## GHS HORNETS AND BRADY HOUN' DAWGS TANGLE IN BI-DISTRICT GAME AT HOLMES STADIUM 8 TONIGHT

On paper, it looks like Gatesville, on the turf at Holmes Stadium tonight, it could be Brady's Houn' Dawgs. Who knows.  
Gatesville Hornets have handled a menagerie of animals, varmints and other obstructions in getting Gatesvilles First District Championship in years, and these include Trojans, Marlin Bulldogs, Black Cats, McGregor Bulldogs, Lions, Cougars, Panthers, Eagles, Hamilton Bulldogs and Badgers--anything else, they handled them too. But this time, it's Houn' Dawgs as the Brady fans lovingly call their squad.  
The Hornets are for the season 10-0-0, and for the District 6-0-0. They amassed 307 to 41 points for the season, and 162 to 27 for the District.  
The Bulldogs, we believe, show 1 loss for the season, and that was an early one to Stamford, who's always given them trouble. They've been District Champs for any number of years, and due to an ineligible player on Stamford's Club last year, were declared AA State Champions.

Tonight, GHS Hornets, you can safely say, face the 1959 State AA Champions, a modified form, but nevertheless, headed by the same quarterback as the '59 team, a smart, efficiently coached AA football team, that's due to be in at the finish 100 percent, win, lose or draw.  
Gatesville, with their 469 to 68 points the season, Tuesday afternoon, was in good shape, and there's a possibility, David Bell, who has an injured knee, will go. Jack Roach, still wearing a patch over his eye, looks okeh, as does Jim Gooch, Bob Scott, and the other members of the battered club.  
All things being equal, it looks like quite a contest, and it'll depend a lot on desire, 100 percent, 60 minute performance as to who takes the bi-district trophy.  
Brady's line boasts a 171 average and the backfield 155.

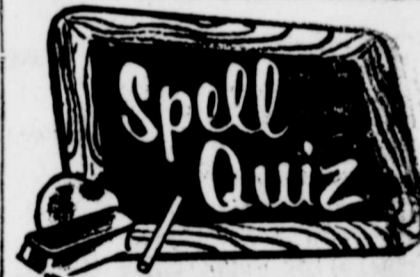

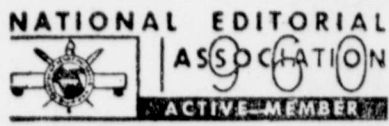

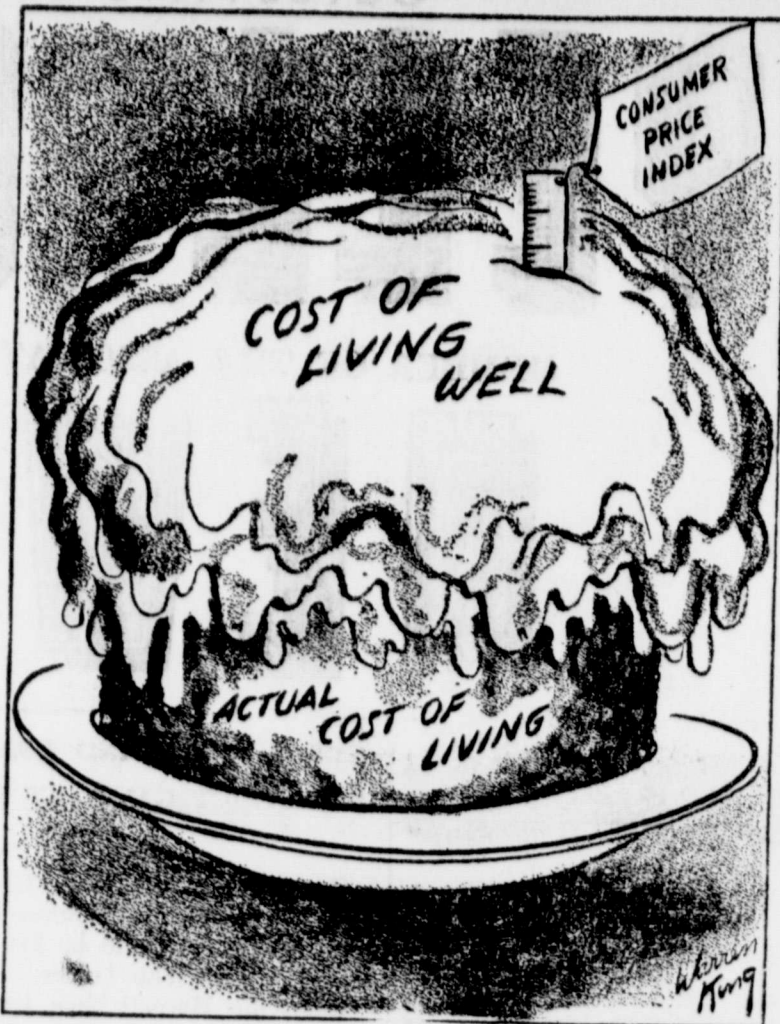

### What Is The Outlook For Gold Stocks?

In the past couple of weeks the price of gold has become an important item in the news. A speculative wave of buying took place in London which forced the price up to over \$40 per ounce

although it dropped back close to the U. S. price of \$35 an ounce in a matter of a few days. This interest was caused primarily by the fear that the United States might either devalue the dollar or raise the price of gold. There is also fear of a greater inflation in this country as a result of governmental spending proposals of one of the presidential candidates which could lead to an unbalanced budget. There has probably been some selling of American stocks by European investors who are fearful about the economic outlook in the country at this time. Further liquidation is possible along with further withdrawal of gold if the sentiment towards inflation continues. Finally, interest rates in this country are lower creating a wide spread between the return one can get from European bonds as compared to American bonds.

