Nominations will be presented at the annual State Baptist convention in Lubbock, Oct. 31-Nov. 2.

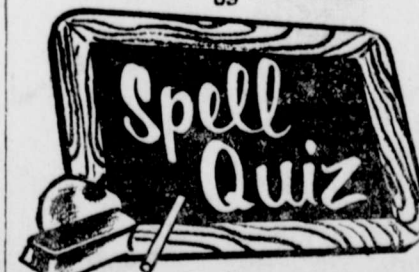

Johnny Dyché bought Marvin Skaggs champion goat for \$295 and Otha Medart bought the champion Nanny for \$80 which was the property of Arthur Davis of Sabine. Davis' goats won most of the other places in the show. Marvin Ann Skaggs bought the champion doe for \$135.

## Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; providing that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent (6%) per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; providing for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event any regulatory agency cancels or refuses to grant any permit; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballots; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, and fix maximum rates of interest; provided, however, in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest shall not exceed six per cent (6%) per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon;

providing for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event any regulatory agency cancels or refuses to grant any permit; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballots; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

Interest is agreed upon, the rate shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum. Should any regulatory agency, acting under the provisions of this Section, cancel or refuse to grant any permit under any law passed by the Legislature; then such applicant or holder shall have the right of appeal to the courts and granted a trial de novo as that term is used in appealing from the justice of peace court to the county court."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

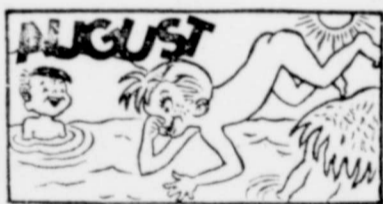

**TEXAS TIMBER TOPICS**

Fence Post Misconceptions  
There are many misconceptions about wood and its use. Most of these fallacies are without specific support and can be readily disproved. The use of wooden fence posts is one example.

Fence posts should be properly placed in the ground with the butt, or large end in the ground. However, some fences are built with the small end of the posts in the ground. It has been claimed that they will render better service in that position. Actually posts placed in the ground upside down will not last as long as those set up right. First, the small end of a post is not as large as the butt end. Consequently, it is weaker at the

groundline, like a fishing pole grasped at the small end. Secondly, the top end of the post has a higher proportion of sapwood than the lower end. Sapwood is less resistant to decay than heartwood. The butt end of a post is usually has a higher proportion of heartwood. Heartwood is relatively more decay resistant than sapwood. Hence, the butt, or large end of the post should always be put in the ground.

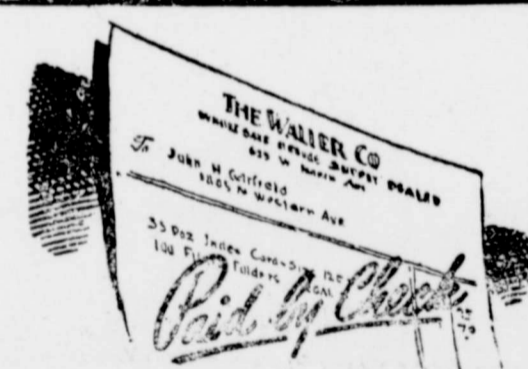

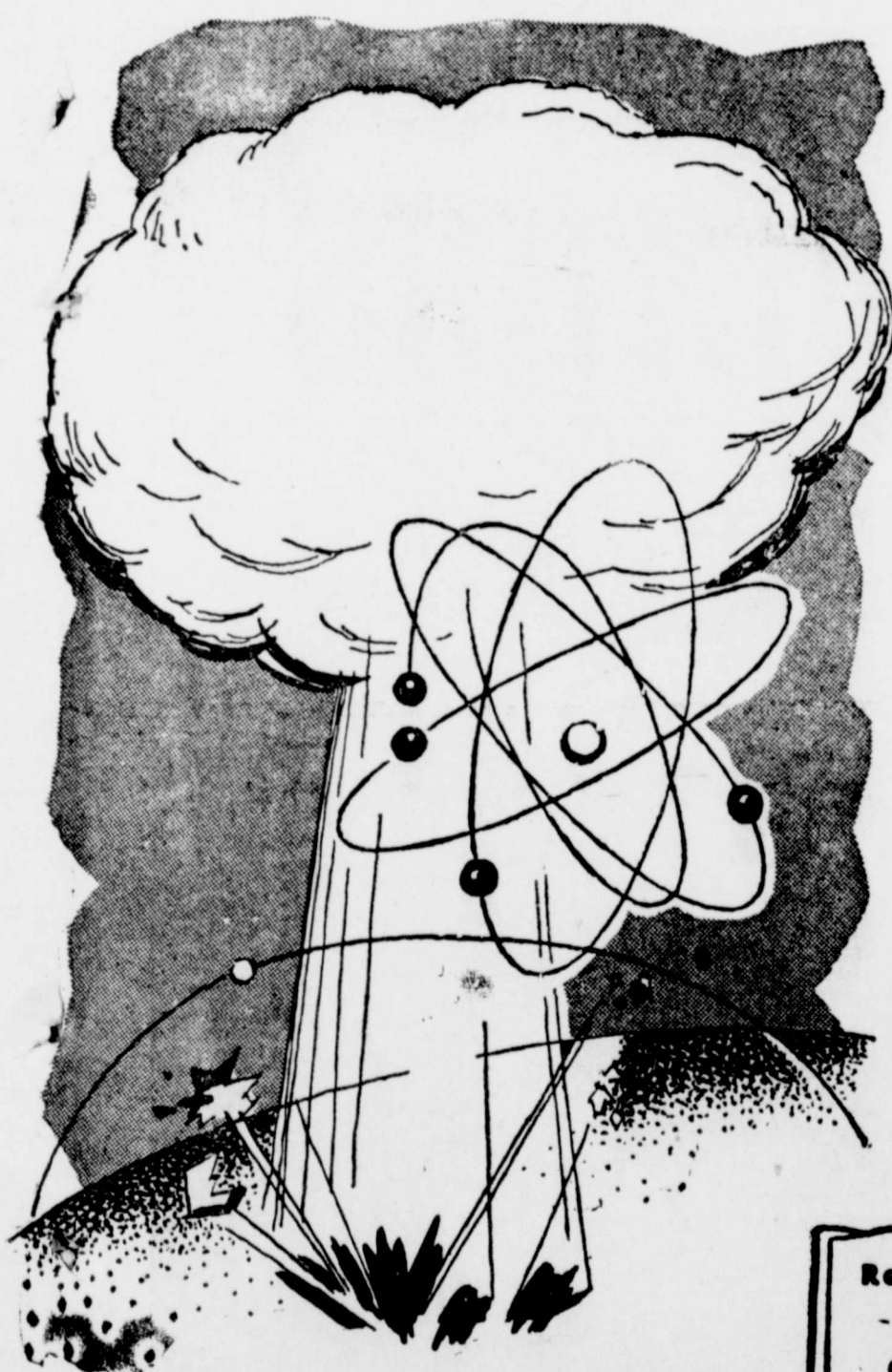
