Nothing else better, so here's one on Jack-O'Lanterns.

"Jack-o'-Lanterns are probably the most prominent symbol of Halloween. We see them made from real pumpkins, grinning or scowling at us from front porches and windows, and novelty stores are full of papermache replicas of all sizes. Yeet, poppular as they are, history does not tell us who was the first person to cut a face upon a pumpkin to make a jack-o-lantern.

"The name 'jack-o'-lantern,' is a most appropriate one. The dictionary defines the word 'jack,' as a papular form meaning man, and jack-o'-lantern becomes 'man of the lantern.' One of the many definitions is 'to play the jack,' which means to deceive or lead astray. This is the true spirit of the jack-o-antern.

"Halloween is really a celebration of the harvest time. Much of the spirit of superstition of Halloween has come down thru the ages from Europe. But the use of pumpkins was begun in America.

"The pupkkin is a native vegetable of America, and with the coming of the white man it was introduced all over the world. Under his hands it had been cultivated to enormous size. Oftena a single pumpkin may weigh as much as fifty pounds.

"The pumpkin which is used to make jack-o'-lanterns has an individuality all its own. It is marked in from 5 to 8 ridges, with deep grooves between them. The grooves coverage in the center toward the stem which holds the pumpkin strongly to the vine. The color is orange, and a pumpkin of no other color will make a real traditional jack-o'-lantern"

Billy Clay McClellan is chairman of the fund raising which will be started about Nov. 15 with a goal of around \$1,000

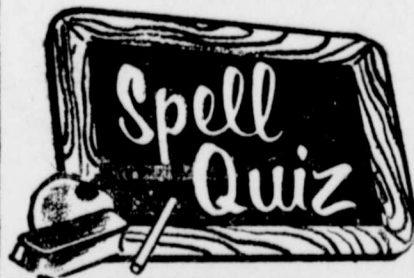

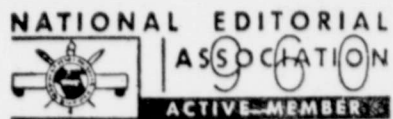

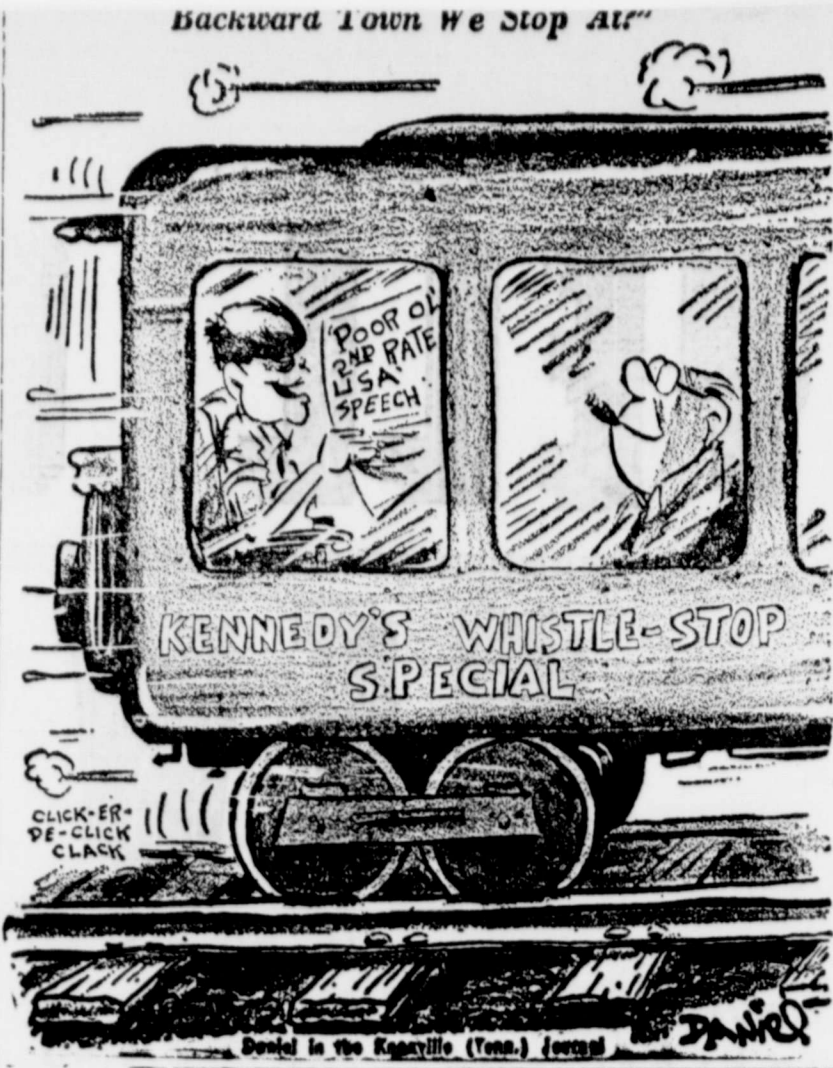

CANDIDATE FOR CONSTITUTION ASKS TO BE ON DEBATE

DALLAS (AP) — Charles Sullivan, Constitution Party candidate for President said Monday he would be happy if the current Nixon-Kennedy debates could include him.

