

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



In 1959, for example, almost \$8 billion, or over 60% of all research expenditure spent by all industry, was federal money, put up by the taxpayers. Of these huge grants, small business received only 5%.

Now these grants were made primarily to develop new de-velopments for use in the nation's defense complex. But the matter of defense has become so entwined with the civilian economy, that out of his research comes a host of non-defense applications.

For example, advances in metallurgy, drugs, plywoods, processed foods, electronics and in many other fields which are now found in consumer goods and services originated in research for defense.
