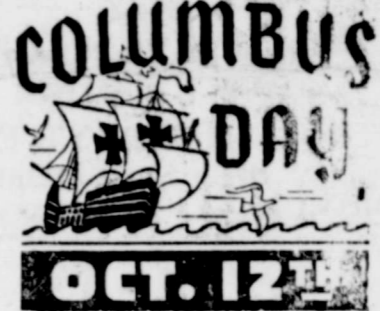
"Down Remains Same" In City Wrangle By Council and Mayor

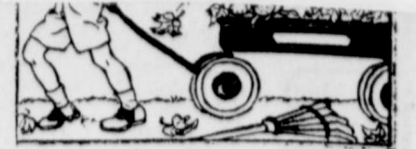

RUSK COUNTY ABOLISHES 7 JOBS: COMMISSIONERS ADOPT ECONOMY PROGRAM

Seven Rusk County jobs will be abolished Jan. 1 in line with an economy program adopted by the commissioners court, and the county tax rate was set at 95 cents, the maximum under law for a county without bonded indebtedness.

Jobs abolished were a deputy each from the sheriff's, county clerk's tax collector, county agent, H-d agent, and others.

Travel allowances were abolished for county welfare and county service officer. The county attorney's salary was also cut.

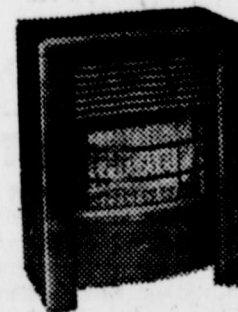

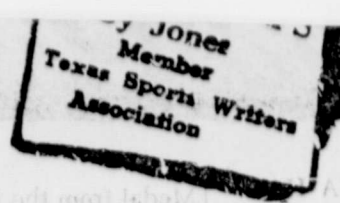

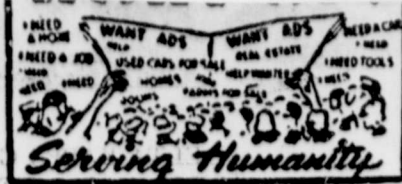
