INSURANCE RATES CUT FOR GATESVILLE: \$2,000 TO BE SAVED

Gatesville residents will be saving more than \$2,000 annually on their fire insurance since the State Board of Insurance slashed the rate from 29 to 26 cents per \$100 insurance.

On the basis of \$70,072 insurance bought in 1959, the saving will be \$2,103, which is effective Nov. 1.

Charges at Gatesville were made for water works pumping units in duplicate; water supply mains not in duplicate and 18 per cent of mains deficient in size in the resident section; 2 per cent of the hydrants fed from inadequate size mains; wholly volunteer fire department; no fire alarm system, building laws; narrow alleys and conflagration hazards.

An open meeting of Gatesville Chamber of Commerce will be held at the new high school auditorium Nov. 22, according to Pat Hollingsworth, president.

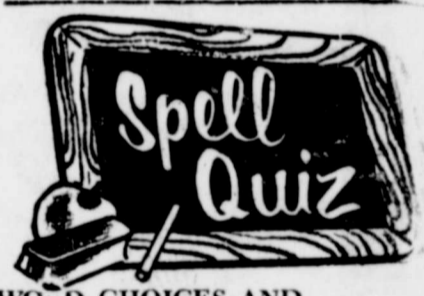

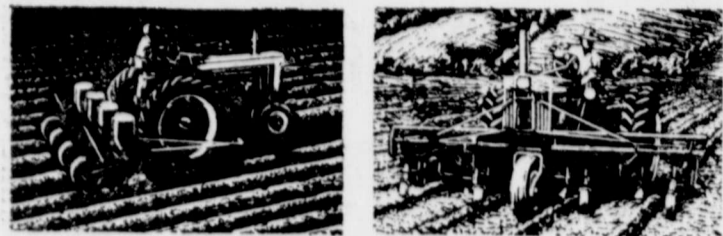

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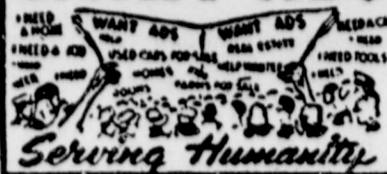

WORKING WITH WOOD



WORKING WITH WOOD

Some pieces of wood are naturally resistant to fungus attack and withstand decay for many years. However, it is only the heartwood of these species which is durable. The sapwood of all native trees decays readily. The durability of heartwood from certain trees is the result of toxic materials in the heartwood which makes the wood undesirable to fungi. Also, since heartwood is dryer than sapwood and the heartwood pores are filled with various deposits, the moisture and air conditions required for fungus growth are less favorable.

Fortunately, sapwood is easy to treat with wood preservatives since the sells are relatively open and free of deposits. Such treatment can make sapwood more durable than the naturally durable heartwood. The expense of preservatives should really be considered a saving, since properly treated wood will give effective service many times longer than untreated wood. To protect their investment, more builders should demand the treatment of all wood which is used in or near the ground line where conditions favorable to insect and fungus attack exist.

HOW YOU AND GOD CAN MEET ANY CHALLENGE

When I was a little boy, our neighbor, Mr. Raimer, bought a new Chevrolet. Later, in an accident, the car turned over and pinned his son under it. I saw Mr. Raimer pick up one end of that car by himself and lift it completely off his child. I saw that.

How did he do it? God, who created our bodies, has placed within us the power and strength to meet challenges. It was not normally possible for Mr. Raimer to lift such a weight, but that extra God-given power flooded his being and for a few minutes it made him a superman—well able to meet this challenge.

A well-known man once said, "There are no great men, only great challenges that ordinary men are forced to meet." I believe he should have said, "There are only great challenges that God helps ordinary men to meet."

Consider the story of Moses. Living far back in the desert, Moses was an ordinary shepherd watching his flock day by day. The Bible tells us that he was slow of speech and tongue. Many scholars feel that he suffered a speech impediment; and with his plain dress, he was an

ordinary man—a simple shepherd.

But Moses was concerned that his people, the Israelites, were prisoners and slaves to the Egyptians. Being filled with the Spirit of God, Moses challenged the Egyptian Pharaoh. And not only did he face Pharaoh, but with God's guidance he succeeded in obtaining the release of the Israelites.

Just think about it: An ordinary man, faced with the awesome challenge of freeing an entire captive nation, was able to lead his people from bondage because God helped him. Without God, a shepherd with a halting tongue could never have faced an Egyptian monarch and come away victorious!

I believe that any person can meet the difficult challenges that life offers if he will join himself to a power greater than himself. That power is God. A person can say, as did the Apostle Paul, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me."

When you are faced with difficulty, remember that you and God can meet any challenge. Believe there is a way to God and you will succeed.

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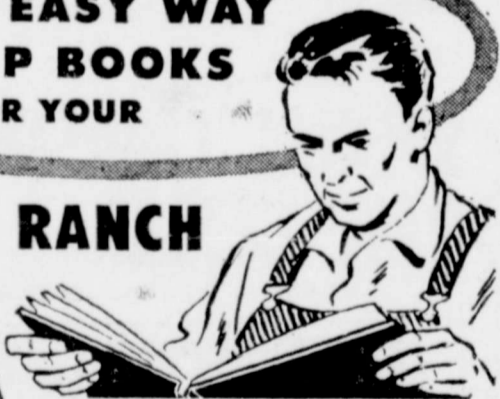
