ARMYWORMS ARE HERE AGAIN

A small destroyer is again making himself felt in Texas. Armyworms are attacking grasses and forage crops. In some cases there may be more than one kind of armyworm involved. The three species involved are fall armyworms, true armyworms and beet armyworms. Fall armyworms are the major species attacking grass crops.

The larvae do not become conspicuous until they are nearly grown. Young larvae feed near the ground at first and are not generally noticed until they become 1 to 1.5 inches long. These young larvae do not consume the entire leaf of the food plant but skeletonize them, leaving the veins and ribs. This type of damage causes whitish areas to appear in lawns and grass fields where concentrated feeding of the worm occurs.

Fullgrown larvae are about 1.5 inches long and may be identified by the presence of the prominent white inverted Y on the front of the head. On the back there are three yellowish white hair lines running from head to tail. On each side there is a wide dark stripe, and next to it is an equally wide, somewhat yellow wavy stripe tinted with red.

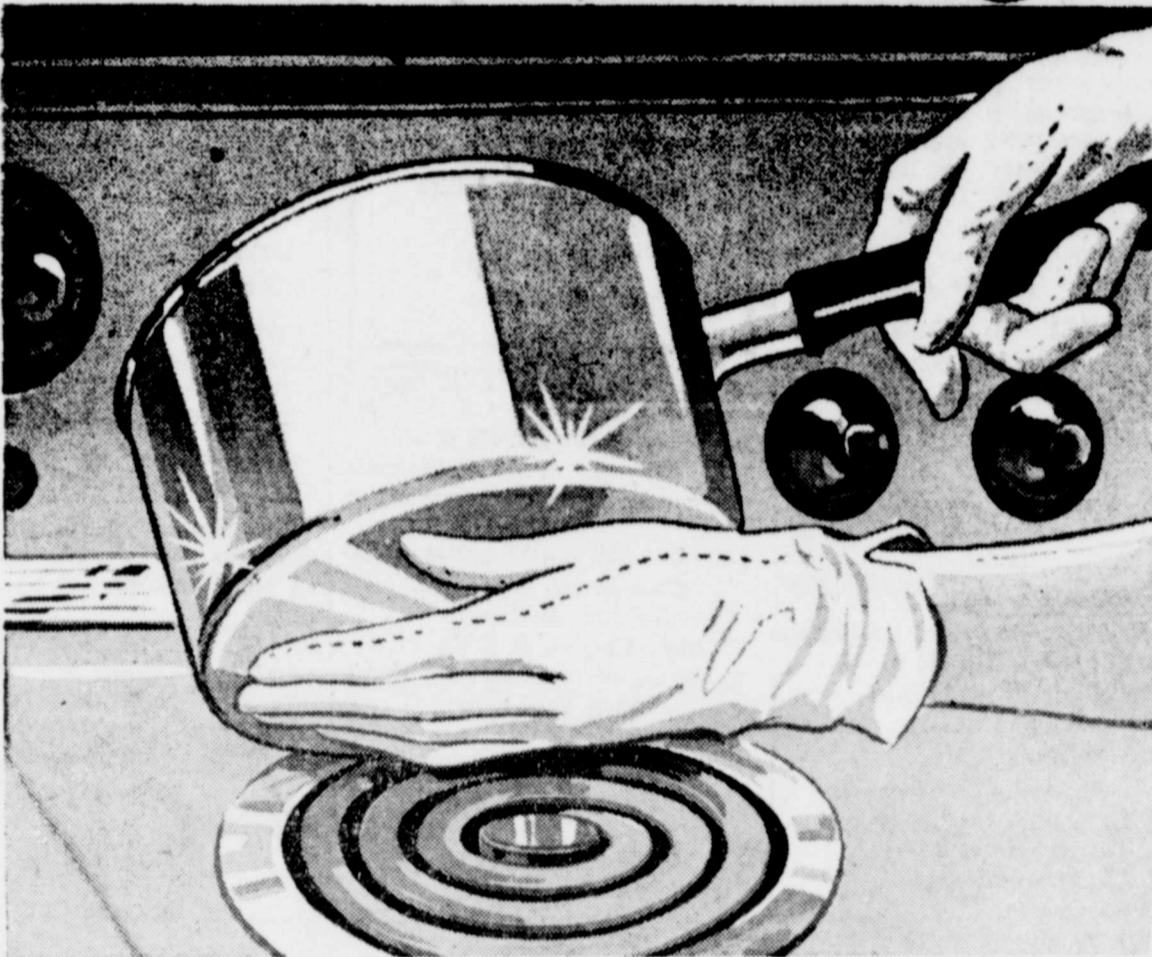
Several insecticides are available for controlling armyworms, but the Pure Food and Drug Administration prohibits the use of certain chemicals on small grains, forage and grasses. Contact your local County Agent before using any insecticides for control of these pests.

FISHING TIPS

I have had several letters in the past few months asking whether or not various species of fish are known by other names.

There are many fish, especially in the fresh water category, that are known by different names in various parts of America. As an example, the largemouth bass is probably the most popular of America's sport fish. Besides being known as the largemouth bass it is also called the bronze bass, green trout, trout, linesides, and g-mouth. So you see a fish may have more than one nickname.

Here are some other names of popular fresh water species:

- Smallmouth Bass — Yellow bass, bronzeback, re-eye, jumper.
- Spotted Bass — Diamond bass, linesides, southern smallmouth.
- White Bass — Striper, silver bass, barfish, sand bass.
- Rock Bass — Redeye, rock smeltfish, bream.
- White Perch — Silver bass, silver perch, white bass, sea perch.
- Yellow Perch — Ringed perch, rock perch, convict.
- Muskie — Blue pike, jack pike, great pike.
- Northern — Grass pike, jack, pickerel, snake.
- Chain Pickerel — Jack, snake, grass pike.
- Walleye — Jack, jack salmon, sauger, dore, glass-eye.
- Crappie — The white and black crappie together are known by more names than any other fish.
- Bluegill — Bream, sunfish, blue-mouth.
- Landlocked Salmon — Lake salmon, dwarf salmon.
- Rainbow Trout — Steelhead.
- Brook Trout — Speckled trout.
- Lake Trout — Laker, gray trout.
- Brown Bullhead — Pout, black catfish, bullpout.
- Channel Catfish — Fiddler, marlin cat, speckled cat, forktail cat.

These are but a few of many names by which these and many other species are known. For many years there has been great confusion over the most common name of various species. The above list is part of a formal list of "common names" gathered by the Outdoor Writers' Association in America and the American Fisheries Society after several years of research.

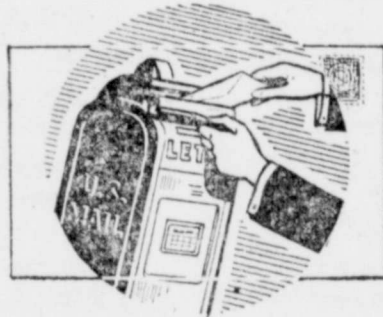
