## BANK AT COVE ALREADY NEAR MILLION MARK

COPPERAS COVE (SPL)—Copperas Cove State Bank was a year old Monday, but it already has nearly a million dollars in deposits.

A condensed financial statement of Nov. 12 shows \$1,112,318.52 in assets and liabilities.

Assets listed are: loans and discounts, \$395,696.49; U. S. Government Bonds, \$289,328.13; banking house, \$36,973.75; furniture and fixtures, \$14,504.20; prepaid insurance, \$1,656; other assets, \$179,35; cash and exchange, \$373,980.60.

Liabilities listed include: capital stock, \$75,000; certified surplus, \$50,000; undivided profits, \$35,402.80; deposits, \$951,915.72.

Across the bottom of the financial statement was typed in capital letters: "One thousand four hundred sixty-seven wonderful accounts."

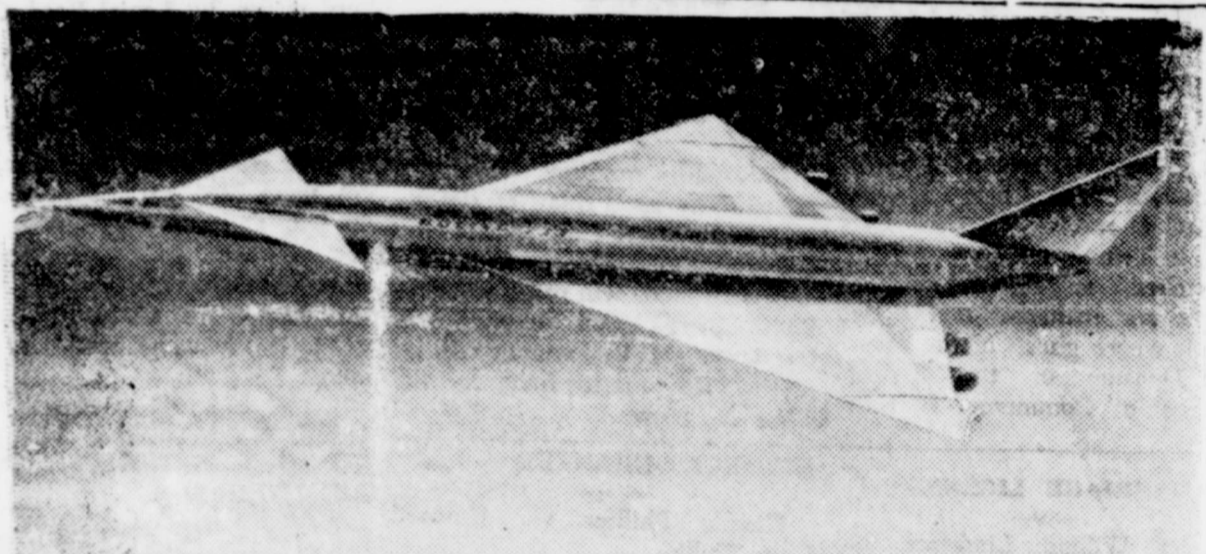

**NOVA SCOTIA FOLKS FAVOR**

"Blue" is a popular color and a widely-used word in the Canadian Province of Nova Scotia.

"New Scotland" is "Bluenose" country; the predominant color in the distinctive Nova Scotian tartan is blue. And now Mrs. Bob Pitt wife of the manager of the swank and recently enlarged Nova Scotia Hotel at Halifax, has come up with a new dessert recipe which she has christened "Scotian Blue Delight." Here is how Mrs. Pitt makes this tasty delight:

**Scotian Blue Delight**

- 1/4 cup shortening
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1 egg
- 1/4 cup fresh blueberries
- 1 cup flour
- 1 pint fresh blueberries

Cream shortening and sugar; add egg and mix well. Blend in flour, baking powder and salt, that have been sifted together, alternately with milk. Beat for 2 minutes. Pour into greased 8" x 8" greased pan. Spread with blueberries. Top with following mixture:

- 1/4 - 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1/4 cup butter

Combine sugar, flour and cinnamon. Dot blueberries with butter and spread sugar mixture evenly over top. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 50-60 minutes.

Still making use of the word "blue," the Nova Scotian Hotel manager's wife has a warm spot in her heart for "Blue-Eyed Bounce." She makes this delectable dessert this way:

**Blue-Eyed Bounce**

- 2 cups blueberries
- 2 cups water
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1/2 cup milk

Cook berries in the water—when



soft, add sugar and cook 5 minutes. Cut the butter into the sifted dry ingredients. Add the milk, making a soft dough. Put in dish with tight fitting cover. Place in a kettle of boiling water, allowing water to come within 1 inch of top of dish. Steam 1 hour keeping water at boiling point all the time. Serve hot with nutmeg sauce.