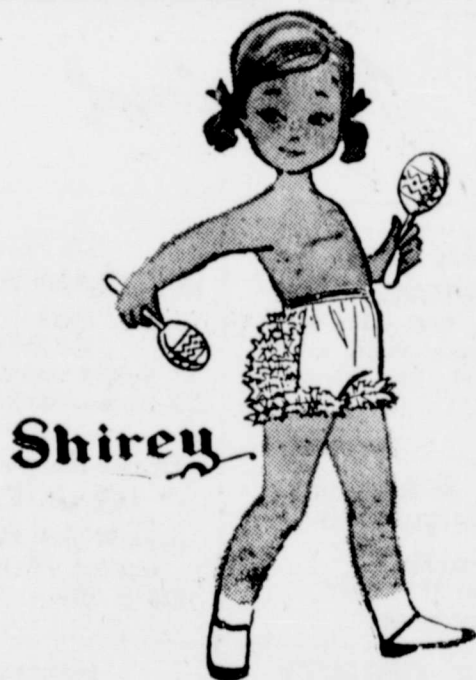
There are so many uncertainties at the present time that it would be very difficult to forecast the future outlook for gold prices. The current Administration has assured the British Government they will maintain the \$35 price for gold, but if the outflow continues on the basis at which it has in the past year eventually some action might have to be taken within the form of an em-

bargo, a devaluation of the dollar or an increase in the price of gold. The only other possible alternative would be the payment of subsidies to domestic gold mining companies to increase gold production.

Gold stocks are speculative and probably should not be included in the small investor's portfolio, but the sophisticated investor who looks to this group as a possible hedge, especially if he has a large portfolio which is well diversified, might buy them.

Domes Mines and Homestake Mining are perhaps the least speculative of the gold mining stocks, but for the more venturesome investor there might be greater opportunities for capital gains (or losses if the situation reversed itself) in Campbell Red Lake and Giant Yellowknife.

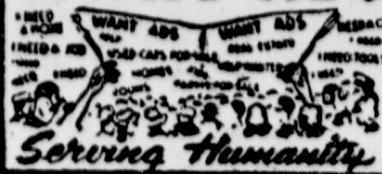

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## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

The Attorney General of the State of California has filed an action for over a million dollars in the Federal Courts that will be watched with great interest as it could result in achieving another milestone in the enforcement of anti-trust laws.



Defendants in this suit are six manufacturers of folding bleacher seats. The suit charges that school districts in the state suffered provable damages of almost \$350,000 because the defendants conspired to allocate business among themselves and fix prices charged to the schools.

Last year these same six manufacturers were the defendants in a criminal action brought by the United States Department of Justice for conspiring to fix prices, allocate markets, and as a result paid a fine of \$94,000.

But California's Attorney General, Stanley Mosk, does not believe this constitutes adequate reparations to the 82 school districts and four state colleges he is representing in this action, nor to the taxpayers who support these schools.

According to the suit filed, it is claimed that it can be proved that because of this conspiracy among the six manufacturers, these schools over paid \$344,889 for folding bleachers.

California's Attorney General has seen fit to file under the provisions of the anti-trust laws regarding rights to triple damages. If this suit is successful

the school districts would then collect \$1,034,667.

Undoubtedly this would be a powerful deterrent to further conspiracy in selling to schools.

The suit also injects another far reaching issue. While there has been several triple damage suits brought by business firms who have been injured by unfair competitive prices, this is a case where the buyers are seeking triple damages.

There are even greater and more far reaching affects possible as the outcome of this suit.

This could go a long way to establishing joint action in anti trust enforcement between the U. S. Justice Department and the various states.

It has long been felt by many that school districts especially, have been victimized by the practice of collusive bidding. This is probably due to the peculiar set up that exists largely in the handling of funds and contracts for school purposes.

Usually school administrators are required to be primarily teachers, with no business experience required. School boards are generally composed of volunteers who meet once or twice per month, but are occupied with their own affairs.

Thus, although schools represent growing share of local tax dollars, supervision of the business aspects of school systems is generally weak.

However, a successful conclusion of the action started in California, especially if carried on in other states, could undoubtedly accomplish a great deal in bringing down the costs of schools.

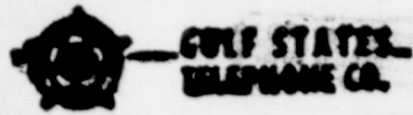

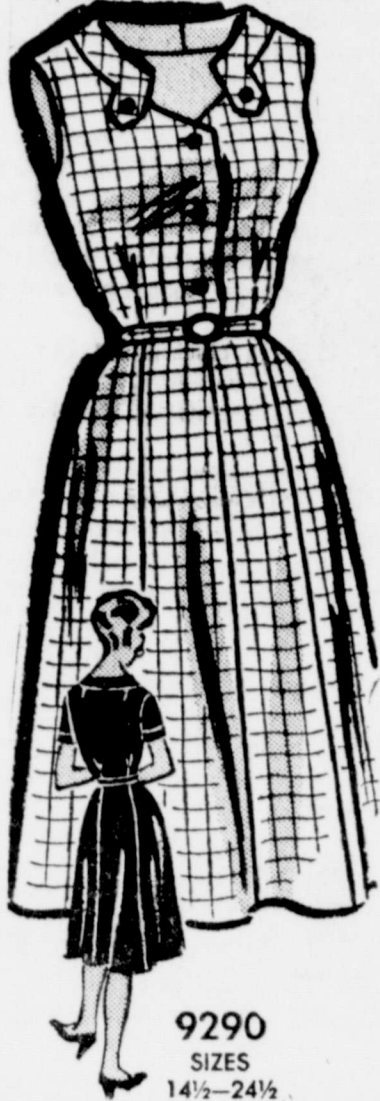
