"DOWN REMAINS SAME" ONLY SUCCESS ADJOURN A COUNCIL MEETING

They adjourned, but everything else was stymied at the regular Tuesday evening meeting of the City Council.

The Aldermen, overriding the protests of Mayor Dan McNeil, passed an ordinance abolishing the office of chief of police and creating the office of "peace conservator."

Also, a motion employing Charlie Walsh as peace conservator or 30 days. McNeil had ruled Walsh was not qualified for the job because he did not live in Gatesville city limits and had not made bond. These requirements are not required of a peace conservator.

Aldermen also passed a resolution empowering Charles Trewitt, mayor pro-tem, to sign city checks.

Mayor McNeil said "I have 3 days to veto these ordinances, and Thursday morning he said he would."

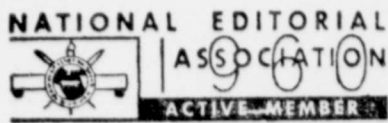

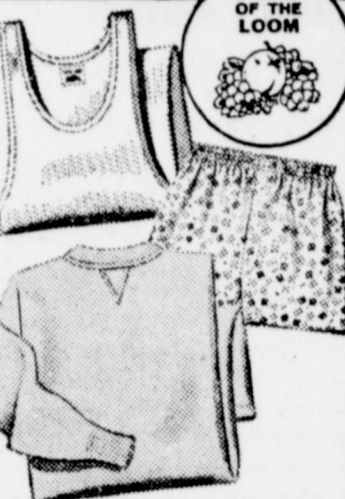

Sift together 2 1-2 cups sifted cake flour, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 1-2 teaspoons cinnamon, 3-4 teaspoon nutmeg, 3-4 teaspoon cloves, 1 teaspoon salt.

Add and beat 2 minutes 1 cup dark brown sugar, firmly packed, 2-3 cup shortening, 1 cup butter-milk;

Add and beat 2 minutes 2 eggs. Pour into 2 greased and floured 9-inch pans. Bake in moderate gas oven (350 F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Remove from oven and let cool 5 minutes before removing from pans. Remove from pans and finish cooling on cake racks. Frost with sea foam frosting. Note: If beating with mixer, use medium speed. If mixing by hand, use 150 strokes per minute.

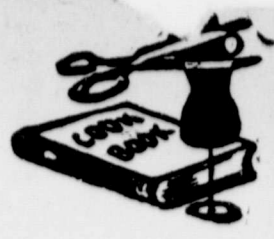

DAN SHARPLY, MISSION TO BRAZIL SPEAKS AT CBA ANNUAL MEETING

Speaking on "Brazil, Our Front-Door Neighbor", Missionary Dan Sharply told the women of Coryell Baptist Association at their annual meeting with the First Church in Gatesville on Wednesday Oct. 5 that we are interdependent upon the people of Brazil. We need them and their good will as much as they need us.

With 70 per cent of the people of Brazil illiterate, they respond to education and any help in advancement in a literary way, yet their need of religion which will satisfy and help build good citizens is greater. The people are religious to the point of superstition, and evangelical churches are helping them and freeing them from such superstitions.

With freedom of worship guaranteed, open air services are held in addition to regular preaching services in the churches and missions. Often 90 per cent of those listening do not own a Bible or do not know what one is.

More than half of all churches established by Southern Baptists in foreign lands is in Brazil, yet missionaries have worked in other countries longer and with fewer forces. Baptists have labored on simple and pure gospel and the great results have come.
