You know, if you buy other merchandise, they let you look at and see if you want it. Not so with Uncle Sam's post office. If you have a 'postage due' item, you gotta pay and then look.

Now, Beulah, bless her, wonder what in the world she thinks WE want with a 2-page 8 1-2v14 release with 'small names' and 'big titles' such as: The Rev. E. A. Juraschek, Catholic Council for the Spanish Speaking; Miss Betty Whitaker, Director, Department of Migrant Ministry, The Texas Council of Churches; Fred H. Schmidt, Secretary - Treasurer, Texas State AFL-CIO; Miss Olive E. Riddell, Executive Director, Y. W. C. A., Mrs. Doris Stanislawski, Austin League of Women Voters; The Rev. John A. Wagner, Ex. Secretary, The Bishop's Committee for the Spanish Speaking; Clarence Wiggim, Ex. Secretary, Texas Social Welfare Association, Garnet Guile, Ex. Secretary, South Central Region, American Friends Service Committee, and a lot more 'little shots' with 'big titles.'

Now, maybe this is better for the Texas Committee on Migrant Farm Workers than if we ran the entire shoo-bang. Quoting a little—very little, the release says: they help Texas 'become aware of the tremendous economic contribution the migrant farm worker makes to the State and the country as a whole, and identify the pressing needs of domestic migrant farm workers and their families, and supporting possible ways these needs might be met.'

Gen. Wendell Westover, 65, well known in Coryell County and a native of New York, died at his home at Lake George, N. Y. Sunday night.

Col. Westover, when he was at 'Camp Hood' was with the original 893 Tank Battalion, and was chief of training and chief of staff of the tank destroyer unit at Ft. Hood from 1942 until 1945. From 1947 to 1949 he was executive officer for Reserve and ROTC affairs at the Pentagon, and received his star from then Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

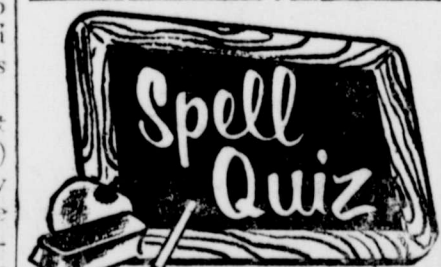

COPPER STOCKS—Good Value in Today's Market

In today's search for selectively good issues attention should be given to the copper stocks. Many of the leaders offer comparatively rather attractive statistical values and are selling considerably below their highs for the year. The reason for this is primarily because of fears of a reduction in the current price of copper of 33-cents a pound. We do not see any drastic price reduction in sight for the following reasons:

1) The thriving economy in Western Europe; indication of a promising future demand for copper; Russia is reported in the world markets; with easier money in the United States it is expected that there will be an upturn in heavy industry and the demand for copper; the critical upheaval in Africa is likely to result in a diminishing flow in that area.

Recently there has been some interest on the part of investors in leading copper stocks as evidenced by increased trading activity and the advancing prices of these stocks. Admittedly, stockpiles of copper are growing fairly high, although on occasion they have been much higher and there is always the possibility that there might be a small price reduction in copper prices. Even if there were a reduction of one or two cents, earnings of the leading copper companies would still justify present market prices of these stocks.

From an investment point of view we would favor American Metal-Climax, although this is not strictly a copper stock having wide

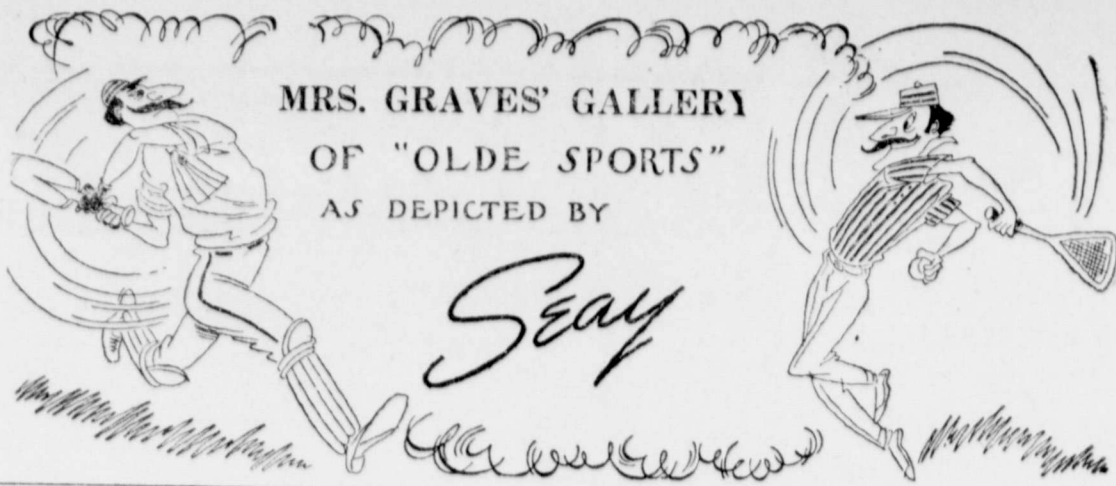
interests in other fields. Kennecott Copper is probably the "blue chip" of the copper industry. Phelps Dodge enjoys a strong financial position and pays a liberal dividend fairly well supported by earnings.

