Thing we're trying to get over is to urge many of these to be graduates to 'go into business' for themselves. They'd have something, and wouldn't be laid off like we were many times, and job hunting. Right now the job hunts the graduate, but it isn't necessarily so.

Lots of one-man businesses the man is aging, and looking for some one to come in, learn the business with a view of taking over. Talk about 'security' - this is it. Nope, in 99-44-100 of the cases, you won't get rich, you'll not get hungry, you'll learn a lot that you thought you knew before, and man, you never had so much fun. You chilluns just ought to try it. It don't come fast, overnight, with short hours and long pay, but if you can 'take it', you'll make it. Ask any one-man-business man.

Mr. Walsh will begin Thursday at the same salary with the use

With \$3,646.69 on a quota of some \$12,000 plus, Chairman Howard Franks has issued a call for volunteer workers to put the campaign over the top.


Chairman M. B. Kindrick of SSB has turned in \$452.50 from his bailwick, SSB, and the grand total is currently as noted above.