The 36-year-old candidate from Clarksdale, Miss., indicated that he didn't feel slighted because Vice-President Richard Nixon and his Democratic foe, Sen. John F. Kennedy are called the two "major candidates."

"Our hope is that we can get enough electoral votes to withhold the 269 needed majority from both Kennedy and Nixon," Sullivan said. "We're counting on 8 from Mississippi, 6 from Alabama and 3 from Georgia. If we get the 24 in Texas we think it would be enough to throw the election into Congress, since the election will be very close."

Homes, buildings and other wooden structures hundreds of years old provide evidence of wood's resistance to the ravages of time. Wood does not decay from age. Decay occurs only as the result of the action of certain wood destroying fungi.

There are several ways to prevent wood from decaying. Since the fungi which causes decay are plants, we can create conditions in the wood, which are unsuitable for these plants to live. If wood is kept dry, with a moisture content under 20% these wood destroying fungi will not grow. This fact is important to home owners. In addition to wood being oxygenated, it is important for the growth of wood destroying fungi. If wood is completely submerged in water, fungi cannot survive and such wood will not decay. This fact is utilized when planning and building off-shore wooden structures.

Another method of preventing decay is to make the wood distasteful or poisonous to wood destroying fungi. This can be accomplished by an effective treatment with proven wood preservatives. Preservative-treated wood should always be used when at-

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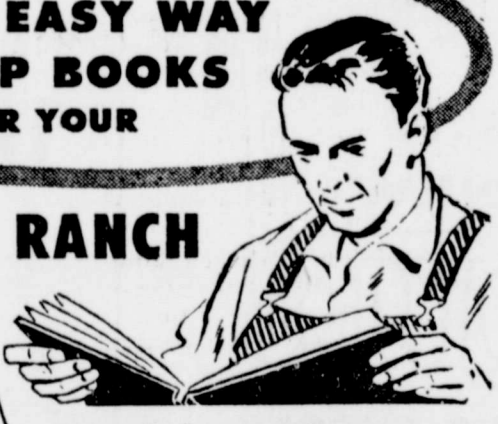

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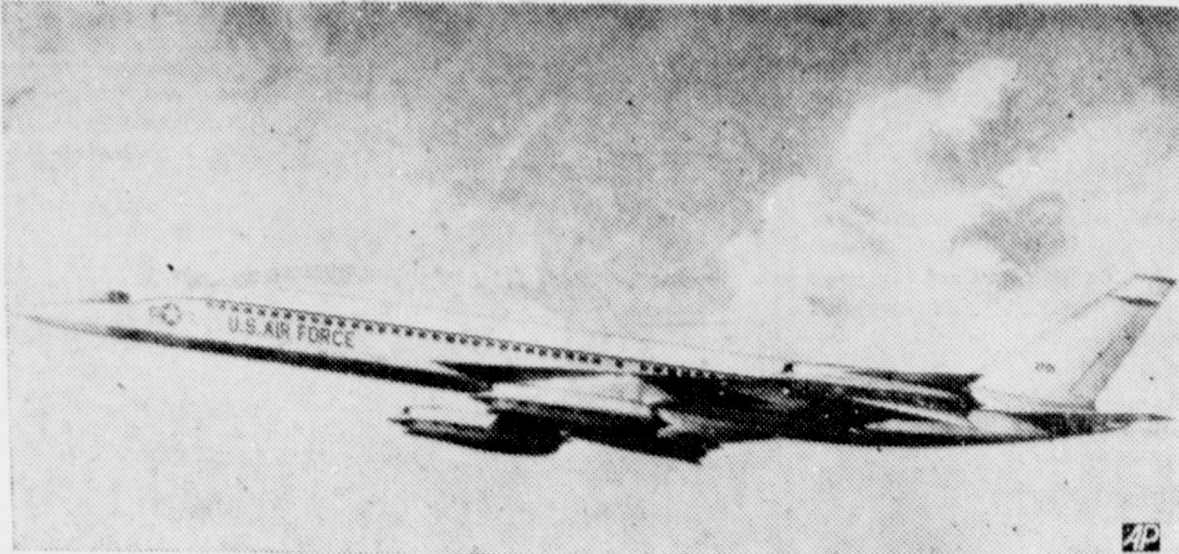

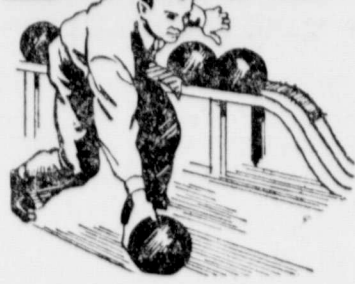