**Nutmeg Sauce**

- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 cups boiling water
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1/2 tsp. grated nutmeg
- 1/4 tsp. salt

Mix sugar, flour and salt. Add boiling water gradually, stirring all the time. Add butter and cook for five minutes. Remove from heat and stir in the nutmeg.

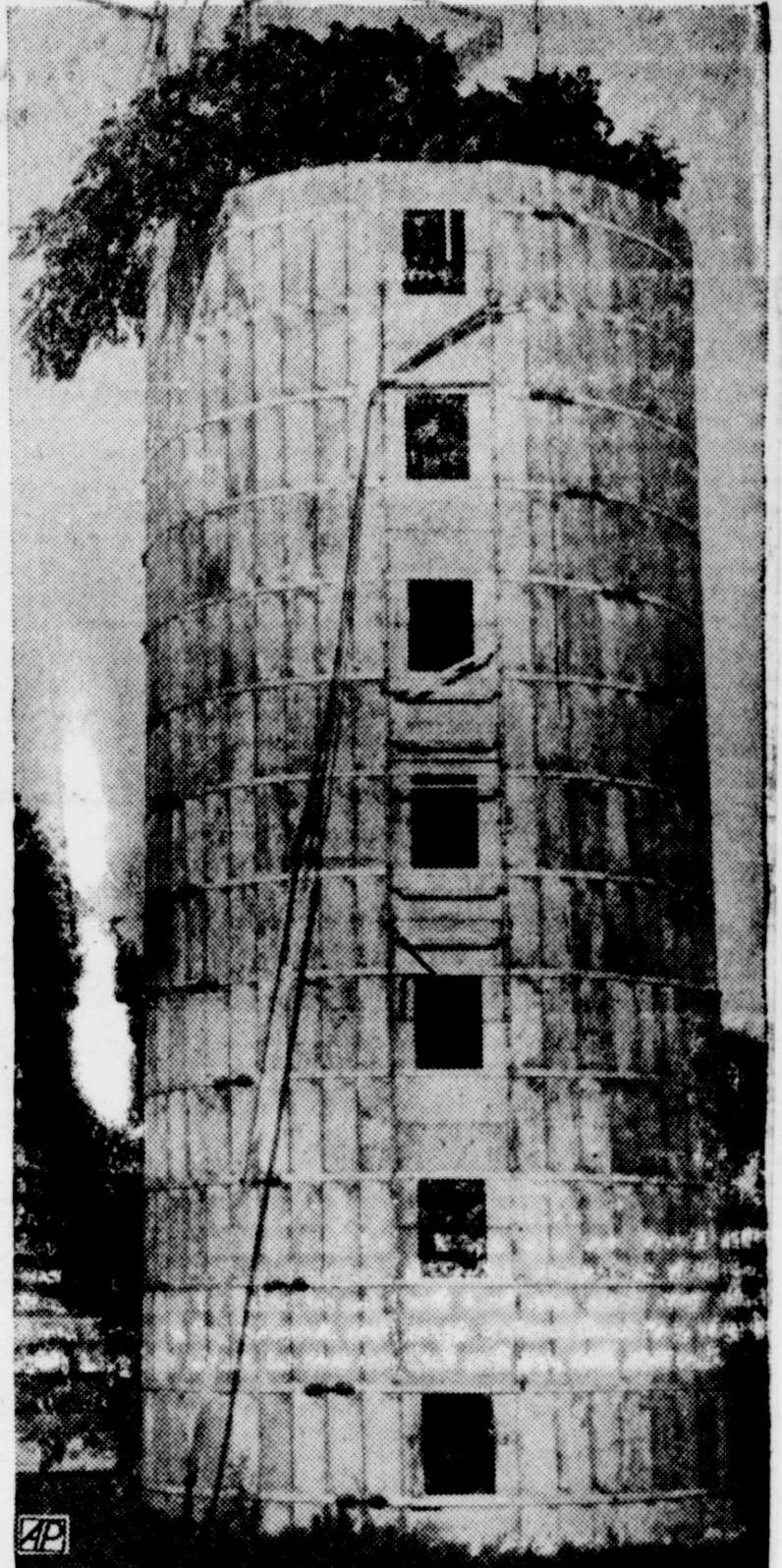

### Grandmother's Apple Crow's Nest Dessert



The sea is so much a part of the life of everybody in Newfoundland, that its influence even extends to desserts.

