The Cotton Marketing Quota Referendum will be held on Dec. 13. Polling places will be Gatesville, Turnersville and Oglesby. The polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 6 p. m.

Each person who is engaged in the production of cotton is eligible to vote. The wife of each eligible voter will also be eligible to vote. Absentee ballots may be obtained upon request at the County ASC office prior to the date of election by any eligible voter who will be out of the county on Dec. 13.

Cards have been mailed to all known wheat producers, ASC County Office Clois D. Stone advises. He says it is very important that the card be filled in and returned by mail as soon as the wheat has been seeded. The cards are not official unless returned through the mail, Stone said, and therefore asks that they not be brought to the office. Any farmer who has wheat seeded and does not receive a card is asked to contact the ASC Office. Every farm is permitted to plant 15.0 acres of wheat, Stone said. However, unless the ASC Office has a record of the seeding the farmer cannot receive a marketing card to use in selling the wheat.



About 10 years ago a huge cry went up about the "school problem"- shortage of classrooms, low teacher pay and too few teachers, especially in science and mathematics.

With typical American urgency, American communities went to work. The results are amazing.

Ten years ago hardly one-fifth of students entering college would consider teaching. Today nearly one-third of all college graduates are choosing teaching careers.

From 1949 to 1959, school instructional staffs increased 51 per cent, compared with an increase in the entire civilian labor force of 12 per cent. The number of graduates qualified to teach mathematics and science doubled in the short span of five years from 1954 to 1959.

In constant dollars, the pay of public school teachers increased 45 per cent in the 10 years, while that of all employed persons went City News just returned from a up only 29 per cent. Teacher salaries have more than doubled since 1946 averaged arounf \$5,000 last year.

During the decade, 567,000 classrooms were completed- 200, 000 replacements and 367,000 additional ones. The U.S. Office of Education estimates 610,000 classrooms will be needed by 1969. In the last five years, we have built an average of 67,360 classrooms per year a rate 10 per cent greater than will be required to meet estimated needs in coming years.

Over all, it's quite a record of accomplishment. The school situation seems to be changing from a "problem" to a point-with-pride



FARM INCOME FORECAST For what it is worth, the out-going USDA administration of Exra Taft Benson has prepared and released a forecast of farm income for 1961, which will be the first year of the new Democratic

administration.

According to the forecast, farm income should continue at about the same level as 1960, taking no account of any new Kennedy-John son Democratic farm programs.

Programs affecting most 1961 crops, of course, will have been set before the planting season for Chairman sharp changes to be made. The forecast anticipates relative stability in cash receipts, farm cost rate and net farm ncome.

In summary, the forecast predicted as follows:

Relative stability in cash receipts, production expenses, and net income will likely continue in 1960. Reflecting record farm output this year, the volume of farm marketings is running about about three per cent above 1959 and cay increase further in 1961 if growing conditions are average or better.

"Livestock production will likely increase in 1961. Cattle prices in 1961 probably will continue to decline under the impact of larger marketing and result in some further decline in cash receipts from cattle.

"Marketing of hogs will continne below a year earlier well into 1961, reflecting th reduced pig crops this year, and prices are expected to remain relatively high in



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

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