On a more speculative basis we would consider Anaconda Copper. Primarily for a trading medium Cerro de Pasco and Inspiration Consolidated Copper.

To summarize, we feel that most of the industry's difficulties seem to be amply discounted at current market levels, while in the event of further inflation in this country copper stocks might prove to be a very good inflationary hedge.

Our feeling about copper is apparently shared by three U. S. copper companies—Kennecott, Anaconda and Cerro de Pasco—which recently announced that they were contemplating a \$400-million investment in Chile to increase production.

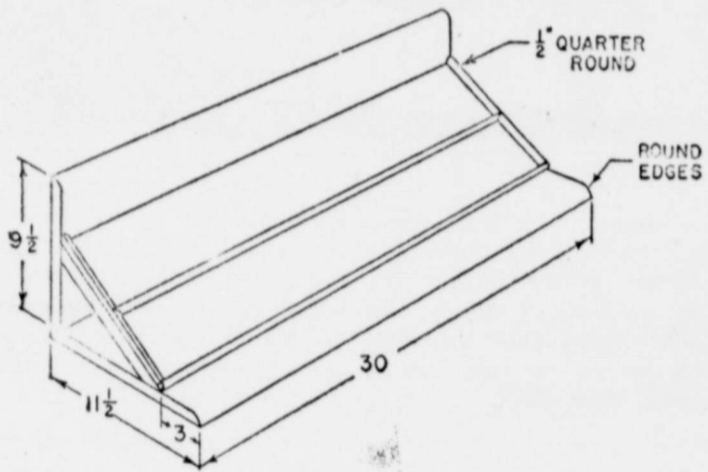

MAKE A CUP RACK

To prevent worn or broken handles and chipped edges, cups should be placed flat rather than hung. A rack which provides for flat storage can be made of 1 by 12, 1 by 10-inch lumber and 1/2-inch quarter round moulding.
 Use 6-penny finishing nails to assemble the back, shelf and rack, and 1 inch brads for the moulding.

The highest achievement of faith in God is acquiring abundant life. The Bible teaches that we can live life abundantly, 24 hours a day. Jesus said, "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly" (John 10:10). Jesus Christ came to make you more than you are and to give you more than you have. "More" and "abundant" are the two words Jesus used to describe the life He wants you to have. Not less life, nor diminishing life, nor shortened life, but more abundant life. Jesus came to give you life with something additional, life in a greater degree, life abounding, life overflowing, life in great plenty. Abundant means more than enough. It speaks of inexhaustible supply.
 Everyone who believed in Jesus Christ, who followed Him sincerely in faith while Christ was upon the earth, received more than he previously had. Each began to abound in God's inexhaustible supply. God's abundant life flowed into his being. People became more abundant in love, faith, hope and peace.
 Abundant life is that something which makes you more than triumphant, more than victorious; you become more than a conqueror.
 There are two men in particular in the Bible who I believe experienced abundant life. They

are Paul and John. Paul faced nakedness, peril, sword, prison, shipwreck, beatings and sometimes the betrayal of his friends and of his own people.
 Yet he was more than victorious through all this, and God allowed him to see the glory of the coming world.
 The other man, John, was persecuted, too, eventually being exiled to the tiny, lonely island of Patmos. He, too, was caught by the Spirit of God and was inspired to write the Book of Revelation, the last book of our New Testament. These two men experienced the highest degrees of abundant life.
 But how can you receive abundant life? First, you receive it by a new birth. You must be born again. That is, you must be born spiritually and become a new person in Christ. Second, you must renew your mind so that it is open and grasping for the spiritual things of God. The mind of Christ must be imparted to your mind. Third, you have abundant life as you release your faith. Every one has faith, but not every one uses his faith. It is released faith, going to God, that brings great blessing to a life, healing to a body, supply for material needs. Released faith brings abundant life and blesses you with every good thing God has for you.
 You can have abundant life.

ANTELOPE PLENTIFUL IN ALPINE REGION: BIG HUNT EXPECTED THIS YEAR

ALPINE, Tex. Sept. 29 (AP)—Antelope abound this fall in the Trans-Pecos region of far west Texas, and that means the biggest hunt ever in these parts far the fleet, deer-like animals.

The State Game and Fish Commission has authorized 2,030 permits for a special antelope season Oct. 1-7. They will allow hunters to take 18,649 bucks and 381 does.

Local game wardens relayed the permits to ranchers, who in turn will sell them to hunters.

Charges will vary from ranch to ranch. Field men expect the price to be about the same as in other years—\$60 for a buck and \$15 to \$40 for a doe. Costs will be higher where ranchers furnish guides, transportation and lodging.