"Not that we use our fish in our dessert recipes," Mrs. Michael Tobin hastens to add, "but we do salute the ocean that surrounds our 'Big Island' when we name many of our desserts."

The favorite Newfoundland dessert of Mrs. Tobin, who is the wife of Capt. Michael Tobin, Master of the MV "William Carson" which operates daily across Cabot Strait between Port Aux Basques, Newfoundland and North Sydney, Nova Scotia, is "Grandmother's Apple Crow's Nest." The "Crow's Nest" part of the name reflects the influence of the Sea on Newfoundlanders.

Here is how Mrs. Tobin makes Grandmother's Apple Crow's Nest

- 4 medium sized tart apples
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon

Slice apples into a greased 9-inch or 10-inch pie plate; dot with butter. Combine sugar and cinnamon; sprinkle 2 tablespoons of this over the apples and set aside the rest.

- 1 cup sifted flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 3 tablespoons shortening
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup milk

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in shortening. Add enough milk to make a soft dough. Pat out to desired size and cover apple mixture with the dough.

Bake at 400°F. for 25 to 30 minutes or until apples are tender.

When baked, turn out upside down on a plate and work remaining sugar and cinnamon mixture into apples with a fork.

Serve hot with whipped cream, garnished with a dash of cinnamon and a few finely chopped nuts.

Air Force Reserve Troop Carrier crews are required to develop proficiency in performing over-water missions.

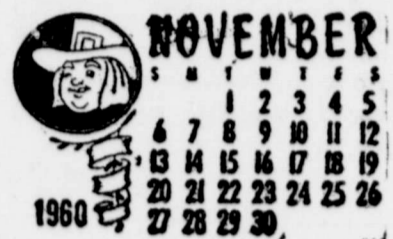

### Depressed Issues On The Way Up

Commercial jet aircraft have not been profitable to the companies manufacturing them. To develop a commercial plane large research expenditures are necessary and unless a sufficient quantity of these planes are sold, the results will not be profitable. There are four companies that have made important recent contributions to the commercial aircraft field. These are: Boeing with the 707 jet; Douglas with the DC 8 jet; General Dynamics with the Convair 880 and 600 jets; and finally, Lockheed with the Electra. The Boeing and Douglas planes have proven successful; there are insufficient planes of General Dynamics' yet in operation to prove their value; and unfortunately Lockheed's Electra has run into several difficulties.

None of these undertakings proved profitable for the very simple reason that the airlines were inadequately financed and therefore unable to purchase a sufficient number of planes to justify the initial research and development costs. However, it must be remembered that all four of these companies have key stakes in the military program and now having recognized their mistakes in the commercial aircraft field and written them off accordingly in their earnings statements are ready to move ahead profitably once again.

Douglas, General Dynamics and Lockheed took all of their losses from write-offs in 1960 and consequently all of them will show

losses for the year. Boeing, on the other hand, spread its losses which resulted in a sharp decline in earnings in 1959 and only a modest recovery in 1960.

We particularly favor General Dynamics with its participation in the Atlas missile, the atomic submarine, the B53 supersonic bomber and various space projects. Boeing with the Minuteman and Bomarc missiles, the B52 Bomber and the Dyna-Soar program participates substantially in our defense efforts. Lockheed is more speculative but it has developed the Polaris missile which may be the key item in our military program while Douglas, probably the most speculative of the four companies, has contracts on the Thor, Nike Zeus and Nike Hercules missiles and the Saturn space vehicle.

**WORKING WITH WOOD**

There are many misconceptions about the durability of wood. All wood exposed to conditions suitable to fungus growth will eventually decay. No wood will decay if it is adequately protected from fungus attack. However, some woods are more durable than others.

Wood cut from dead trees is just as durable as wood cut from living trees of the same species. Also the season of year during which a tree is cut has no direct effect on its durability or other properties. Similarly the geographic region from which a tree is obtained bears no relation to its decay resistance. It is the conditions of use which affect durability.

Some of the most durable wood species commonly grown in Texas include black locust, bois de catalpa, cedar, cypress and juniper. However, only the heartwood of these durable species resists fungus attack. When used in contact with the ground, even the woods may fail, since decay feeds away the sapwood in a short time. Thus, only the durable heartwood core remains for support and strength. On the other hand the sapwood of all our construction species, when properly treated with approved preservatives can effectively resist decay for at least 30 years.
