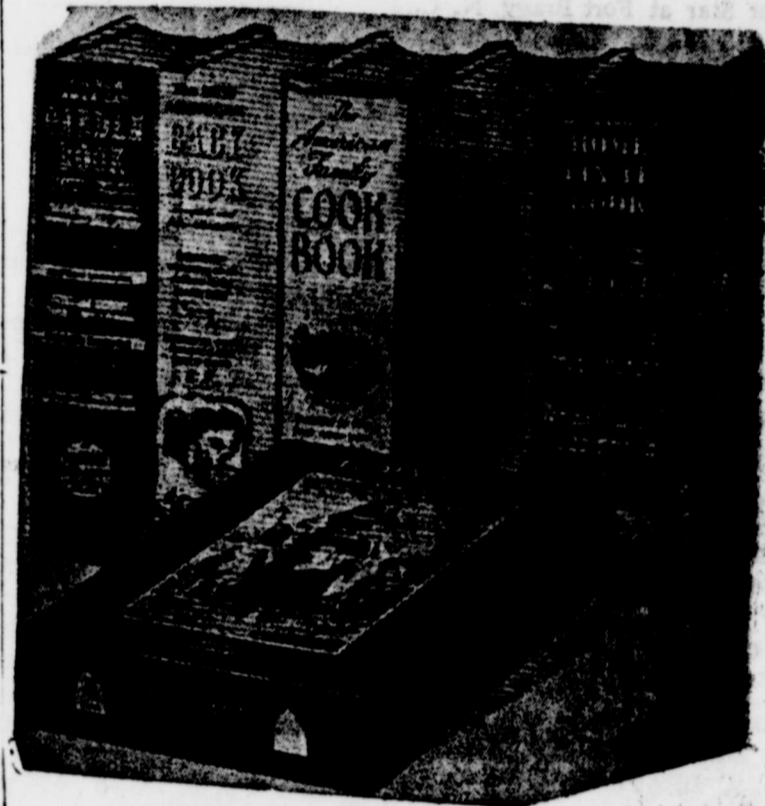

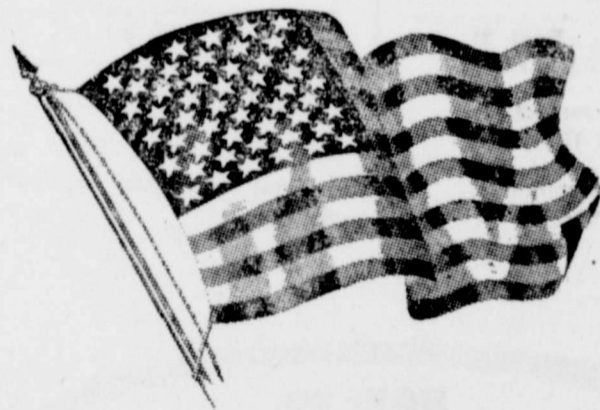

He is the son of X. Jesse J. Covey, Pearl Route, Evant.

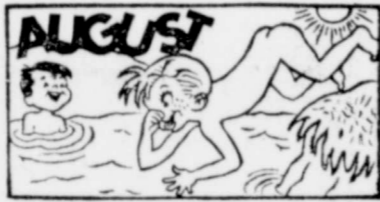

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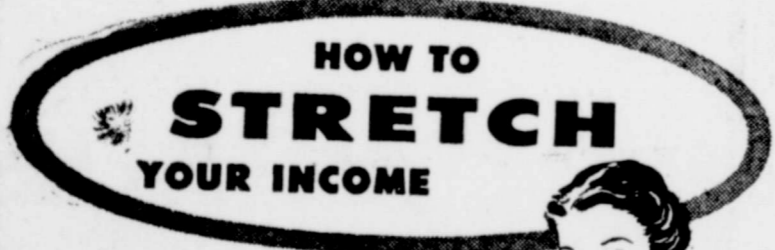

