## Husband Of Former Local Lady Dies In California

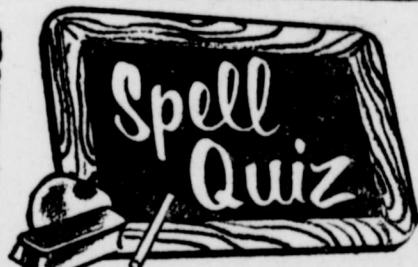
Dr. P. C. Herzer died Aug. 21 in Los Angeles vicinity.

**Painting Tips**

The pleasure of newly painted property is sometimes marred by early paint failure. Frequently, this is neither the cause of the painter nor the painter. Several simple rules applicable to the painting on wooden surfaces will usually assure satisfactory results.

1. The proper type and quality of paint should be used for the specific job

2. Manufacturers instructions relating to preparing the painting surface, mixing the paint, prime coats and methods of application should be carefully followed.

3. Painting is undesirable during temperatures under 40 degrees or over 90. A wrinkled surface generally occurs.

4. Repainting should be done before the old paint has worn sufficiently to expose the wood surface

5. Do not repaint too frequently. The paint film becomes excessively thick and brittle and cracks and peels easily. A good paint job should last for 4 to 6 years.

6. If paint is applied scantily by brushing on too thin a film or by using excessive paint thinner, the paint will chalk and wear off.

7. If paint is applied too generously, it will present a wrinkled, uneven appearance.

8. The surface to be painted should be smooth and free of dust, dirt, mildew and loose flaky paint.

9. Do not paint moist surfaces, nor dry surfaces in moist weather.

Made possible through the joint efforts of the Bryan Public School System and Texas A&M College, the program held in a junior high school building is called "an enrichment program for outstanding students."

All students were recommended by their school principals because of their high grades in regular school and because of unusual desire to learn.

Students are not average, therefore teaching methods of the school's three teachers do not have to conform with regular classroom procedure.

The lad mentioned above was merely doing as his instructor, Mrs. Lola Edwards asked him. After his outburst and dramatic departure from the room, Mrs. Edwards explained to the remainder of the class that the sense of hearing will often play tricks on the untrained listener. She then asked her students to write down exactly what the boy said before he stalked out.

Although a broad teacher's outline is used, the young people ranging from 6th to 9th grade are permitted to choose their own work. This is particularly true in the language arts class since the other two classes of science and mathematics must naturally conform to physical laws.

The enrichment program was set up last winter by the Bryan School Board and is the second such experiment in the state. First city to offer such a program was Austin.

Both teachers and students report they are happy with the unusual school. Mrs. Edwards says teaching only honor roll students is "a teachers dream." There is virtually no discipline problem. Students are there because they want to be, not because they are forced to attend.