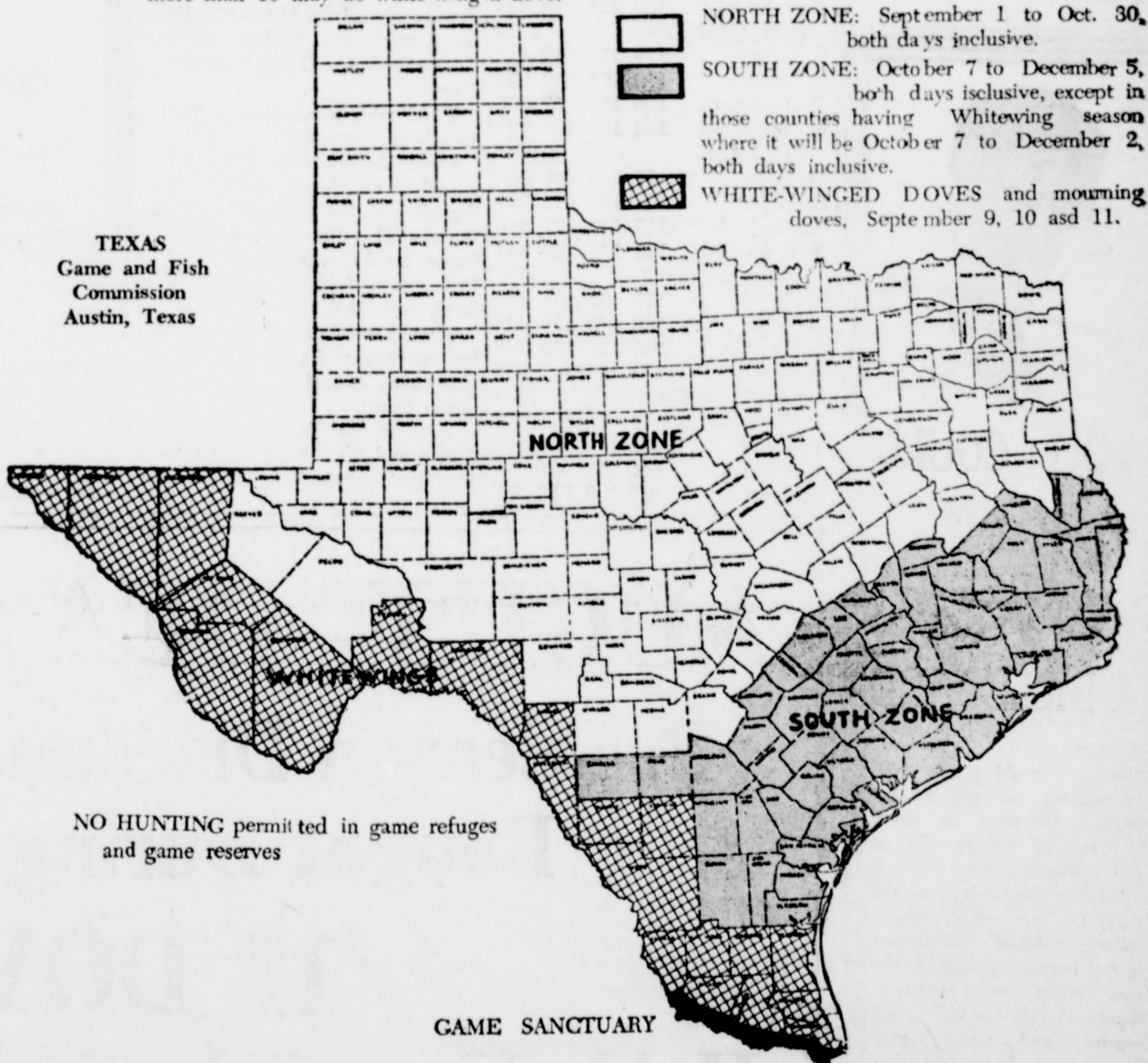

NO HUNTING permitted in game refuges and game reserves

GAME SANCTUARY

SPECIAL NOTE: Unlawful to take white-winged doves or chachalacas South of U. S. Highway 83, formerly state highway 4 in southern tip of Texas., marked on map as "game sanctuary".

SHOTGUNS: must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity, may not be larger than ten gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.

SHOOTING HOURS: Mourning

doves, 12 noon to sunset; except in areas having whitewing season where the shooting hours will be from 2 p. m. to sunset on September 9, 10, and 11 (consecutive days) only. White-wing doves in season, 2 p m to sunset