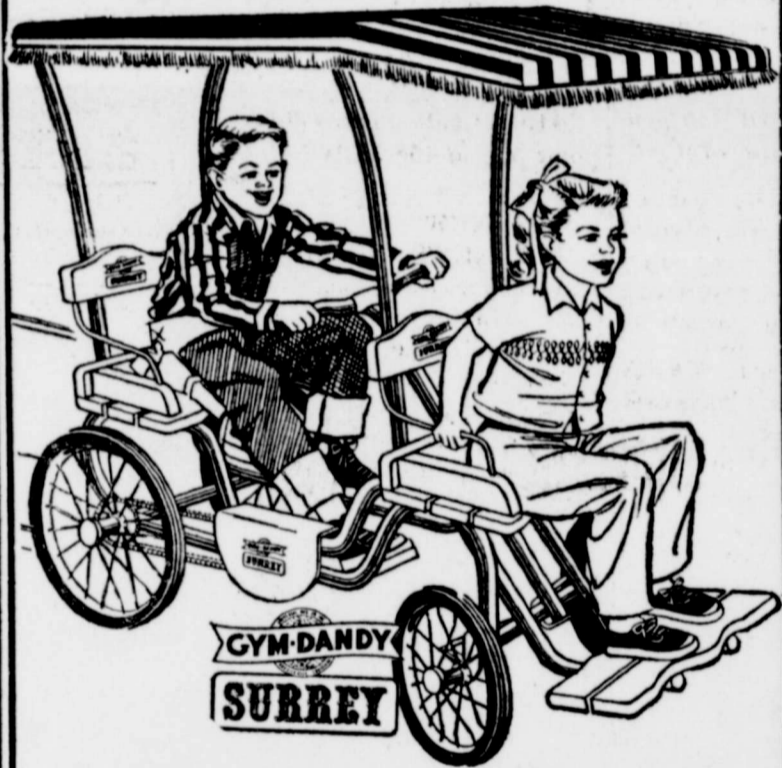

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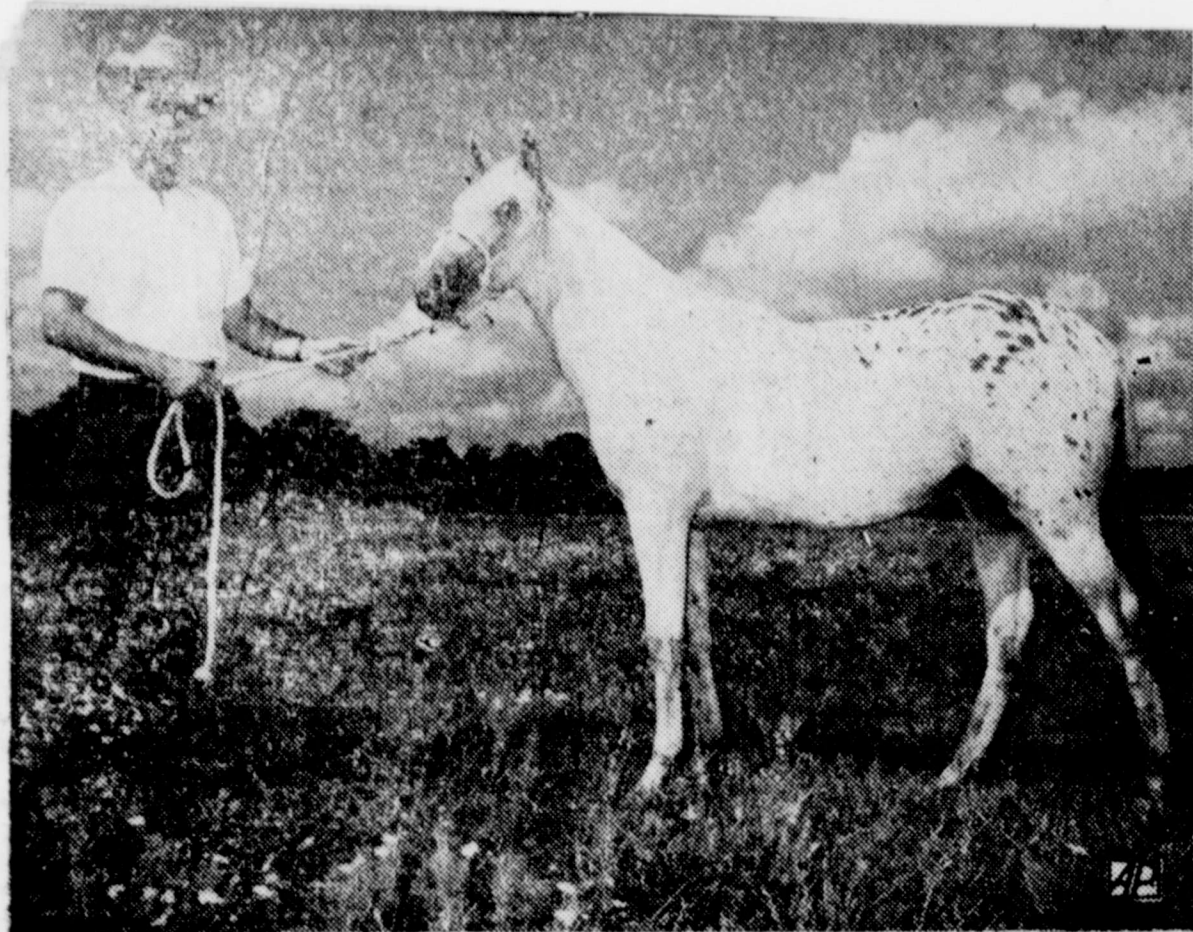

BRYAN, Tex., Aug. 18 (AP) — The Brazos Valley of Texas looks like the Blue Grass Country of Kentucky. And in the fields of the Brazos are Ponies of the Americas. The breed has mushroomed into popularity and is giving the Bryan area a new industry.

Of all the Ponies of America in the United States, a disproportionately large number are in Texas. The largest group in Texas is in Brazos and Burleson counties, with some others in adjoining Robertson and Milam Counties.

The Pony of America popularly is called an Indian pony. It is a strikingly marked animal, larger than a Shetland pony but smaller than a horse. The white, spotted "blanket" is the most distinguishing mark. Other identifications are striped hoofs, mottled noses and eyes showing whites.

Among full-sized horses, these are the marks known as the Appaloosa strain. Some full-sized Appaloosa horses are also bred in the Bryan area.

The Pony of the Americas is first recorded as being used by Chengis Khan, Emperor of the Mongols, and his chief officers. Lesser officers rode solid colored animals, which otherwise were very similar.

The Breed spread through North Africa, was used by the Moors in conquering Spain and later by the Conquistadores in conquering Mexico and Peru.

In Central America the animals eventually were turned loose to grow wild in an area where horses previously had been unknown.

The pony became popular several years ago but the supply was limited.

Breeders were trying to recreate the Indian pony by crossing Appaloosa horses with Shetland or Welsh ponies.

The late Clay Dunn of Burleson County is credited with starting a program by which the original breed is being renewed. Strikingly colored stallions are bred to solid-colored mares imported from the mountains of Mexico.

Results were displayed at nearby College Station recently at the first annual show of the Texas Pony of the Americas Club was held.

Breeders in the Bryan area include Jerry Randle of the Circle

R Ranch of near Bryan; C. H. Moore of the Hackamore Stables of Bryan; Conley and Betty Wendell of the C-Bar W Ranch of Caldwell; Roy Dunn, son of Clay Dunn of the 4-D Ranch of Caldwell; and Bud Simmons of Caldwell.

The first national show was held by the Pony of the Americas club at Mason City, Iowa last year. Iowa is also a center for breeding the ponies. The club issues temporary and permanent registration to approved animals.
